

Western Union Wires Seized

St. Louis, June 7 (P)—Investigators reported yesterday that confidential files seized in a raid on a national betting headquarters told of extensive wagers being handled through Western Union managers.

Copies of thousands of telegrams and letters were obtained in the Monday night raid. Police arrested Sidney Wyman and Steve Montefelice.

Prosecuting Attorney Stanley Wallach of St. Louis county called Wyman a "current kingpin of the gambling fraternity."

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said the files showed Western Union managers were offered 25 percent of the winnings at the end of the month, after deducting expenses for wire charges and form sheets.

The betting commissions making the offer were listed as C. J. Rich & company.

In New York City, the Western Union Telegraph company said its instructions prohibited employees from accepting "gifts, commissions or gratuities from betting officials or other similar establishments."

Wyman and Montefelice were released on \$1,000 bond each to answer any charges that may be filed against them.

The raid was based on information Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll of New Jersey gave to Gov. Forrest Smith of Missouri.

A county grand jury in Bridgeport, N.J., last Monday returned an indictment naming Wyman and three other St. Louis men.

Roosevelt and Warren Victors

San Francisco, June 7 (P)—California voters pointed the way today to a November runoff between Republican Earl Warren and Democrat James Roosevelt for the governorship.

Roosevelt, son of the late president, had a \$2,000 lead in the democratic count as returns began to pick up from yesterday's primary election. Warren, up for an unprecedented third term in California, got a tremendous margin of 330,000 on the republican ticket.

Both candidates crossed filed on the other's party. The 59 year old Warren won the democratic as well as republican nominations in the 1946 primary. That turned the nation's eyes on the big, smiling vote getter. He became the 1948 republican vice presidential nominee.

Only Third of Vote Counted But Roosevelt, a vigorous campaigner, drew heavily on the state's democratic registration with its 1,000,000 vote edge over the republicans. He showed strength throughout the state, but especially in democratic Los Angeles.

Here is the way the count stood on democratic returns from 6533 of the 18,022 total precincts: Roosevelt 315,429, Warren 263,846.

On the republican ticket, Warren amassed 368,900 votes to a scant 41,062 for Roosevelt. Thus, he put together a popular vote—the vote that will count in November—of 632,746 against his opponent's 356,491 on the two slates.

Dam Cuts Off Ocean Shipping

Pendleton, June 7 (P)—Army engineers do not plan to allow ocean shipping to go beyond The Dalles, according to Rep. Lowell Stockman. They said it is too late to change the depth of the canal at McNary dam.

Stockman took up the subject with Maj. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of engineers, at the request of E. B. Aldrich, Pendleton East Oregonian publisher.

In a letter to Aldrich, Stockman said that the army has oked a project for a 27-foot channel from Vancouver to The Dalles. Beyond that, a 14-foot channel with locks is planned over The Dalles, John Day and McNary dams.

The army told him it would be a long time before traffic from The Dalles to Pasco would be free for a canal for large vessels. The army said it would cost more to deepen the channel and the locks than profit could be expected to bring. They said the 14-foot channel will take care of heavy barges and vessels up to 12 feet.

Pick told Stockman that it was too late to make the locks deeper at McNary. They are al-

Raps Change in Silverton Road

Lowell E. Brown, president and plant superintendent of the Interurban Telephone company at Silverton, has written the Marion county court to issue a protest to the advocated change in the route of the Salem-Silverton highway.

The new plan would have the highway run on the north side of the tracks entering Silverton, to an intersection with James avenue.

Brown said in his letter that several logging and tank trucks making stops in Silverton would be forced to make a short turn from North Water street onto James avenue, should the proposed route be established.

Brown claimed that this would create a traffic congestion, and urges the court to study the situation.

Rostel Funeral Set for Thursday

Funeral services will be held at the W. T. Rigdon chapel Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Ernest A. Rostel, 43, special writer and photographer with the travel bureau of the state highway department, who died at a local hospital Tuesday morning.

Rev. M. A. Getzenander will officiate at the service assisted by Rev. Dudley Strain. Concluding services will be held in Jacksonville, Oregon.

Rostel, a native Oregonian, was widely known in the northwest as a newspaper and publicity man. He had been with the Medford Mail-Tribune, was publisher of the Hartford County Gazette at Bel Air, Maryland; and for a short time was city editor of the Morning Tribune at Lewiston, Idaho. He had been with the highway department travel bureau for four years.

Surviving Rostel are his wife, the former Margaret Hensley to whom he was married in 1935; and a brother, Bert Rostel of Central Point.

Gunman Kills Third Shelton

Fairfield, Ill., June 7 (P)—An unseen gunman today killed a third of the five Shelton brothers. For decades the Sheltons have waged gang war in Illinois.

Roy Shelton, about 59, was shot twice, then run over by the harrow and disk rig with which he had been cultivating his farm 12 miles southeast of Fairfield.

A farm hand, Frank McKibben, about 49, who was driving a second tractor about 100 feet away, was shot at twice when he went to Shelton's aid. McKibben was not hit.

Bullets struck Roy in the back and groin. He toppled from the tractor seat and his body was badly mutilated by the harrow and discs which passed over him.

For decades, three of the Shelton brothers had been central figures in gang warfare in southern Illinois. The notorious three were Carl and Bernie, now dead of ambush wounds, and big Earl who has twice recovered from such attacks.

The slaying of Roy was a surprise to Fairfield residents who said that he and Delta, 50, of Cisme, 14 miles to the northwest, had not been active in the Shelton gang. Both men have stuck closely to their farming.

Delta is the father of little Earl, 34, most recent target of assassins' guns. He escaped an ambush Monday, but his companion, Dellois Wylie, 35, was wounded by three slugs.

Say Lie Follows Red Party Line

Washington, June 7 (P)—Senator O'Connor (D-Md.) said today Trygve Lie, secretary general of the United Nations, "is definitely following the communist party line."

O'Connor sharply criticized Lie's new demand for settling the issue of Chinese representation in the UN.

"His recommendation is all in the interest of the Kremlin," O'Connor said in a statement just before leaving here for New York to head the U.S. delegation at the international labor conference in Geneva, Switzerland.

Russian delegates have walked out of many UN sessions because the nationalistic government of China continues to be represented. Russia wants the Chinese communists admitted to the UN.

O'Connor said that Lie, while calling for a special session of the UN security council, "had previously announced that the Soviet union would not participate unless a representative of communist China would attend."

"Lie is merely mouthing Stalin's position which, to put it tritely, is merely saying 'Let's all get together—and do as I say,'" O'Connor said.

Astoria Ferry Service Resume

Ferry service across the Columbia river between Megler, Wash., and Astoria was resumed at 6:30 a.m. today after being shut down since last Thursday.

State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said he did not know details of the agreement between the three striking unions and the Astoria Navigation company, which was to begin operating the ferry last Thursday under a two-year contract with the highway commission.

The company had a 48-hour ultimatum from the commission to get the ferry operating or the commission would take over operation. This ultimatum was to have expired at 3 p.m. today.

The unions asked for a 40-hour week at 48 hours' pay.

Storm Blasts California

San Francisco, June 7 (P)—High winds caused two deaths, numerous injuries and minor damage throughout northern California yesterday.

The weather bureau said the blustery weather would last through today with diminishing effect.

Dead were Melvin McCoy Hamilton, 29-year-old Forest Knolls tractor driver, and Harry Crowley, 56-year-old Princeton fisherman.

Hamilton was crushed to death by a falling redwood tree at LaGaunitas. Crowley drowned when wind and waves capsized a skiff in which he was trying to make the San Mateo shore from his fishing craft.

Snow and rain in the mountains was responsible for a Greyhound bus accident in which seven persons were injured. The San Francisco to Reno bus skidded onto its side at the Cape Horn curve east of Colfax.

Wind whipped a brush fire near Alum Rock park forcing 500 school children and 200 adults at a picnic to flee to safety. The flames were brought under control after burning over 300 acres.

The wind flipped over a light plane at Oakland airport and forced the grounding of all small aircraft.

Gov. McKay Fires Advertising Man

Portland, Ore., June 7 (P)—Showalter Lynch, advertising manager for Dave Hoover's campaign for the republican senatorial nomination last month, was dismissed as Gov. Douglas McKay's reelection campaign advertising manager Tuesday.

Lynch, who faced a \$50,000 lawsuit as a result of the Hoover campaign, said he received notification of his dismissal from W. L. Phillips, Salem, chairman of the governor's campaign executive committee.

Lynch said he believed the action came as a result of his work

Hamilton, O., June 7 (P)—Mufflers on power lawnmowers? Yes, says Councilman Edward Beckett. He suggests that something be done to compel owners of the motor-driven grass-cutters to equip them with mufflers.

Charles Schwalm, acting city manager, said persons making too much noise with motorized lawnmowers might be guilty of violating the general ordinance against noise. He promised to look into the matter.

McKay for Wild Life Program

Lakeview, Ore., June 7 (P)—A personal interest in keeping Warner Valley marshlands for waterfowl production was expressed here last night by Gov. Douglas McKay.

Here with other state officials on a state board tour, the governor told a dinner audience of landowners, sportsmen and federal and state agency men his sympathy was with the game commission's program for the valley.

The land board is expected to make a decision on whether the valley marshlands, long famed as a nesting area for migratory waterfowl, will be kept in their natural state or some of the acreage reclaimed for crop land.

"We want to develop this state, and yet we want to keep it as we know it—as the cleanest state of all for enjoyment of all outdoors," the governor said.

In Hoover's unsuccessful campaign and added that the committee's action was "hard to understand."

\$100,000 Fire In Oregon City

Oregon City, June 7 (P)—A \$100,000 fire leveled the Columbia market on McLaughlin boulevard at the north entrance to Oregon City this morning.

Traffic was disrupted as six fire companies laid hose across the highway.

Despite the intense heat, firemen saved the Rancho, an open air market only five or six feet from the destroyed building.

George Alexander, manager of the market for Columbia Food Stores of Portland, said the building owner, Carlos Johnson, had completed remodeling the structure at a cost of \$10,000 only a few months ago.

Also housed in the building was an Ann Palmer bakery.

Fire Chief Roscoe Locke said the alarm was turned in about 5:15 a.m. and when firemen arrived the entire interior was ablaze. Water then was concentrated on the adjacent market in a successful effort to save it.

Fighting the fire were three trucks from Oregon City and equipment from Gladstone, Milwaukie and West Linn.

Electrical wiring at the rear of the building was believed the cause.

Rent Controls Lifted In Gresham by Request

Washington, June 7 (P)—Housing expediter Tighe E. Woods announced rent controls would be lifted today from Gresham, Ore., on the basis of local action.

White Tells of Latin America

That communism is not making much progress in Latin America but is concentrating on the trade unions and the education field, was the statement of Ivan White of the state department at Washington, D. C., during a discussion of foreign relations during Wednesday's Salem Rotary club luncheon.

White, former Salem resident, was introduced by his uncle, D. W. Eyre. He expressed the belief that relations with Latin America may be built up to the point that the countries of South America may play a much larger part in our economy than was the case during the recent world war.

In touching upon trade agreements with the south, White said that 17 reciprocal agreements have been reached which means that imports and exports just about balance each other. Private capital has entered Latin America to the extent of some four billion dollars, a sum much greater than that provided through governmental agencies.

White stated that immediate result of present day negotiations cannot be expected but that the returns must come over a decade or more.

Guests of Wednesday's luncheon were seven young people who are now attending Willamette university under scholarships provided by Salem Rotarians.
