World-Telegram-Sun Still Strike Bound

New York, June 15 (AP)—The New York World-Telegram and Sun were strike-bound today for the third day.

Mechanical workers belonging to AFL craft unions again refused to cross picket lines set up by the New York newspaper guild (CIO), representing approximately 500 striking editorial and business office workers.

"We cannot get out a paper as long as they stay out," Lee Wood, executive editor, said. "Certainly there is nothing we can see at this time that is making toward a settlement of the strike."

Both management and strikers accepted a call to a mediation conference at 10 a.m. tomorrow at the offices of the federal mediation and conciliation service.

The strikers seek pay increases and other benefits.

St. Vincent Hospital Administrator Dies

Portland, June 15 (AP)—Mother Pascal, administrator of St. Vincent's hospital here and former head of St. Mary's training school for nurses in Walla Walla, died here yesterday after six weeks' illness.

The nun, who was born in Rimouski, Quebec, 65 years ago, had worked in the Pacific northwest since 1908. She helped found Sacred Heart hospital in Medford; administered St. Joseph's hospital in Fairbanks, Alaska; headed St. Mary's training school in Walla Walla; and between 1941 to 1947 served as provincial superior in charge of schools and hospitals in eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana. Five sisters—one also a nun at St. Vincent's—and three brothers survive.

Road to Learning Has 11,000 Miles

Douglas, Wyo., June 15 (AP)—14-year-old Jimmy Wilcox won his eighth grade diploma the hard way.

Jimmy has traveled more than 11,000 miles on horseback during the past eight years to attend school. That's equivalent to more than three trips from Boston to San Francisco, or almost half way around the world.

The Wilcox ranch is some 20 miles south of Douglas and except for a short period after the blizzard of '49 and a few other rare occasions, Jimmy has traveled the distance on horseback five days a week, eight months each year for eight years.

Washington, June 15 (AP)—The economic cooperation administration named 510 field counselors yesterday to help small manufacturers to share in the multi-million dollar Marshall plan business.

They are to advise on goods eligible for export under ECA funds.

Four were named for Oregon: Carter Brandon of the Portland Chamber of Commerce; Elwin H. Greenwood, executive secretary of the Oregon Bankers association, Portland; Robert R. McKean, manager of Columbia Empire Industries, Inc., Portland; and Clay Cochran, manager of the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

Howard E. Waterbury, district manager of the department of commerce, Portland, also will give aid.

Canadian Strike in Lumber Mills Averted

Vancouver, B. C., June 15 (CP)—A strike threat was lifted today from coastal timber stands, backbone of British Columbia's economy, when representatives of 32,000 coastal loggers agreed to contract proposals.

Agreement came none too soon. Loggers and millworkers were due to start walkout at the beginning of first day shifts. Settlement was announced at 12:30 a. m. (PDT).

The International Woodworkers of America (C.I.O.-C.C.L.) lost its down-the-line fight for a union shop. But the loggers and millworkers did win wage increases the 163 operators estimate will cost \$7,000,000 a year.

Veteran Navy Recruiter Back

Chief Commissary Stewart Verlin M. Coontz, who from May 1, 1946 to September 30, 1948, was on recruiting duty in Salem with the U. S. navy, this week returned to Salem to again report for recruiting duty here.

The chief, one of a group of veteran navy recruiters being recalled to Oregon for duty, when he left Salem in 1948 was sent to the Pacific for duty. He first saw duty in Guam and then went to Kajaaline.

In November, 1949, Coontz was returned to the States and sent to Treasure Island for duty. From there he was transferred to the USS Pollux, an AKA. He helped put the Pollux in mothballs and then was given duty at Hunter's Point with the Pacific Reserve fleet. He re-enlisted for his last six years with the navy there, and then was sent to Mare Island. From Mare Island the chief returned to the Oregon recruiting district.

The recruiter, a navy man since 1937, saw duty in both the Pacific and the Atlantic during World War II and wears nine battle stars.

Virginia City, Nev., June 15 (AP)—A providential rain early today saved this once sinful mining town from destruction by fire.

It came as flames raced through the tinder-like old wooden buildings and plank sidewalks. There wasn't much firemen could do because there was scarcely any water in the mains of this parched town.

Three old buildings, the Wells Fargo Express Co., post office and the old George T. Marye building, went up in crackling flames. They escaped the big fire of 1875.

The fire started from chimney sparks. A high wind was blowing. It whipped the flames from dry-seasoned board to board. It looked for a while like the whole old ghost town would be destroyed.

Then suddenly came the rain, a virtual cloudburst. Quickly the flames were snuffed out.

South African Reds Fight Outlaw Bill

Capetown, Union of South Africa, June 15 (AP)—A government bill to outlaw communist party activity raised a cry of despotism in parliament debate last night and set off clashes between club-swinging police and demonstrators outside parliament building.

The bill is up for a crucial second reading. Debate was interrupted while parliament members watched police charge into crowds demonstrating against the bill.

Justice Minister C. R. Swart argued that the bill is needed to prevent a Moscow campaign to set colored natives in trade unions and on the farms against the whites and establish a native republic with all race segregation barriers broken down.

A group of the 1,000 volunteer searchers, who spent the night combing the rugged Buckhorn mountain area, came upon the dog shortly after 7 a.m.

Yelping, the dog led them to little Clarence Swope, who wandered away from his six-year-old brother at 2 p.m. Tuesday as they trudged along a path to visit their father, who was working in a coal mine.

The search party found Clarence sitting on a log about 500 feet from the path "crying his eyes out." Although cold and wet, the boy apparently was well.
