

Dispute Stymies Shady Lane Plan

Residents living on Shady Lane, in the Hicks-Jones and Arnold subdivisions, will have to wait until at least sometime in July for improvements on their road.

A second hearing on the subject was held before the Marion county court at the courthouse Saturday morning, and once again the matter was laid on the table.

The project is stymied by disagreement among residents of Shady Lane avenue on whether or not the road improvements should include an asphalt surface.

There are 44 pieces of property adjoining the avenue, and owners of 18 of those pieces of property are opposed to an asphalt surface. They would rather have a gravel surface.

Their opposition to the black-top is because of the much greater cost in laying that type of service. An estimate made by County Surveyor A. D. Graham indicated that persons owning property along Shady Lane avenue would be assessed \$1.83 per ownership foot.

Shady Lane avenue is 5,870 feet long, and the total cost of improvements, including asphalt was estimated at \$9,450.

The matter has been continued until July 7, at which time there will be another hearing.

Cracking Down on Japan's Reds

Tokyo, June 10 (AP)—Life grew increasingly complex today for Japan's communists, already staggered by two purges of their top strategists.

On one side, the Chinese Red Peeping radio—a link in the line to Moscow—urged them to "deal effective counterblows" to the purges ordered by General MacArthur.

On the other side, the government cracked down wherever the communists raised their voices in public criticism of the U. S. occupation. Cabinet members and both rural and Tokyo police officials met with Premier Shigeru Yoshida to consider stronger measures.

Meanwhile, a new plot against MacArthur's life—the second in 10 days—was reported and airily brushed aside by key American officials. They called it another "fake"—like the last.

Informants said a letter was intercepted two days ago, mentioning vaguely a plan to kill the supreme commander. The address was false and the author remained a mystery.

"Nobody at headquarters takes it seriously," an official said, "somebody is crying wolf." A Japanese arrested June 1 after babbling details of an alleged plot to kill MacArthur has been sent to a mental hospital. PG 1—7—Giant Gorrilla—

Car Owner Sees Red

Chicago, June 10 (AP)—William G. Gibson, 46, a salesman, saw red—fire engine red—when he went to get his car in a parking lot yesterday.

Gibson had left his car for parking purposes only. But someone—police did not determine who—applied a paint job to his quiet gray model. It now is a bright red. The paint had been applied with an expert touch, apparently with a paint sprayer. The chromium finish and windows had been taped to protect them from the spray.

Langlie Calls Extra Session

Olympia, June 10 (AP)—Governor Langlie today called a special session of the Washington legislature to convene at 11 a.m. (PDT) July 17.

The legislators were summoned back for the specific purpose of considering "the necessary appropriations for the operation of state government."

The extraordinary session, sixth in the state's history, was called in a proclamation which stated an emergency existed because of the state's financial crisis.

The governor blamed the crisis on initiative 172, "which has added millions of dollars to the cost of public welfare in this state."

The governor said that although he specified the purpose for convening the legislature, he would not "presume to dictate in any way what their course of action should be."

The proclamation said the state's general fund "is completely exhausted and certain public welfare appropriations will soon be exhausted."

The major immediate problem, however, which will face the legislators is the fact that the appropriation for the general assistance portion of the state's welfare program is running out.

When exhausted, spending for general assistance must stop unless the legislature authorizes more money or emergency funds are found.

The general fund was \$15,000,000 in the red when books were balanced as of April 30, State Budget Director Ernest Brabrook reports.

Board to Act On Blind School

The state emergency board will meet in Salem June 24 to consider a request for an appropriation of \$80,000 for construction of a school at the state blind school in Salem.

Lowest bid for the school was \$334,000 which was \$34,000 in excess of money available in the state building fund. An additional \$30,000 is estimated for engineering costs, inspection and incidentals.

Other requests for appropriation from the emergency fund to come before the board include a new elevator in the state supreme court building and additional funds for the law revision council authorized by the 1949 legislature.

Plan City Ban On Cutting Trees

Alderman Tom Armstrong will have for introduction Monday night a bill revising the city's policy relative to removal or alteration of trees in public places.

The bill, which will be a combination of new provisions with existing ordinances, makes it unlawful for anyone to injure or remove trees from any property controlled by the city without first getting a permit.

Application for a permit must be made to the city manager. Unless the tree is considered dangerous the consent of the person in front of whose property it is located must be obtained before removal. This approval is not necessary if the tree is only to be trimmed to permit the passage of utility wires or other facilities.

Applicant for removal of a tree must pay a fee of \$1.50 which shall be credited to a special fund for the planting of trees in public places.

The bill does not apply to trees on private property, or to those in public parks where removal is considered in the public interest by the city manager or the park superintendent, or to removal by the city in streets, alleys or public ways necessary for public improvements.

If application for removal is denied the applicant may appeal to the city council.

Any tree, bush or shrub projecting over a street level or over a sidewalk less than seven feet above street level is declared to be a nuisance.

Hoover Upsets Guild FBI Plot

Washington, June 10 (AP)—Director J. Edgar Hoover has publicly nailed the campaign of the communist-infiltrated National Lawyers Guild to destroy the FBI.

In testimony last February before a house committee now made public, Hoover said the Lawyers Guild had been campaigning to "weaken" and "harm" the FBI. More specifically, the Guild wants Hoover fired.

Hoover said the campaign against him and the FBI began 10 years ago. He and others call the Guild a communist front. Earl Browder, one time head man here of the communist party, calls it a communist transmission belt. It has an almost perfect record of supporting the communist party line.

Hoover now has his own FBI agents inside the communist party. He steadily is bringing about arrest and conviction of communist agents, spies and saboteurs.

American communists regard Hoover as a dangerous enemy, second only to the Catholic church. Their eagerness to get rid of him is for obvious reasons.

Horses Perish in Fire

Chicago, June 10 (AP)—A watchman perished and between 17 and 22 racing horses burned to death last night in a fire which destroyed the huge barn on the Emil Denmark farm near suburban Hinsdale. Denmark estimated the loss at \$700,000.

Strike Cuts Off Pittsburgh Milk

Pittsburgh, June 10 (AP)—Hospitals, orphanages and homes for the aged are about the only places where milk is being delivered today in Pittsburgh and nearby communities.

A strike of 3,250 milk and dairy workers has cut off other deliveries to some 2,500,000 western Pennsylvanians.

After the walk-out at midnight Thursday the Allegheny County Medical association made a special arrangement with the striking AFL milk and ice cream driver salesmen and dairy employees, local 205, to provide milk on an emergency basis for babies formulas, invalids and others.

Main issues in the strike are wages, commissions and vacation improvement, an industry spokesman said.

Although exact contract demands have not been disclosed, the union says it wants a 40-hour week instead of the present 48-hour week with no reduction in pay.

The drivers, now guaranteed \$60 a week, also want to be reimbursed for commission cuts. Negotiations continued all-day yesterday but without bringing an agreement. The union's contract expired May 1.

Mr. President, It Depends on Your Politics

Columbia, Mo., June 10 (AP)—There was the piano and there was President Truman—and it didn't take any coaxing to get them together.

Mr. Truman played two numbers and then he and his sister, Mary Jane, joined in a duet of the "Jennie Lind Polka." He said he taught it to both his sister and daughter.

The president joked to reporters afterwards: "Just think how much better off the country would have been if I had been a music hall pianist."

Lightning Storm 5

Portland, June 10 (AP)—A violent lightning storm knocked a telephone from the wall at one house here last night. Another bolt set fire to a roof, but the storm promptly put the flames out with heavy rain.

Power was disrupted in scattered sections of the city. Telephone service also was interrupted.

Renew Rioting at Enka Plant

Morristown, Tenn., June 10 (AP)—A report of a rock-throwing ambush of workers' automobiles by an unruly mob brought 30 additional highway patrolmen today to the strike-bound American Enka Corp., rayon plant.

Patrol Sgt. Carl Gilbert said a caravan of 12 cars carrying workers from the plant after the midnight shift was set upon by a stone-throwing mob of 75 to 100 men. He added that one car was overturned and one workman slightly injured by flying glass.

Enka attorney T. W. Iserman of New York said at the scene it was probably the "most violent episode" of a turbulent, 10-week-old labor dispute at the plant.

The outbreak had subsided by the time the new patrol detail rolled in to reinforce eight already here. Joe Q. Dougherty, Enka public relations director, reported the 7 a. m. shift change was "about the quietest we've

40 War Brides Off for Europe

Seattle, Wash., June 10 (AP)—A chartered DC-4 loaded with sleepy kids, war brides and a few husbands took off from Boeing field at 12:01 (PST) today on "Operation Reunion."

Their destination was London. They will use three airlines on the trip.

All told, there were 40 war brides—including some from World War I—21 babes in arms, 14 youngsters under 12 years in age, three husbands, four pilots, two stewardesses, and a purser aboard the Trans-Ocean Air Lines plane that left here.

Their departure was thrice delayed. Twice it meant a wait of days because landing rights had been denied in England.

Last night the four-engined plane was late in arriving from Oakland, Calif. Passengers, relatives and friends milled about until the plane arrived. Babies either dozed or bawled.

The heavily-loaded plane was scheduled to put down at the Chicago Midway airport for a breakfast and refueling stop and then continue on to Miami, Fla.

There, the 78 youngsters and adults will transfer to a National Air Lines plane which will carry them to Cuba. At Havana, they will shift to a Cuban Airlines transport, to head for Bovingdon airport, outside London, by way of Bermuda and the Azores.

Turbine Award To Baldwins

Award of a \$415,370 contract for supplying a 26,500 horsepower hydraulic turbine for the Big Cliff dam power house on the North Santiam river was made to the Baldwin Locomotive Works, Philadelphia.

This was announced by Col. Donald S. Burns, district engineer for the army engineers.

Big Cliff dam, on which construction is scheduled to begin in 1951, will be a re-regulating reservoir, located about 2½ miles downstream from Detroit dam, and is a part of the Detroit project.
