69 Douks Get 3 Years in Jail

Convicted of nude parading, 69 members of the Sons of Freedom branch of the Doukhobor sect were sentenced at Nelson, B. C., yesterday to three years in prison. It brought to more than 250 the number imprisoned in recent weeks.

Involved in the latest court action were 42 men and women arrested Tuesday at Krestova. The others were taken into custody Wednesday at Glade.

Still other Doukhobors stripped yesterday at Thrums and Perry Sliding, both in the central province. There were no arrests.

The jailings added to the crowding of jails at Nelson and Grand Forks. Others are housed in the Okalla prison farm near Vancouver.

Airtight Alibi Collapses Case

Pulaski, Va., June 2 (AP)—Slender, swarthy Paul Hufford, 27, charged with being the father of a 'teen-ager's' baby, gave one airtight alibi in court and the charge collapsed, commonwealth's Attorney Alton I. Crowell said today.

The state charged that Hufford was the father of a 19-year-old Wytheville girl's baby. The girl's name was not revealed.

Hufford listened calmly to the charges and to the girl's testimony that she and Hufford were intimate last July 6.

"It's impossible," Hufford said. "I'm a girl."

There was a brief pause while Hufford submitted to a medical examination in another room. Paul emerged as Pauline. The charge was promptly dropped.

Pauline Hufford told Crowell that her mother began dressing her as a boy when she was a baby and she had masqueraded as a boy ever since. She even dated girls—including the plaintiff.

Survey to Determine State Wage Policies

Jim Clinton, acting director of the Oregon state civil service commission, told members of the Salem Credit association Friday that questionnaires were being sent to northwest businessmen to aid the agency in establishing state wage policies.

He explained that some 1500 firms would be requested to list salaries of employees to enable the civil service commission to compare state wages with those of private enterprise.

Clinton said the survey would be made some six months before the start of the 1951 legislature so that the civil service recommendations could be ready for consideration.

Recommended state wages are expected to be built on comparisons with average private wages.

Votes in Lebanon Follow State Trend

Lebanon—Local voting followed the general state trend in the primaries, and patterned closely the county vote of local measures.

Wayne Downing, running for re-election as county commissioner, scored a sweeping victory in Lebanon, piling up 485 more votes than his closest competitor.

Harvey Wight was returned to office as justice of the peace in a close race with Attorney M. C. Moynihan. It was a write-in contest, since Wight had declined to file for re-election. Wight polled 37 votes, only three more than Moynihan.

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Spud Growers Kick on Imports

Washington, June 2 (AP)—Domestic potato growers urged the government today to grant no further concessions to Canada on potato imports in the negotiation of new reciprocal trade agreements.

At a hearing before the inter-departmental committee on reciprocity information, gathering data for use by the trade agreements committee at an international conference at Torquay, England, next September, industry spokesmen urged instead that:

1. Present quota and tariff regulations on Canadian potato imports be more rigidly enforced, or,
 2. That a specific quota be placed on imports.
- Under the present treaty, importers of Canadian potatoes must pay a duty of 37½ cents a bushel on the first 2,000,000 bushels of seed potatoes and the first 1,000,000 bushels of table stock (eating) potatoes. Imports above these quotas have a 75 cents a bushel duty.
- Domestic producers contend present duties, because of lower labor costs and taxes in Canada, constitute only a slight barrier to imports and that Canadian potatoes are able to undersell American-grown spuds which receive a price support from this government.
- They complained also that Canadians are shipping seed potatoes to this country for sale as table stock, taking advantage of the larger quota for this variety.

Women's Clubs Elect Officers

Boston, June 2 (AP)—Lively balloting featured elections for three high offices last night at the 59th annual convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Runoff elections were required for two of the posts—second vice president and recording secretary—when no candidate received a majority.

Mrs. Theodore S. Chapman of Jerseyville, Ill., defeated Mrs. Earl B. Shoemith of Paso Robles, Calif., for the second vice presidency. The vote was 529-402.

Mrs. Leonard J. McCaffrey of Miami, Fla., was elected recording secretary as she polled 561 votes to 357 for Mrs. William B. Chandler of Hillsboro, Ore. The initial balloting eliminated Mrs. William B. Fowler of Memphis, Tenn.

A federation director for 13 years, Mrs. R. I. C. Prout of Wakefield, Mich., was elected treasurer on the first ballot. She defeated Mrs. C. Whitfield Gowrie of New Haven, Conn., 870 to 634.

Elected without opposition were Mrs. Hiram C. Houghton of Red Oak, Ia., president, and Mrs. Oscar A. Ahlgren of Whiting, Ind., first vice president.

MacArthur Plot An 'Absolute Fake'

Tokyo, June 2 (AP)—A top American official said today occupation headquarters had received Japanese reports of a plot to assassinate General MacArthur but he called them "an absolute fake."

The plot story was told by a Japanese policeman. The source said the police had arrested a Japanese who "apparently was a fanatic"—a man who thinks everyone is against him.

The informant, who declined use of his name, said headquarters "refuses to accept this story as evidence of a plot" against MacArthur.

He said no extra guards or other precautions had been assigned to MacArthur.

Smuts Gravely Ill, Heart Condition

Pretoria, South Africa, June 2 (AP)—Field Marshal Jan Christian Smuts is gravely ill, informed quarters said today.

They said the condition of the 80-year-old former South African prime minister is far more serious than daily bulletins from his home indicated.

Smuts' heart has been strained severely by sciatica and pneumonia and his condition is causing his doctors grave concern, these sources said.

A bulletin at noon conceded his heart was strained "owing to a general loss of strength." It said his condition generally was unchanged.

London understood that Smuts also is suffering from coronary thrombosis. Three doctors, including a Capetown medical professor held consultations at Smuts' farm.

Fire Destroys Klamath Mill

Klamath Falls, June 2 (AP)—The planing mill of the Spangler Lumber company at Bly burned to the ground early last night.

Bill Hayden, plant manager, said the blaze apparently started from sparks from a burner. The company's sawmill and other buildings at the mill site were not endangered by the flames.

Hayden said he was unable to make an estimate of the money damage and that the planer was partially insured.

Only two men had been working in the planer, readying it for operation Monday at which time about 15 men would have been employed. The Spangler company, owned by William Spangler of Klamath Falls, resumed operations May 2 after being closed for about a year.

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Most States to Face Deficits

Increased financial demands now being faced by the state of Oregon are similar to those in other states according to Harry Dorman, state budget director Friday. Dorman returned from Boston where he attended the annual convention of budget directors.

Dorman reported that reports made at the meeting showed that not less than two-thirds of the states face financial deficits at the start of the next biennium, July 1, 1951, with several states short of funds to carry on activities during the remainder of the current biennium.

"This situation," said Dorman, "is due to increased cost of commodities, salary and wage increases, and capital outlays."

He added that some eastern and middle-western states are more fortunate than the Pacific coast states on capital outlay, because their states did not experience the population gains that the coast states did during the post-war period.

New Group to Prevent Fires

A new organization for the prevention of fire loss in Oregon had its birth in Salem Friday.

Meeting here jointly with the fire chiefs and the fire fighters of Oregon is the Rural Fire Protection District Directors association which elected its officers at the Friday forenoon session. They are:

Glenn Leininger, Park Rose, Portland, president; W. A. Morgan, West Slope, Portland, vice president; Harold Rosebraugh, Salem, secretary-treasurer; Lloyd R. Henry, Odell, and Leon E. Judd, Klamath Falls, directors.

The association will work for legislation for prevention of and protection from fire in rural communities.

To be considered later in the day was a resolution that would favor legislation authorizing the state fire marshal to zone the state and number the fire protection districts for better fire protection service.

School Budget Voted On in Salem Today

With 10 polling places in operation, registered voters of the Salem school district were passing judgment Friday on a budget that was several hundred thousand dollars in excess of the six percent limitation.

The polling places, which will be kept open until 9 p.m., are located in the Highland, new Washington, Grant, Englewood, Richmond, Lincoln, Leslie, Salem Heights and West Salem schools and the school administration offices on North High street.

Because of the growth of the district the school board has had to go to the voters for budget approval during the past few years.

Family Pickets Auto Union

Detroit, June 2 (AP)—At headquarters of the CIO United Auto Workers union comes up something new in picketing.

It's a family picket line—father, mother and two small sons—and the union is the target.

The father, John Shures, 31, an expelled UAW member, charges the union is keeping him from holding a job. The union denies that.

Shures and his family started picketing yesterday and he said they'd continued "until I get a job and the union reinstates me."

One son, John, 5, carried a placard saying "I need medical care but Reuther (Walter Reuther, NAW president) won't let my daddy work."

The other, Norman, 7, had a sign which said "We demand Reuther have our daddy reinstated to his job."

Mother Lucille marched along with them.

As explained by both sides the problem dates back to the end of the war.

At that time the big Willow Run bomber plant closed, and UAW local 50, which once boasted 40,000 members, dwindled to a handful.

Shures was local 50's treasurer. A UAW spokesman said he was expelled because he forced the UAW's international into a court fight over local 50's funds in connection with dissolution of the local.

The litigation, said the union spokesman, used up most of the funds about \$18,000. Also, he said, Shures has never appealed his expulsion through regular union channels.

Shures charged the union has had him fired from three jobs since.

The union denied that.

"It is not UAW policy to attempt to force workers out of jobs," said the spokesman.
