He noted the rapid growth of the state and said:

"While we are developing let us not lose the things we cherish. Among these are our recreational facilities."

He mentioned the important place firemen hold in preservation of forests as well as lives and property in the cities.

"As I go about over the state," he said, "I see a need for a bigger staff for the state fire marshal." The governor praised the Keep Oregon Green movement, which, he said, saves the state \$2,500,000 a year.

Chief W. P. Roble of Salem reminded the visitors that windshield stickers have been provided for their cars, giving them extra parking privileges.

He mentioned the big Friday night banquet where admission will be by badge only. He asked for the hands of all women visitors who were to go on an excursion to Silver Creek falls Thursday afternoon and many responded.

Chief Roble introduced Jay Stevens of San Francisco, secretary of the Pacific Coast-Intermountain Association of Fire Chiefs; and William Meinheit, chief of the Berkeley, Calif., department, who will be the main speaker at the Friday night banquet; also William Batchelor of Pendleton, second vice president of the Pacific Coast-Intermountain association.

Peter Leinweber of Portland, president of the Oregon Fire Fighters association, asked for closer cooperation between fire fighters and chiefs.

S. P. Stevens, another vice president of the PC-I association, said a building up of civil service and a better pension system were necessary to a better fire protection service.

"We must get on the balls of our feet," he said, "and keep up with the growing state. There is no reason why firemen should not have the same hours of work as other activities."

Robert B. Taylor, state fire marshal and state insurance commissioner, said a better inspection service is needed in the state. "It is not our purpose," he added, "to force the work of our office on any local organization, but we want to work with you in every way. If you have any 'toughies' in your community you have trouble handling turn them over to us."

The morning session closed with a memorial service in honor of Oregon firemen who have died since 1946. Two Salem men, former Chief William Iwan, and Frank Freibert, were included.

Drawing much interest for the afternoon is a gadget contest, showing devices invented by local departments for better service. The Salem entry will be a periscope devised by Clyde Buckholz by which you can look under floor, around corners and over transoms.

The first day's convention will end with "Roble's Riot" at the Crystal Gardens Thursday night at 7 o'clock.

The plan of parking on West Summer would be just the opposite. This plan would provide for parking of 86 car spaces on the two streets or an increase of 30 cars.

The capital planning commission has recommended that two blocks north of Center street, bounded by Center, Winter, Marion and Capitol, be acquired by the state and used for off-street parking.

Two Blocks for Parking
In his report Baldock recommends, in the event the two blocks are purchased, the block bounded by Center, Summer, Marion and Capitol be cleared of all buildings, landscaped, paved and used for a parking area. This area, he reports, will provide room for approximately 400 parking spaces.

Baldock suggests that the second block be permitted to remain undisturbed until the property is needed for the expansion of state buildings.

Further suggestion is made in the report that the area between West Summer street and the alley between Center and Cheimeta street be used to provide off-street parking for approximately 35 cars. In the development of this area, which is the block on which the First Presbyterian church is located, Baldock points out that the dignified appearance of the capitol group could, perhaps, be retained by screen planting.

Mail Extension
In connection with the financing of extension of the mail to Center street, Baldock reports that the 1949 legislature appropriated \$113,000 from the general fund, plus \$37,000 from the state highway fund, for the purchase of property and extension of the mail.

Baldock in his report states that a large number of parking spaces in front of Willamette university could be made available if the university would provide off-street parking facilities for the students.

"Such action," Baldock said, "would be particularly helpful at this time."

The state highway engineer is opposed to the use of parking meters in the capitol zone, although he recommends parking meters for the off-street parking lot, if it is established. Placement of a few well-placed signs and follow-up enforcement is the method recommended for enforcement of the parking regulations.

McKinney

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Because all three members of the special committee were absent, and a bare quorum of the general committee was present, the committee adjourned immediately after hearing the report read by City Manager Franzen. The special committee members are Aldermen Armstrong, Maple and Fry.

The report recommended increases of \$10 a month across the board for all salaried employees except department heads for whom increases had already been made in the preliminary budget, some much more than \$10 a month. The report included two department heads, the city recorder and the city treasurer for whom no increase had been made in the preliminary budget.

Also the committee recommended an increase of 5 cents an hour in the pay of wage workers.

Labor Council Active
The committee has yet to contend with a move being made through the Salem Trades and Labor council to get the pay of firemen, policemen and water department personnel increased \$30 a month.

In a letter to the committee, signed by Herbert E. Barker, executive secretary of the trades and labor council, it is urged for fire and police department members an increase of \$30 a month in all ranks, pay for all work over regular time, and sick leave on the same basis as allowed the water department.

For the water department the labor council asks elimination of the cost of living adjustment which it would make a part of the regular wages. An increase of \$30 a month is requested, and for common labor in the department an increase from \$1.12 to \$1.25 an hour. The personnel of these departments are affiliated with the trades and labor council.

Increases Listed
Salary increases for city department heads now appearing in the preliminary budget are: Airport manager, \$4000 to \$4120 (recommended by salary committee); city attorney, \$5280 to \$5500; city judge, \$2760 no change; superintendent of parks and playgrounds, \$3600 to \$3900; health officer, city's share, \$2055 to \$2175 (recommended by salary committee); city librarian, \$3960 to \$4320; city engineer, \$4980 to \$6000; fire chief, \$4560 to \$5000; police chief, \$4800 to \$5240; city recorder, \$4800 to \$4920 (recommended by salary committee); city treasurer, \$4200 to \$4320 (recommended by salary committee).

The more than \$25,000 increase in salaries recommended by the committee is off-set by deductions from miscellaneous items throughout the budget.

The budget committee will meet again Monday night.

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Halley, who served as counsel for the senate investigating committee when it was headed by Mr. Truman, sat in on the conference.

In response to questions, Kefauver said there was no discussion with Mr. Truman as to what cities the committee might pick for inquiries. He said there was no discussion of Kansas City or any other particular locality.

He mentioned Miami, where hearings were conducted recently, as an indication of a city where the committee received cooperation.

"Our field is the continental United States," Tobey said.

The chairman said earlier that the committee already has uncovered a business link between Florida and California gamblers. Kefauver told a reporter that Mickey Cohen of Los Angeles and John O'Rourke of West Palm Beach, Fla., have been doing business "over a long period of time."

Both Cohen and O'Rourke, the senator said, are known to be linked with bookmaking and gambling operations.

Kefauver made his statement shortly before the five man committee went to the White House to discuss with President Truman the investigation of big time gambling and crime.

This evidence of the Cohen-O'Rourke ties, Kefauver said, was obtained by the committee last week-end in a hearing at Miami, Fla.

The Miami investigation was reported to have proved a gold mine of information for the committee. It provided tips which are certain to lead the investigators into other cities throughout the country.

Mr. Truman also asked special stand-by authority to use some of the money to help countries not specifically mentioned—in case of a serious emergency affecting the security of the United States.

In this connection, the report said:

"With the continuation of Soviet probes for weak spots in the security structure of the free world, emergency situations of this character may well arise and require prompt and positive action by the United States."

The report said that the money for China would be used to expand or continue programs "directed toward furnishing essential equipment, training and other assistance to the non-communist forces in this area that are now engaged or in danger of becoming engaged, in active conflict with militant communist elements which are endeavoring to seize control."
