

More Arrests Of Spies Near

Washington, June 17 (AP)—With three American citizens under arrest, additional pieces are falling into place in the jig-saw pattern of Soviet wartime spying in the United States.

By all indications, further arrests are in the offing, but when and where they will come, no one will say.

However, it is known that scores of FBI agents have spent many months putting together bits of information from a 11 sorts of sources in an effort to complete the picture.

What was perhaps the key piece of the spy puzzle fell into place with the arrest in London last February of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, a top British atomic scientist. Detained by British intelligence on information originally developed by the FBI, Fuchs admitted giving the Russians atom secrets and was sent to prison for 14 years.

After top G-men had interviewed Fuchs in prison last month, the bureau closed in on Harry Gold, 39-year-old Philadelphia chemist, who had long been under FBI watch. Gold admitted acting as a courier between Fuchs and Soviet agents in this country during the war.

With the pattern taking shape, the FBI this week picked up Alfred Dean Slack, 44, chemist employed by a paint manufacturing concern at Syracuse, N. Y., and David Greenglass, 28, former U. S. army sergeant of New York City.

Printers Highest Paid In Oregon Industry

Oregon's workers are making more money than ever before, the state unemployment compensation commission and the bureau of labor statistics reported today.

The average earnings of production workers touched an all-time high of \$1.75 an hour or \$68.79 a week in April in this state. In Washington state, the average was slightly lower: \$68.56.

Highest paid group in Oregon was printing and publishing, where workers averaged \$78.16 for a 35.3 hour week. Plywood employees came next, with \$74.97. The lumber industry as a whole paid out an average of \$72.68. That, too, was a record high.

Edison Aide Dies After Long Illness

Fulmer, England, June 17 (AP)—Alfred Clark, 77, who was associated with Thomas Edison in the development of the graphophone and inventor of devices for sound reproduction, died here yesterday after an illness of 20 months. He had been suffering from a circulatory disorder.

Born in New York, Clark was naturalized a British subject in 1928. He retired three years ago after serving many years as chairman of the Gramophone company, the Columbia Grama-

For Ana, although she dances at the plush Latin Quarter night club, insisted that she would never appear on TV wearing a plunging neckline.

Her remarks gave a novel twist to the current controversy over television's "Boom of the Bosom."

The first public criticism of the plunging neckline centered around Faye Emerson, former wife of Elliott Roosevelt. Miss Emerson retorted that her fan mail indicated her audiences liked her in her assortment of low cut gowns.

"Television is going 'bust happy' and while I work in TV occasionally, I want no part of it," Miss Van De Rovert opined.

She said over-exposure of the feminine anatomy via the new medium distracts from one's work.

"Sex in night clubs is one thing, but sex projected into the living room is another," she added. "Strapless gowns and daring necklines prompt questions parents don't want to discuss with their children."

"Furthermore, I know that if I wore a low-cut dress in front of the television cameras, part of my audience would resent it. And that resentment would last forever. I'd never be able to live it down."

Kootenai River Over Flood Stage

Bonnors Ferry, Idaho, June 17 (AP)—The Kootenai river edged over "the flood stage" here today but thanks to protecting dikes was kept away from this town of about 1200 and the 30,000 acres of rich wheat land nearby.

The river reached 31.1 feet today, .1 of a foot above the level considered "flood stage." Levees protecting the soil go up 35 feet. The town can withstand water up to 37 feet.

About 200 volunteers maintained a 24-hour watch on the dikes. Fifteen highway department trucks were hauling dirt to bolster weak spots.

The dirt will go into 34,000 sand bags sent yesterday by the army engineers. A state of emergency has been proclaimed here by Gov. C. A. Robins.

Weatherman Robert McComb at Spokane issued a flood warning for the Bonnors Ferry region and areas bordering on the boundary and flathead rivers.

The Kootenai is expected to continue inching its way to the top of the dikes today as the warm weather continues. The heat is melting record snow piles in the mountains.

Giant Shasta Dam Dedicated

Redding, Calif., June 17 (AP)—Assistant Secretary of the Interior William E. Warne formally dedicated Shasta dam today—a "monument to the people who have made California great."

The dam cost \$140,000,000. Next to Hoover dam, it is the highest in the world, and next to Grand Coulee, it is the largest in mass. It forms a lake containing 4,500,000 acre-feet of water. An acre-foot covers one acre of land with one foot of water. Its generating equipment can turn out 375,000 kilowatts of power. The length of the dam at the top is 3,480 feet.

The dedication makes official the virtual completion of the largest and most important single link in the Central Valley project.

In his dedication speech Warne said the Pacific Gas and Electric company "seeks a profit from the project it has consistently opposed." The P. G. & E. is a privately owned utility serving northern California and part of Nevada.

He charged that P. G. & E. in opposing appropriations for Central valley transmission lines, the Delta Steam Electric plant and switchyards, is attempting to gain a middleman's profit — by distributing Central Valley power over its own system.

Rains Great Benefit To Valley Cherries

The heavy rain of Friday night, and other recent rains, have been of great benefit to the cherry crop, according to Robert E. Shinn, manager of the Willamette Cherry Growers.

The added moisture will increase both the size and the tonnage of all varieties of cherries, he said, and they are not far enough along to be damaged by excess moisture.

Shinn said the cherry crop in this part of the Willamette valley is above average and the best crop on the Pacific coast. Some of the Royal Annes may be ready for processing late next week, he said, but probably there will be no heavy incoming of the cherries until the following week.

Natives Spend Hours Combing Locks of Beautiful Women

Manus, Admiralty Islands, June 17 (AP)—Australian scientists were reported today to be investigating a tiny "shangri-la" island in the Pacific where native men spend long hours combing the hair of beautiful, almost white native women.

Sydney Sun Correspondent George H. Johnston said scientists already were on the island, described as part of the coral-fringed western isles some 300 miles north of New Guinea.

Johnston said the women were reported to have figures rivaling those of Balinese beauties and faces reminiscent of the Egyptian lovelies of Cleopatra's time.

Their only dress, he said, is a short, belted sarong, usually white. Unlike most primitive races, he said, the men folk wait on the women hand and foot.

Johnston said the expedition hoped to save the island beauties from extinction from malaria, tuberculosis, inbreeding and dietary deficiencies.

Johnston's account was discredited somewhat, however, by R. W. Robson, editor of the authoritative Pacific Islands monthly.

Robson said the natives probably were a mixture of Malay, Mongoloid, Polynesian and Melanesian strains. He said he doubted Johnston's reports of the extraordinary beauty of the women and of the devotion of their menfolk. However, he said he could not repudiate the reports entirely until further investigation.

Danish Prince to Wed
London, June 17 (AP)—Denmark's blond Prince George, whose name gossips often have lined romantically with that of Britain's Princess Margaret, will wed Queen Elizabeth's divorcee niece, auburn-haired Anne, Viscountess Anson.

City Manager Portland Plan

Portland, June 17 (AP)—Portland should junk its commission form of government and turn to the city manager plan, a mayor's committee reported today.

The mayor's committee was named 11 months ago to determine what form of government was best for the city and whether the city should seek a consolidation with Multnomah county to get rid of overlapping functions.

Today's report says the city manager plan is best. On the consolidation, the committee said that should wait until the city's form of government is changed.

The committee filed an initiative petition at the time it made its report to Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee. If 19,923 signatures are obtained by Aug. 19, the proposal will be on the November ballot.

If the people vote for the change, it will be effective next Jan. 1.

Nation's Capital Still Milkless

Washington, June 17 (AP)—The capital's milk strike entered its second week today with no settlement in sight.

The federal government tossed in one of its top trouble-shooters to help the two conciliators who have been trying to get nine local dairies and their 1650 drivers and employees to agree on a new contract.

Clyde A. Mills, a top assistant to Conciliation Director Cyrus Ching, entered the negotiations late yesterday.

Washington's consumers, settling down to what looked like a lengthy strike, are finding it progressively easier to buy a quart or two at the 65 non-union outlets in the city.

In nearby Maryland and Virginia—unhindered by District of Columbia import regulations—scores of stores were reported to have an ample supply of milk on hand.

The strike is over a demand by the AFL Milk Drivers and Dairy Employees union for a shorter work week without a loss in pay.

The companies offered a five-day work week provided plant operations shut down Sunday. The union asked a 5½ day work week, with seven days of operation.

RFC Possesses Lustron Plant

Columbus, O., June 17 (AP)—Unless and until a higher court says differently, the Lustron corporation is in possession of the reconstruction finance corporation.

On the order of U. S. District Judge Mell G. Underwood, a U. S. Marshal's deputy took custody of the defunct prefabric housing firm yesterday from receiver Clyde M. Foraker.

U. S. District Judge Philip L. Sullivan in Chicago had attempted to block Lustron's delivery to RFC. The government agency bought the firm at a receiver's auction on a bid of \$6,000,000 after the company defaulted on \$37,500,000 in government loans.

Judge Sullivan had granted an injunction to three Lustron creditors to prevent the delivery to RFC. Judge Sullivan postponed to July 3 a hearing on a motion to dissolve his order.

Because of the injunction, Foraker had refused to deliver the plant to RFC.

But Judge Underwood directed Deputy U. S. Marshal Ralph S. Quelette to take over from Foraker. Judge Underwood said he would not permit trustees in bankruptcy named by Judge Sullivan to interfere with Lustron's receiver unless they got authority from a higher court.

Residents of Salem are causing the street cleaning division of the engineer's office no end of trouble during the stormy weather.
