

Dewey Assails Truman Fair Deal as a Faro Deal

New York, May 5 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey told a New York state republican dinner in a hard hitting speech last night that the Truman administration tolerates spies, traitors and sex offenders in government service.

The two-time GOP presidential loser said the democrats are the party of "big business."

Dewey said "Kansas City gunmen" are linked with national administration politics.

"The fair deal is a faro (card gambling) deal for New York state—the people get trimmed every day," Dewey declared.

Rep. William L. Pfeiffer, state chairman, said it was the largest political dinner ever held in New York state. The dinner paid \$100 each for the fund raising affair at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel. He said the state GOP campaign fund gained approximately \$350,000, including \$40,000 from advertising in the 112-page program.

"With this money," Pfeiffer said, "the republican party is back in business again."

Dewey—who has said he would not seek the GOP presidential nomination again and has avoided a declaration about running for governor in November—was booed for a third term at Albany at the dinner.

Dewey told the 3,000 diners that the national democratic administration levies tribute from union treasuries. And the democrats "shake down" wealthy playboys for government jobs, he declared.

Making one of his most bitter attacks on the Truman administration since he became the top titular leader, Dewey said:

"Today it is the democrats who are the party of big money. Last year in the New York City and state campaigns they provided it by drenching the air with radio time and full-page advertisements in the papers. They spent at least \$3 for every \$1 of republican money."

"But there are other differences even more important than their ability to tax union treasuries without the consent of the members and to shake down wealthy playboys for government jobs."

Polio Foundation Studies Funds; No New Cases Here

Unpaid bills still were far ahead of funds available when Marion county chapter of the Infantile Paralysis Foundation, Inc., met Thursday evening—but the group was encouraged to find no new cases reported and to hear about projects to be sponsored by other helping groups to bring in money for the chapter.

Total unpaid bills amounted to \$2348.09 in the reports to the meeting with funds on hand amounting to \$626.37, and it was voted to wait another month before cleaning out the group's treasury, reports indicating there would be some more money available then to assist in meeting the bills. Also, the chapter is hopeful there soon will be answer on application to national for funds.

About 30 attended the meeting, the majority being representatives from various groups who make up the county polio council, these groups working on projects to aid the chapter's funds. Among the projects being sponsored within the month will be the two concerns to be sponsored by the State Employees association May 26 and 27. Several other groups reported plans under way to bring some assistance to the chapter in its work in helping to care for polio victims.

The importance of the swimming program in the physiotherapy for polio patients was discussed. Through an arrangement with the YMCA those patients now receiving physiotherapy to regain use of their muscles use the YM tank two schedules weekly and the chapter is hopeful a third period can be added each week.

At the business session it was voted to meet at 8 p.m. instead of 7:30 p.m. during the summer season. The chapter meets the first Thursday of each month.

Breakfast will be served by the YWCA from 8 to 10 o'clock Saturday morning in Lausanne hall, while Charles A. Paeth, director of admissions, will conduct a tour of the campus for a number of high school seniors who have been invited to the celebration.

The Queen's tea will be held at University house at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon and a formal dance in the gymnasium from 9 o'clock to midnight Saturday will close the observance.

Athletic events will include a track meet between Willamette and Whitman on McCulloch field at 2:15. Interclass rivalry between the freshmen and sophomores will take the form of a greased pole contest.
