Youth Killed In Gang Fight

New York, May 13 (AP)—A Brooklyn youth was shot to death and another was stabbed in a Prospect park teen-age free-for-all last night which was touched off by a single fist-fight.

Police said the battle took place between Brooklyn youth gangs which call themselves the "Garfield Boys" and "The Tigers." They said about 30 youngsters took part in the melee.

The gang warfare resulted from a single scheduled fist-fight. Each youth, members of the rival gangs, brought his friends to see the fight.

Alfred Vento, 17, was taken to a hospital with stab wounds. His condition was described as serious.

Denver, May 13 (AP)—The \$10,000 check was pale pink and fresh-looking and the corners of it very stiff and sharp.

A well-pressed Kaiser-Frazer spokesman held it, tapping it against the heel of his hand as he explained how 34-year-old Frances Atkinson, mother of three children, had won the check by naming the company's new lower priced car.

The spokesman said he was proud to present the check. He said Kaiser-Frazer was delighted that to America's millions the name symbolizes "vision, courage, democracy at work."

After she'd gotten her check and sat down, we asked her: "Don't you think it's going to sound funny for a person to say: 'I've got to take my Henry J. down town for a grease job today?'"

"Sh-h-h-h, let's don't talk about that now," she said.

"Doesn't it seem that a name like Corvette—or maybe Javelin—would've been somehow more eye-catching?"

"Sh-h-h-h, the governor's talking. And I really don't know. We've all been so mixed up at my house since they told us we won. My mother folded a dish towel in with the stack of diapers this morning. And now the towel's ruined. My husband put it on the baby."

"Now you've got the money, do you plan to buy a Henry J?"

After a time the man cracked the check at her and she stood up and took it and smiled at him, but it was the same far-away smile she'd given the tomato.

Everybody attending the special presentation dinner clapped—including Governor Walter Johnson—and she sat down. Holding the check between thumb and forefinger and well away from her. As if it were sticky and might get on her dress.

"I didn't believe it 'til I felt it," she said. "Look at the zeroes on it. Like the wheels on a train."

As a matter of fact the zeroes looked very little like the wheels on a train.

The Kaiser Frazer spokesman said one of the nine Coloradans who took prizes was locked up in a jury room somewhere and couldn't appear personally to collect the fruits of his mile-high brain.
