Oregon City, May 13 (AP)—A two-state hunt was ordered today for a 30-year-old man accused of making off with his cousin's wife.

The man is Wayne Wallace. The woman, whose husband is overseas, is Mrs. Virginia Wallace, who has been living at her brother's home the last two weeks.

The brother, Jesse L. Halford, said Wallace appeared at the house east of Portland Thursday, and at gunpoint ordered Virginia to get in his automobile. He threatened to "blow her head off" if she refused, Halford said. She got in, and Wallace drove off, he continued.

The Clackamas county sheriff charged Wallace with threatening commission of a felony, and police of Oregon and Washington were notified to look for him.

Halford said Mrs. Wallace telephoned later to ask that her suitcases be sent to Connell, Wash. She also said she would return here this week-end for her baby daughter, Halford said. He added that she had known Wallace in Oklahoma and Pasco, Wash., where she previously lived.

Trees Removed for Airplane Clearance

Now being removed is a clump of trees south of the Salem airport, which has long been an obstacle to planes using the runway marked for instrument landing.

The trees owned by E. G. Clark of route 4, Salem, are in direct line with the south end of the runway and have prevented the use of lights on the last 1200 feet of the runway to the south.

With the removal of the trees application will be made by the city for permission to reestablish the glide path angle for the runway. Before this is granted it will be necessary to have an inspection made by the air carrier inspector for the civil aeronautics authority.

Stevens Tells Of Bond Buys

According to Sid Stevens, county savings bond chairman, the people of Marion county purchased a total of \$277,745 in April of which \$118,124 was in E bonds.

He expressed the hope that local people will take the time during the drive period to carefully analyze their own financial situation with an eye toward the future value of a reserve in savings bonds or other types of savings programs, and will act accordingly.

A sharp upturn in sales of U.S. savings bonds was marked in April in the state of Oregon, according to E. C. Sammons, state chairman. Private individuals in this state bought a total of \$3,765,892 worth of Uncle Sam's bonds, with \$2,710,479 being invested in the small E bonds. These figures are taken from the latest report of the Portland branch of the Federal Reserve bank.

Some so-called political prognosticators say that Flegel will win a majority vote upstate while Wallace and Pearson will battle out for leadership in populous Multnomah county.

This race has been bitter, particularly between Flegel and Pearson, and the many accusations hurled back and forth between the two, are not likely to be forgotten, regardless of who captures the nomination.

Governor Douglas McKay, although without opposition, has been traveling throughout the state, laying the groundwork for a vigorous campaign planned next fall.

United States Senator Wayne Morse predicts he will win re-nomination "by an overwhelming majority" and there are many that agree with his prediction.

His opponent, Dave Hoover, who came to Oregon a few years ago after serving as a deputy sheriff in Los Angeles county, has devoted his campaign time in attacking Morse and has said virtually nothing concerning his own views on national and international affairs.

The third man in the republican race for the senatorial nomination, John McBride, practically an unknown in Oregon, has spent his time for some years as clerk for the committee on coinage, weights and measures in the house of representatives in Washington, D. C.

Three candidates are vying for the non-partisan supreme court judgeship, Robert F. Maguire, Portland attorney, Circuit Judge Walter L. Toozie, of Multnomah county, and State Senator Austin Dunne of Baker.

Marion Fight Interesting
In Marion county principal interest is centered in the race for the two state senate and four house seats. Seven republicans are entered in the senate race, with one, Richard L. Ryan, having announced his retirement from the race, and two democrats.

In the house race are 12 republicans, four democrats. Walter Norblad, seeking reelection as U. S. representative, has no opposition in the primaries, while Roy R. Hewitt, Salem attorney, and L. T. Ward, Philomath newspaper publisher, are seeking the democratic nomination.

7500 Names Ask for Change

Seven thousand five hundred petition signatures have been pledged to put the balanced representation plan for reapportionment of the Oregon legislature on the ballot at the November election, it was announced this week.

Speaking for the nonpartisan committee for balanced apportionment, Marshall Swearingen of Salem, said, "County committees have been organized in Baker, Union, Wallowa, Malheur and Hood River counties. The committees are actively working on petitions and have pledged a total of 7500 signatures. The balanced plan is being well received in all sections of the state. People are beginning to realize the threat to Oregon voting power in the so called population plan."

"The state committee will continue its efforts and we expect to have county committees in operation by the end of May. We have received support from members of both political parties and all the major farm and business organizations. It is a big job to get almost 30,000 signatures, but we are confident the job can be done."
