

Planes, 1,800 Hunt Girl, 3, Believed Kidnaped by Bear

Chateau Bigot, Que., June 5 (AP)—Planes aided 1,800 volunteers searching today for a three-year-old girl believed kidnaped by a bear.

Spurred by woodsmen's discoveries of bear tracks near her parents' summer home, soldiers, police, farmers, Boy Scouts and vacationers from miles around set out at daybreak to look for three-year-old Nicole Renaud. She was last seen at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Brig. Jean V. Allard, Quebec district military commander, took personal charge of the heavily-armed posse who called off the hunt last night and resumed at dawn with the aid of spotter planes.

Allard said bear claw marks were found on a tree about 1,500 feet from the cottage where little Nicole spent the week-end.

Other tracks of the bear were found in the area, indicating the child may have toddled into the arms of one of the beasts scavenging the swampy district for food.

There was only one clue to her fate. It was a scrap of clothing, from her freshly-ironed play dress.

Allard called for extra reserves from Valcartier army camp today to bolster manpower which yesterday included some 1,500 civilians from surrounding districts, 150 Boy Scouts from nearby Quebec City, provincial policemen and as many soldiers as he could muster.

State May Run Astoria Ferry

The state highway commission was to meet here today (1 p.m. PDT) to try to work out details by which the commission would take over operation of the strike-bound ferry across the mouth of the Columbia river.

The commission planned to meet with T. R. Williams, president of the Astoria Navigation company, which has the contract to operate the ferry, which has been idle since last Thursday. The employees went on strike, demanding a 40-hour week at 48 hours pay.

The governor's office said "the commission probably will take over operation of the ferry because there's no other way to restore service."

The commission hoped to work out a deal with Williams under which the company would operate the ferries as an employee of the highway commission, instead of as a contractor. The employees said they would be willing to work for the state.

The company has been paying a penalty of \$346 a day for each day the ferry has been shut down.

Suspension of the ferry has halted traffic on the Coast highway between Oregon and Washington.

Snowplows Push Open Colo. Tourist Season

Grand Lake, Colo., June 5 (AP)—Snowplows gouged their way across the high-altitude trail ridge road in Rocky Mountain National Park Saturday officially opening the Colorado summer tourist season.

A few hardy motorists, with chains on their autos, followed the path broken by the snow plows.

A late-season snowstorm almost caused postponement of the annual ceremonies marking the opening of the scenic road, which crosses the Continental Divide and which is closed throughout the winter months.

Weather conditions normally are mild enough by early June for travel on the highway, but snow fell several nights ago in northern Colorado.

Two More Czechs Enter Guilty Pleas

Prague, Czechoslovakia, June 5 (AP)—Two more pleas of guilty were entered today in the treason trial of 13 Czechs charged with spying on behalf of the western powers.

Latest to plead in the trial that began last Wednesday were Dr. Zdenek Peska, professor of constitutional law at Charles university, and Vojtech Dundr, said the official account as broadcast by the Czech radio. The radio added:

Peska confessed that he worked against the uniting of the working class and tried to spread anti-state activities into the army. He told the court he prepared and distributed a large number of anti-state leaflets. As owner of an illegal radio transmitter he said he approached "American imperialists" for intervention in Czech affairs.

Poling Speaks To WU Grads

Dr. Daniel A. Poling of New York City, in delivering the baccalaureate sermon to Willamette university's graduating seniors at the First Methodist church Sunday afternoon told them that faith in God and themselves, combined with hard work were essential of success.

The minister urged the seniors to cooperate in maintaining the spirit of peace between all races, creeds and religions as they worked for the future. In this connection, Dr. Poling brought into his address the incident of the four army chaplains who gave their lives to soldiers on a sinking transport during the second World War.

Dr. Poling's son was one of the chaplains who lost their lives. President G. Herbert Smith, read the scripture passage while Dr. Daniel H. Schulze, professor of German gave the invocation and benediction. The robed a cappella choir provided music.

Kenneth McCormick, Willamette graduate of 1928 and now editor and director of Doubleday and company, New York printers, will give the commencement address at 3 o'clock next Sunday afternoon in the campus gymnasium.

'New Look' of G.O.P. Called Crucial by Ives

Wingdale, N.Y., June 5 (AP)—The republican party must exploit the "new look" of progressive republicans who won last month's primary elections or die, Sen. Irving M. Ives, R., N.Y., said tonight.

Ives said that the victories of Gov. James H. Duff in Pennsylvania and Sen. Wayne Morse in Oregon are "unmistakable" signs. He spoke at the 18th annual convention of the Young Republican clubs of New York.

"The American people are and always have been a progressive people, Ives said. "Reaction they want none of, conservatism they want in a moderate amount; but, above all, they seek a party with a leadership which is realistic, possessed with common sense and able to recognize conditions and problems as they are."

If the republicans fail to realize this, the party will succumb to "the fate of the whigs and the federalists," he said.

Reserves Fly In Fine Weather

Naval Reserve pilots from Eugene and Corvallis a month ago broke all records at the Naval Air Facility with 101 hours in the air for their week-end.

Last Saturday and Sunday that group, whose week-end it was, broke their own previous record with planes at the facility in the air a total of 103.2 hours. However, they still fell short of the 119 hours flown by the Portland group during their week-end in May.

During the past week-end 41 pilots were flown and a total of 41 hops were made. Three more men were also cleared for flying, bringing the total now eligible to fly to 107 men.

Saturday planes from the Salem facility flew five men from Eugene into Salem for their training and returned them. Sunday eight men from Eugene were flown into Salem.

Vets Seek Share In Race Bets

A movement asking that the state's share of proceeds from certain horse and dog racing sessions go toward veteran rehabilitation and service work has been inaugurated by the Military Order of the Purple Heart.

A resolution asking for a state law to that effect was passed at the annual state convention of the MOPH in Salem Sunday.

The proposed law would permit special "Veteran Benefit days" every 10th racing day, or add 10 days to the racing season for veteran aid purposes.

The resolution is not a project of the MOPH alone. Aiding in the drawing up of the resolution were committee members from the Oregon departments of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, United Spanish War Veterans, and Marine Corps League.

E. G. Johnson of Portland was named department commander of the MOPH during the convention, while William Exline, commander of Salem chapter 305, was elected vice-commander. Other officers elected included Stanley Boehmer, Salem, inspector, and Verne Ostrander, Salem, deputy chief of staff.

Governor Douglas McKay, a member of the Salem chapter, spoke to the group during a Sunday morning business session.

Sullivan Heads 20-30 District

A district convention of 20-30 clubs, meeting in Salem Sunday, elected William J. Sullivan, past president of the Salem club, as president. He succeeds Robert Cross of McMinnville.

Expansion of the organization was urged in a talk at a Sunday morning breakfast meeting by Loren Ebert, a trustee of the 20-30 club at Martinez, Calif. He directed an educational program participated in by most of the 75 members present from Oregon and northern California.

As its main project for the coming year the convention adopted the Keep Oregon Green program.

Klamath Falls was chosen as the place for the next district convention which will be next January. The meeting here lasted through Saturday and Sunday.
