Frederick S. Bynon, Sr. Passes at Local Hospital

Frederick Silas Bynon, Sr., an assistant attorney general with the Oregon state insurance department for 17 years, died Monday night at a local hospital.

Bynon, who the first of June retired from his position with the attorney general's office, died from a heart ailment. He had been in ill health for the past year but did not become seriously ill until Monday, when he was taken to a local hospital.

The son of Alfred Augustus Bynon, a newspaper man, and Marcella Rand Bynon, Frederick Bynon was born at Oakland, Calif., December 3, 1870, and resided in Oakland and Alameda, Calif., until 1878 when he came to Portland, Oregon, with his family to reside.

His education was received in the public schools of Alameda, Oakland and Portland and then he returned to Alameda, Calif., where for a time he read law. At the age of 20 he returned to Oregon and came to Salem to enter Willamette University, where he received his law degree.

September 5, 1891, Bynon was married in Salem to Stella Mitchell, who survives him.

Active in the republican party all of his life, Bynon in 1912 was a delegate to the National Republican convention. He also served as secretary of the Salem Commercial club in 1915.

Bynon, who was the first city clerk of Hollywood, Calif., was the last surviving charter member of the Hollywood Masonic lodge and was a past master of that lodge. He is a member of the First Baptist church of Salem.

A son, the late Sen. Allan Bynon of Portland, preceded his father in death four years ago.

Surviving besides the widow are three daughters, Marcella Von Gortler of Seattle, Edith Low of Brookings, Oregon, and Lois Stewart of Klamath Falls; and two sons, George Bynon and Fred Bynon, Jr., of Salem; 12 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Clough-Barrick chapel Friday, June 9, at 10:30 a. m., with concluding services at the Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum.

Marshall Again Heads Red Cross

Washington, June 6 (AP)—President Truman today reappointed Gen. George C. Marshall as head of the American Red Cross for a three-year term beginning June 12.

All members of the board of governors of the Red Cross were reappointed for similar terms except Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer who was replaced by Interior Secretary Oscar L. Chapman.

The change was made because the interior department is more concerned with disaster work than the commerce department.

Perjury Forfeits U. S. Citizenship

Portland, Ore., June 6 (AP)—Perjury in seeking citizenship is ample ground for revoking that citizenship, Federal Judge James A. Fee ruled here in sentencing Gus John Carles yesterday.

In a case similar to that of Harry Bridges, west coast longshore leader, Carles was convicted by a federal court jury of having lied in his petition for naturalization. Bridges was similarly convicted in San Francisco but sentence has not been imposed.

Judge Fee revoked Carles' citizenship and sentenced him to 15 months in prison.

Immigration Inspector Roy Norene said Carles likely would be deported to his native Greece at the expiration of his sentence.

In his citizenship application Carles, 54, a restaurant chef, said he had never been arrested. Immigration agents testified he had been arrested in San Francisco on grand larceny and state prohibition law violation charges and in Seattle had been sentenced to prison for forgery.

Deputy District Attorney Floyd Hamilton told the court he was unable to find specific authority in naturalization laws for revocation of citizenship because of perjury in the application. Judge Fee said, however, that power was held by the court.

Hamilton said today that both Bridges and Carles were indicted under the same statute. As a rule, he said, citizenship revocation is based on a special proceeding rather than as part of a criminal charge.

Californians Pick Candidates

San Francisco, June 6 (AP)—Voting ranged from light to "very heavy" as Californians today made primary nominations for governor, U. S. senator and lesser offices.

Chief interest centered on these races:

James Roosevelt, democrat, trying to dethrone two-time republican Gov. Earl Warren—first man ever to seek California's high office a third time. The winner will be projected into the national political spotlight. Warren was a vice presidential nominee two years ago. Roosevelt is starting a political career. Friends say he hopes eventually to reach the White House. His father, the late FDR, carried California each of the four times he ran.

Red-baiting republican Rep. Richard Nixon vs. democratic Rep. Helen Gahagan Douglas and democratic publisher Manchester Boddy for the U. S. senate. The race virtually was an anti-Truman GOP against two Fair Deal democrats. Retiring Sen. Sheridan Downey, democrat, endorsed Boddy.

Warren won both nominations two years ago. Some friends are betting he will again today. The governor was silent.

Congressional races will determine whether democrats can overturn the republicans' 12-11 majority.

"This is one day I can rest from talking," Warren said as he voted in a garage at Oakland.

Roosevelt voted at an artist's home in Beverly Hills—in a precinct an election official said had gone republican throughout the past decade.

Ernest Rostel Dies at Hospital

Ernest A. Rostel, for the last four years a special writer and photographer with the travel bureau of the state highway department, died shortly before noon Tuesday at Salem General hospital where he had been ill for several weeks.

Rostel, known widely in the northwest as newspaper and publicity man, was an Oregonian by birth. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Rostel, pioneers of Jacksonville, Ore. His place of birth was Central Point, in 1907.

For some years he was affiliated with the Mail-Tribune at Medford. He then entered the national park service, and was in that service for 13 years. During the war he was on the Atlantic coast as publisher of the Hartford County Gazette at Bel Air, Maryland.

Returning west he was for a short time city editor of the Morning Tribune at Lewiston, Idaho. Four years ago he returned to Oregon and joined the travel bureau of the highway department where he did special writing.

His last assignment was one of which he was especially proud, and which he was able to complete before his death. This was the preparation of a pamphlet for the pioneer museum at Jacksonville.

He was married in 1935 to Margaret Hensley of Stayton, newspaperwoman, who at the time was with the Mail-Tribune at Medford. She survives him.

He also is survived by a brother, Bert of Central Point.

Services are to be announced by the W. T. Rigdon company. Interment will be in the Pioneer cemetery at Jacksonville.

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Kootenai River Rises 2 Feet

Spokane, June 6 (AP)—The Kootenai river touched the 25-foot level at Bonner's Ferry, Idaho, today, a rise of almost two feet overnight.

An 18-inch increase forecast tomorrow by the weather bureau would bring the stream close to its earlier peak of 27 feet, four feet below flood stage. But cold air moved into the region yesterday. It was expected to reduce the heavy runoff from mountain snow fields in the next two days.

The Flathead river in Montana reached a point where it could do damage to low-lying crop lands near Columbia Falls if the rise continued. Weatherman Robert McComb said the area lies near the snowfields

McCarthy Offers Red Spy Data

Washington, June 6 (AP)—Senator McCarthy told the senate today an FBI chart lists as communist agents at least three persons "still holding high position in the state department."

McCarthy, Wisconsin republican, said the document was prepared by the FBI three years ago.

As of May 15, 1947, he declared, "there were in the state department a total of 124 agents, communists, sympathizers, and suspects, in the opinion of the FBI."

McCarthy said a photographic copy of the document he produced in the senate "is based upon state department files."

McCarthy did not say just who prepared the document, but that paper said:

"The FBI has prepared a chart, now in the possession of (name blanked out), which purports to show a number of 'agents,' 'communists,' 'sympathizers,' and 'suspects' in the state department as of May 15, 1947. The tabulation shows: agents 20, communists 13, sympathizers 14, suspects 77."

"(Name blanked out in documents) states that by July 12 (the date of my interview), the number had been reduced to the following: agents 11, communists 10, sympathizers 11, suspects, about 74."

McCarthy then declared: "At least three of those listed as communists by the FBI three years ago are still holding high positions in the state department."

Snow in Central Oregon
