Need for Volunteers Told By County Red Cross Unit

Volunteers are the life blood of the American Red Cross. The thousands of chapters of the Red Cross throughout the country could not carry on their programs of service if they did not have groups of volunteer workers—because the Red Cross organization is of the community. It was founded as a volunteer organization. True, there are certain paid staff members to coordinate and organize the program of service, but the execution of that program of service is carried on by volunteers. If a Red Cross chapter were made up entirely of paid workers, there would be no chapter because no community could set up large enough budget to take

care of such expense and the purpose and meaning of Red Cross would cease—it is an organization of volunteers, giving service to fellow residents, and to the community in times of emergency, disaster and need.

Such is the message from the Red Cross office in organizing a no-host luncheon meeting Thursday noon at the Senator hotel, at which time effort will be made to reorganize the volunteer staff for the Marion county chapter.

Representatives from many women's organizations of the city have been invited to hear the plan of organization for volunteer workers to make the chapter program an effective one. Those who have not made their reservations are asked to do so by calling the Red Cross office.

Mrs. Kenneth Hall of Portland, area representative for volunteer services in the Red Cross—and a volunteer official herself—and Miss Katherine Little from the area office of the Red Cross, San Francisco, are to be guests at the meeting.

Needs of volunteer workers are found in all departments of the Red Cross here—for the blood program, staff assistants and office workers, for some gray ladies, for a group to carry on the recreational and entertainment programs in nearby veterans hospital, for the motor corps and for the canteen corps.

Mrs. Earl Snell, chairman of the volunteer services for the chapter, will preside.
