

Over Billion for Better Roads

Washington, May 20 (AP)—The house has approved more than a billion dollars for better roads, for the first time specifically earmarking funds for interstate highways.

A bill authorizing \$1,140,000,000 in federal highway aid to states over a two year period was passed late yesterday by a vote of 246 to 34. The actual money must be appropriated later.

Meanwhile, proposals that federal money be used to help cities unsmother their traffic problems were heard by a senate public works subcommittee.

Representatives of the American Municipal Association suggested that parts of superhighways through cities be financed in one chunk by bond issues and that federal aid highway funds be used to help pay off the bonds over the years.

The authorization approved by the house provides for each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1952 and June 30, 1953:

\$225,000,000 for projects on the federal-aid primary highway system; \$150,000,000 for secondary highways; \$125,000,000 for urban areas; and \$70,000,000 for a national system of interstate highways.

The bill provides for allotment of the funds to states, to match their own funds, on a population basis.

Russian Trawlers In English Waters

London, May 20 (AP)—Sixteen Russian fishing trawlers and tugs and a mother ship anchored in English waters today off Falmouth but nobody seemed to know what they were fishing for.

Various other reports said as many as 10 other small Soviet craft were in or had gone through the English channel in the past 48 hours.

The first sea lord, Lord Fraser, said yesterday "I think it is an ordinary passage to the Black sea from the Baltic sea. But an admiralty spokesman added: "We don't actually know where they are going."

British and other Brussels pact powers begin combined exercises in the Bay of Biscay next week. The Russian vessels might pass through the area on their way to the Black sea.

Hood River Defeats 8 Year DA Wyers

Hood River, May 20 (AP)—District Attorney Teunis J. Wyers was defeated yesterday after eight years in office.

Kenneth M. Abraham defeated him by a 3 to 1 margin for the republican nomination. It means Abraham's election, since there are no democratic candidates.

County Commissioner Waldo Arens, a democrat, also was beaten. The winner was George W. Krieg, who will meet republican Harris Higgins in the fall.

Martin Elected As Mayor of Stayton

Stayton — M. J. Martin was elected mayor of Stayton over Clifford Likes, incumbent, by a vote of 235 to 192 in Friday's municipal balloting.

Other results were: treasurer, Bernice Camp, 407, no opposition; recorder, Ward Ingalls 253, W. N. Simmons, 188; councilmen, G. W. Schachtick 225, W. L. Fry, 154.

Annexation of East Gate, yes 187, no 47; tax levy above six percent limitation, yes 148, no 90.

Living Costs Inch Up a Bit in March

Washington, May 20 (AP)—Living costs inched up a bit last month.

The bureau of labor statistics said its index showed a rise of two-tenths of one percent between March 15 and April 15.

With the 1935-39 period figured as 100, that brought the index to 167.3 for mid-April—1.4 percent lower than a year ago, but 25 percent above the figure for June, 1946, when price controls were relaxed.

Oldest Pioneer Dies, Silverton

Silverton's oldest pioneer, who had come to Silverton in 1874, died Saturday morning at the Salem General hospital.

James G. Smith was 89. He was born in Richmond, Mo., September 5, 1860, and after coming to Silverton was in the jewelry business until retirement. He was married in 1885.

Smith's wife, the former Narvesta Small, preceded him in death in March of this year. She had broken her hip two years ago and had been ill since that time. Smith suffered a broken hip about two weeks ago.

Surviving are two sons, Martin Smith and Homer Smith; three grandchildren and five great grandchildren. Services will be held from the memorial chapel of the Ekman funeral home at 2 p.m. Monday, the Rev. Ben F. Browning officiating.

Mike Elliott Snowed Under

Portland, May 20 (AP)—Multnomah county voters again rejected their erstwhile sheriff, Marion L. "Mike" Elliott, in yesterday's election.

Elliott, recalled last fall after a stormy 10 months in office, trailed Terry Schunk badly for the democratic nomination for sheriff. With half of the county's precincts reported, Schunk had 22,088 votes to Elliott's 5,949. Five other candidates trailed.

Schunk was appointed after Elliott's recall. He is making his first ballot appearance. His republican opponent is not determined from a field of six candidates. The leader is John J. Keegan with 7,323 votes, followed by William C. Robinson with 5,843.

In a non-partisan vote for city commissioner, incumbent Ormond R. Bean apparently won election with 20,607 votes, which was more than the combined total of three opponents. Another incumbent, Kenneth L. Cooper, apparently will undergo a runoff election next fall. Cooper had 13,523 votes, trailing former Commissioner J. E. Bennett, who had 15,007. Bennett's total was short of a majority. Four other candidates lagged behind.

Tillamook Votes \$1,485,000 for PUD

Tillamook, May 20 (AP)—Tillamook county voters approved a \$1,485,000 people's utility district bond issue yesterday, but turned down a proposed \$90,000 bridge levy.

The bridge levy, which was proposed for repair and replacement of county market road bridges, unexpectedly failed in the rural areas. It had gained a lead in the city of Tillamook. The over-all vote was 2,360 against and 2,258 for.

The bond issue for the Tillamook PUD was approved, 2,168 to 1,525.

Wesley Schulmerich, the former Oregon State College athlete, won republican renomination as county commissioner. He bested Vern Ray Hushbeck, 1,329 to 1,134, in complete returns from the county's 37 precincts.

Portland Seeks Extra Session

Portland, May 20 (AP)—Multnomah county, thrown into a financial dilemma by yesterday's election, began proposing a special state legislative session today.

A special election will be called to re-consider the lighting proposal which was favored 1572 to 709.

A mayor race, run off at the same time, saw former Mayor Henry McKinney leading by a large margin. This vote is superceded by the city manager one, however, and McKinney won't serve.

Baby Rolls to Death As Car's Brakes Slip

Portland, May 20 (AP)—A two-year-old girl rolled to her death in a lake yesterday after a parked automobile's brakes slipped.

The car was on the shore of Wauna lake, Wash., as Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Eaton unloaded it. Their daughter, Carol Ann, was inside, when the car suddenly began to move. It splashed into deep water. The girl's body was not recovered for several hours.

Eaton is a former Pendleton resident. He is now with the department of agriculture in Portland.

Tooze Wins for Judge in County

Voters in Marion county with all 110 of the precincts in, gave Walter L. Tooze, present judge of the circuit court in Multnomah county, a 1,453 lead over Robert F. Maguire.

Tooze received 10,762 votes and Maguire, a Clackamas county resident and a judge on the Nazi war crimes trials, had 9,208 votes.

In third place with 3,484 votes was Austin Dunn of Baker county.

Empty Ballot Box Turned In

Roseburg, Ore., May 20 (AP)—Imagine the surprise to Douglas county election officials when they opened the ballot box from Tyee precinct yesterday and found it empty.

Officials said not a single ballot was cast in the little logging community 35 miles west of here on the Umpqua river highway in yesterday's Oregon primary election. The sparsely populated area lies in a valley deep in the heart of the coast range of mountains.

The bare ballot box was partially explained by County Clerk O. T. Carter. According to Carter, Tyee is a new precinct created at the first of the year along with 11 others in Douglas county.

Tyee residents formerly voted in Kellogg precinct, a polling place 10 miles away. Carter was unsuccessful in attempts to secure an election board and polling place in Tyee so he sent the ballot box to Kellogg where Tyee voters could cast their ballots.

Only one thing was wrong with the plan, the Tyee voters failed to show up at Kellogg to cast their votes.

Mayor of Ashland Recalled by Voters

Ashland, May 20 (AP)—The mayor and a city councilman were recalled from office in yesterday's election, a complete unofficial count of ballots showed today.

The voters recalled Mayor Thomas S. Williams by a narrow margin, 1300 to 1225. The recall of Councilman Elmer Sheldon was more heavily favored, 1544 to 946.

A citizen's committee had backed the recall move of the two city officials.

It will now be up to the city council to select replacements.

Farmers Cash Income Lower

Washington, May 20 (AP)—Cash income for the nation's farmers this year will be well under 1949 totals, the agriculture department said today.

Cash receipts from marketings in 1950 may total around \$25,000,000,000 compared with \$27,500,000,000 last year, the department forecast.

The reason? "Prices farmers receive for their products have generally been below those of a year ago, while their costs have declined only slightly," the department said. "This situation is expected to continue for the rest of the year."

Although there are some exceptions, most states showed a drop in the cash receipts their farmers received from marketings in the first three months of this year compared with the same period in 1949.

Iowa led all the states with \$520,624,000 received from January through March of this year. That was a drop, however, from the \$563,543,000 for the same three months in 1949.

A list of state totals for the three month period for 1949 and 1950 respectively included:

Idaho \$78,422,000 and \$85,008,000.
Washington \$122,171,000 and \$89,730,000.
Oregon \$62,667,000 and \$54,040,000.

Portland Public Housing Trailing

Portland, May 20 (AP)—Portland's proposed 2000-unit public housing program was trailing today with about one-fourth of the precincts reported.

Opposed were 13,467 votes and in favor were 10,800 on the complete, unofficial count from 125 of 533 precincts in the city.

The issue was hotly contested in the campaign. Opponents covered the city with a barrage of newspaper, radio and direct mail advertising.

UAL to Extend Its DC-4 Coach Service

Washington, May 20 (AP)—United Air Lines announced plans today to extend its Los Angeles-Oakland-San Francisco, Calif., coach service to Portland, Ore., and Seattle-Tacoma, Wash.

Subject to civil aeronautics board approval, the company said it would operate one daily round trip coach service between the California bay area and the Pacific northwest.

The new coach service would be conducted in 66-passenger DC-4 planes with a fare of approximately four cents a mile as compared with about six cents charged for standard service.
