

Race Relations Workshop Hears Talks on Intolerance

"How Racism Strikes" in our state was discussed today at a race relations workshop being conducted by the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

The Fellowship, which describes itself as a religious pacifist organization, is spearheaded in Salem by the Salem Community Council, a group which organized last fall after the local press published a story about two Negro workers from the Alderman farm who claimed to have been ordered to "move on" by a local policeman.

"Mrs. Simpson" Now in Bloom

The spring of 1950 has turned "Mrs. Simpson" into a botanical freak.

"Mrs. Simpson" is a commercial variety of chrysanthemum, a plant which normally bears blossoms in the fall of the year. But one plant of that variety produced by Beckman Gardens of Salem, broke with its own history and that of its breed by producing three blossoms this month.

The plant was put on display Saturday in the show window of the Roen Typewriter exchange at 456 Court street.

The same plant produced two regularly timed blossoms in the latter part of last October. It was given no special treatment, but wintered along with dozens of similar Mum plants in the Beckman greenhouse during the winter.

In an effort to continue the unusual strain, the grower has taken cuttings from the plant for production of others from the unusual parent.

2 Students Win Scholarships

Scholarship awards from institutions of higher learning have been made to two members of this year's graduating class at Salem high school. They are Robert Hamblin, son of Rev. and Mrs. Chester Hamblin, 845 Cheeketa street, and Betty Cooley, daughter of Mrs. Earl Cooley, 2270 Center.

Hamblin's award is from Occidental college, Los Angeles, and is tuition for the year 1950-1951, and its monetary value is \$400.

This type of scholarship is granted to only 10 students, and it is renewable upon maintenance of high scholarship in college.

In high school Hamblin has been active, serving as president of Sigma Lambda chapter of the National Honor society; as sports editor of the Clarion and Viking, and as a member of the S club. He is a photographer, specializing in motion pictures of games.

Just now he is competing in the national YMCA swimming meet at the University of Minnesota. He has won various titles in swimming.

Miss Cooley's award is a \$100 scholarship for tuition to the college of home economics at Oregon State college. The award is sponsored by the Amalgamated Sugar company.

She plans to major in home economics, specializing in child care and nursing school work.

In high school she is a member of Sigma Lambda chapter of the National Honor society; is a member of Tri-Y, Vikesettes, Civics club and Rainbow, and as vice president of the student body was in charge of social affairs, and was a princess of the interclub carnival.

2 Salem Women Blame Crime Thrillers

Seattle, April 21. (AP)—Two Salem, Ore., women burglars got suspended sentences today and a little lecture on radio crime programs.

The pair, Roberta Scott, 29, and June Carper, 19, had pleaded guilty to second degree burglary for taking two armloads of loot from a residence here.

They blamed their action on listening to crime programs and reading detective magazines.

"Crime programs," Judge Hugh C. Todd said, "are an education in crime and should be suppressed. You are to be pitied. You two 'children' will be returned to your parents and to the state of Oregon."

Bulgaria Cuts News Facilities

London, April 22 (AP)—A reliable source said privately yesterday that the Bulgarian government has cut off news gathering facilities of the Associated Press in Bulgaria. No reason was given for the action.

No news has been received from AP news sources in Bulgaria in some time. Efforts to telephone Dimitar Mishev, Bulgarian citizen who has served as AP correspondent at Sofia, were without success.

On April 8, Nathan Polowetzky, American correspondent of the AP in Prague, was expelled by the Czechoslovak government. Polowetzky was accused of unobjective reporting but there was no documentation of the charges.

Czech nationals employed by the AP in Prague still are permitted to send some news, but they are barred from attending news conferences, trials or other news producing functions. The AP has filed an application with the Czech government for permission to send another American correspondent to Prague, but this still is pending.

"Facts and Fallacies Concerning Race" will be the subject tonight at the Jewish synagogue, 1795 Broadway, when the speaker is Dr. William Laughlin, University of Oregon.

Sunday a service at the Leslie Methodist church, a discussion of "Cross Currents" at 2:30 p.m. and "Solving Our Problem" at 4 p.m. will bring the conference to its conclusion.

The death of Sophus Lawrence Jespersen, 60, of 2295 North Church, was officially described Saturday as a suicide by Marion county Coroner Lester Howell.

He died in a gas filled room of the Cherry City cottages at 2500 Fairgrounds road.

Friends of the man told police he had been despondent as a result of a broken leg sustained several months ago during an altercation at a Hollywood area tavern.

Police and first aidmen were summoned to the auto court at 2:53 p.m. Friday. They found the partially clothed Jespersen lying on a bed. Mrs. Alex Muzchenko, operator of the court, summoned officers when she detected the odor of the gas.

A sister, resident of Vancouver, B.C., Mrs. M. Franzen, was reported enroute to Salem to arrange the funeral.

The victim was born in Denmark, Dec. 17, 1889, and came to United States when he was 17. He lived in Iowa and Nevada and came to Oregon in 1916. He had married the former Marie Crabtree who died in 1940.

He was the former owner of the Rainbow tavern at 163 South Commercial.

Attrition System Offered by Solon

Washington, April 22 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) introduced a bill yesterday to reduce government payrolls "with the least possible loss of trained and skilled personnel."

It would require the director of the budget to establish manpower ceilings throughout the various government agencies. When the government has or is likely to have more employees than needed, the bill would require that it discontinue hiring to fill vacancies, but instead transfer trained personnel from other departments.

Ellsworth told the house that the proposal has been tried out in some government agencies to a limited extent and with success.

Report Farouk Weds Narriman

Damascus, Syria, April 22 (AP)—A generally reliable Arabic newspaper in Beirut, Lebanon, published a story last Tuesday saying that King Farouk of Egypt and Narriman Sadek already are married. Up to today there had been no denial or protest about the story from any official Egyptian source.

The newspaper, Beirut, said the beautiful 17-year-old Egyptian girl has become the king's legal wife and added that it had learned, "from sources very near to King Farouk," that there will be an official announcement May 6. That day is observed in Egypt as accession day, the anniversary of the beginning of Farouk's reign.

The story of the king's romance with Miss Sadek, as it reached the outside world last December from several sources, read like a page from the Arabian Nights. She had been engaged to Zaki Hashem, a young Egyptian economist, and fell under the royal eye when she went to jewelry store in Cairo with Hashem to select a ring.

Hashem was informed that his engagement was broken and he went to the United States.
