London, June 8 (AP)—King Farouk of Egypt put off marriage to young Nourhan Sadek only because his closest advisers warned him it would mean the end of his dynasty, the weekly Picture Post said today.

Fire Destroys U of M Hall

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 8 (AP)—Priceless records and the work of years of research were destroyed in a fire which swept the University of Michigan's historic Haven Hall Tuesday.

The university estimated that to replace the 87-year-old building would cost \$3,500,000. One fireman was injured. Five student volunteer fire fighters were overcome by smoke.

The blaze was first noticed on the roof in late afternoon. Four hundred students taking final examinations in the building fled outside safely.

Haven Hall, one of the university's oldest buildings, housed the institution's bureau of government library. The library was destroyed. Also destroyed were records of the sociology department and history department.

The cause of the fire was undetermined. However, state fire marshals had warned that the building was a hazard because of its age.

Construction of Haven Hall was begun in 1883 and completed in 1885. It was named for Dr. O. E. Haven, the university's second president.

War Brides Have Rough Air Trip

Bovington, England, June 8 (AP)—A flying nursery left California six days ago landed here Wednesday with it disgruntled, weary load of 40 war brides, 35 children, and seven husbands.

All were dishevelled. Most were irate at air travel technicalities which shuttled their airliner—chartered to bring former British women married to Americans back with their children for an English holiday—from California to Connecticut, then to Miami, Havana, and Newfoundland before crossing the Atlantic.

Many of the children were ill, and were crying as their mothers carried them from the plane. Two stewards, assigned to care for the group en route, sighed with obvious relief as the voyage ended.

The ordinarily simple flight from California to England had been complicated and delayed by an international dispute over landing rights for the chartered airliner.
