

### Acheson Raps Russian Moves

Washington, April 21 (AP)—Secretary Acheson said today he believes the world is in a serious situation because of recent moves by Russia but that he does not see it moving into any armed conflict.

At a news conference, the secretary of state said there is tension in the world now and the things the Russians are doing are far from helpful.

He accused the Soviets of trying to stir up trouble in several areas, citing their stand on the Baltic airplane incident, their accusations against the western powers over Trieste and their renewed demands for special rights in the Dardanelles strait.

In response to a question, Acheson also came out against any public congressional investigation of U. S. policy in Germany such as has been proposed by Senator Gillette (D., Iowa).

Acheson said the members of congress can find out all they want to know about German policy without public hearings.

On the Russians, Acheson: 1. Declared the Soviet charges that an American B-29 airplane violated Soviet territory and fired at Red fighter aircraft are "fictitious allegations." He said the Russians know they are not true.

2. Restated American opposition to Russian demands for special rights in the Turkish-controlled Dardanelles. A renewal of these demands was made by the Soviet navy newspaper, Red Fleet, a few days ago.

3. Assailed Soviet accusations that the western allies are suppressing human rights and establishing military and naval bases in Trieste. Acheson called that "nonsense" and a repetition of a number of outworn arguments with the addition of some new wholly false allegations of violations of the Italian peace treaty.

### Racing News Corrupts Police

Washington, April 21 (AP)—The Los Angeles police chief told congressmen today that the Continental News Service, which distributes racing information, is "corrupting police departments throughout the country."

Maj. Gen. William Arthur Worton, retired marine, made the charge before a senate commerce subcommittee investigating crime. He followed Mayor Fletcher Bowron, of Los Angeles.

Worton said that any law to control gambling must "hit at the people" who run the Continental News Service. He said the service has headquarters in Cleveland and is controlled by one Edward J. McBride.

"They are the people corrupting police departments throughout the country," he said. "They are the people ruining our young manhood."

Both Bowron and his police chief endorsed a proposed justice department bill being considered by the subcommittee to outlaw the interstate transmission of certain gambling information.

Bowron charged that the lenient attitude of California superior court judges is at least partly responsible for the "big menace" of organized bookmaking in his state.

### Anti-Sub Planes Shifted to Pacific

Washington, April 20 (AP)—The navy announced today that an anti-submarine air squadron will be shifted from the east coast to the west coast this summer "in line with the navy's policy of bolstering Pacific fleet anti-submarine forces."

Navy officers estimate that about one-fourth of 270 submarines in the Russian navy are now stationed in the Pacific.

The U. S. navy squadron being shifted is one of seven formally known as composite carrier aircraft squadrons but redesignated by the navy today as air anti-submarine squadrons. Five of these now have home bases on the east coast and two on the west. The navy said an eighth is being eliminated "because of budget ceilings."

The new home base of the squadrons to be shifted will be San Diego, Calif. Although the squadrons have home bases on the coasts, they operate from aircraft carriers.

The contest was arranged to determine the identity of the five students who will be awarded rides on the courtesy trips to be made Saturday by United Air Line's DC-4.

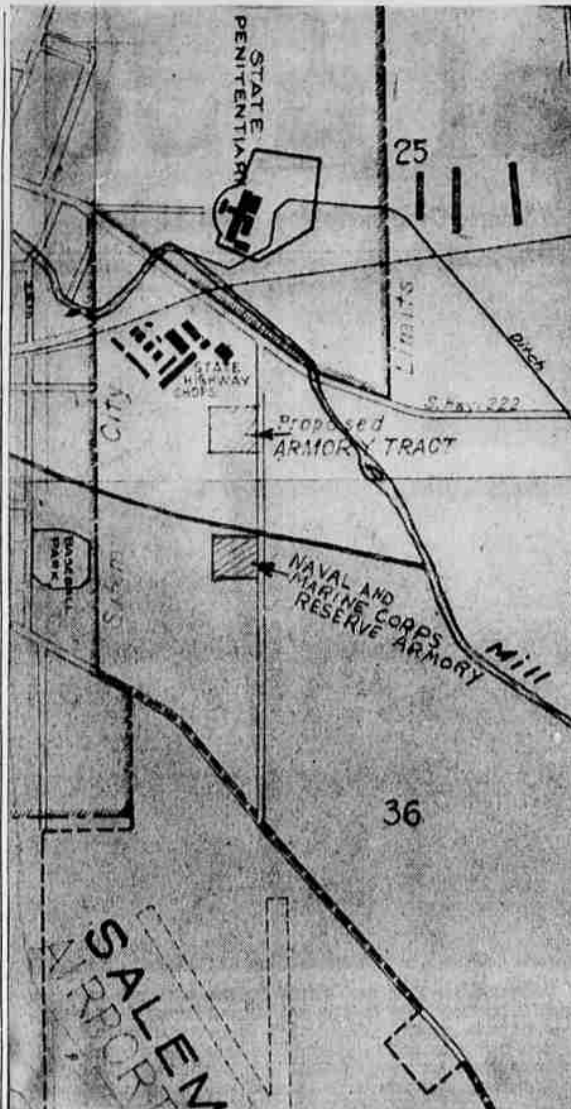

An estimated 10,000 fans turned out on a cloudy, cold afternoon to celebrate "Connie Mack day" in Philadelphia. Best wishes for success in his Golden Jubilee season poured in on the grand old man of baseball from President Truman, Vice President Barkley, governors from states all over the United States and just plain "Joe," the baseball fan.

The impressive ceremonies started in Mayor Bernard Samuel's office with an official proclamation of Connie Mack day. A motorcade left City hall and proceeded to Shibe park with the Athletics' owner and manager sitting in an open touring car. The cold wind appeared to have little effect on him.
