

Salem's Crack Co. B Tops Training Camp Attendance

Northeast Fort Lewis, June 19—Salem's crack National Guard company, Company B, 162d infantry regiment, topped attendance record of the 41st infantry division in summer training camp here.

Company B, commanded by First Lt. Joseph Meyer, has a total of 102 officers and men at the summer camp of the Oregon and Washington national guardsmen. The 1st battalion, commanded by Lt. Col. James Allgood, Dallas, with headquarters in Silverton, tops the battalion attendance record with 353 officers and men present.

Maj. General Thomas E. Rilea, Oregon adjutant general, commended Col. Frederick L. Wiegand, commander of the 186th infantry regiment, for the regiment's top attendance of the three regiments at the summer training.

Last week found Company B, winner last year of the state's top efficiency award, on the rifle range. Lt. Meyer took time out from crumming for the July bar exam to supervise his top Oregon company in the rifle practice.

Saturday, the division put on the top show of the National Guard summer encampment, the "Governor's Day" review. Acting Governor William Walsh, Coos Bay, president of the Oregon senate, represented Governor Douglas McKay who was away for the annual governors' conference.

Lt. Col. Allgood led the 162nd regiment in the parade in the afternoon in the absence of Col. Harold A. Taylor, McMinnville, commander, who had been called home.

Brig. Gen. Harold G. Maison, Salem, assistant division commander and Oregon's state police superintendent, commanded troops for the parade. In the reviewing stand in addition to other dignitaries were General Rilea, Walsh and Maj. Gen. William R. Carroll, Seattle, division commander.

The SUCC has previously determined that employees of the firm were not entitled to unemployment compensation for a 12-week period in 1948 when they were laid off work due to a labor dispute existing between two maritime unions over who should be employed to man lumber cargo vessels operated by the employer.

During the course of the trouble a picket line was thrown up, and pickets used force to keep the mill crew from going through. Duncan stated that there was danger to anyone who attempted to cross the picket line, and that some men who got through were bodily brought back. Rocks were thrown, threats were made, and one of the mill foremen who went through the line was beaten up at a point away from the mill.

Duncan thus decided that the failure of the claimants to work resulted from fear of imminent personal violence to themselves, and that therefore they should be entitled to the compensation which the SUCC denied them.

Bids opened on Sewage Plant Pump

Bids were opened at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon at the office of City Manager J. L. Franzen on pumps for the sewage disposal plant now under construction on North River road.

The items to be bid on are: One or two mixed flow centrifugal pumps of 14,000-gallons-per-minute capacity against a 12-foot head.

Four non-clog centrifugal pumps of capacity from 2100 to 8300 gallons per minute against a 22-foot head.

Six 6-inch by 4-inch motor driven sludge transfer pumps.

Two sludge ejectors with capacity of 100 gallons each.

Two rotary air compressors of capacity necessary to operate the ejectors.

Macri Gives-up To Columnist

New York, June 19 (AP)—Beneditto Macri, 37, charged with last year's knife killing of Union Organizer William Lurie, gave himself up last night to Columnist Walter Winchell.

The two met at a secret rendezvous arranged by a third party, unknown to Winchell. Then the columnist and radio commentator drove Macri to a Manhattan police station where he was booked for homicide.

"I'm sorry to meet you this way... this is not a happy assignment for me," Winchell said he told Macri when they approached each other in the darkness.

"I want to thank you," he said Macri replied.

Less than two hours before, Winchell had predicted on his radio program that he would turn Macri over to police as the climax of a year's radio campaign to induce the Lurie killers to surrender.

Another man indicted in the slaying, 31-year-old John (Scarface) Giusto, a paroled convict, is still at large.

At the police station, Winchell immediately laid claim in the name of the Damon Runyan cancer fund to the \$25,000 reward posted by the AFL International Ladies Garment Workers union, Lurie's organization, after the killing May 9, 1949.

Auto Collision at Woodburn Injures 5

A two-car accident on Pacific highway at Woodburn at 10:30 Saturday night, injured driver W. C. Rambo and passenger Fred Phillips, Salem R. 1, who were driving a state car on a business trip to Woodburn.

Rambo and Phillips, both employees at the state penitentiary, were driven south on the highway when they struck a northbound vehicle driven by Mrs. Madeline Bernice Woods, Woodburn, with passengers Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Lenhart, also of Woodburn.

All five occupants of the two cars were taken to Woodburn hospital for treatment but all were released. Rambo was bruised and cut with a knee injury, and Phillips sustained severe bruises and facial lacerations. All occupants of the Woods car were treated for slight injuries.

Leaves Eugene, Tells of 'Rescue'

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Sunburned and barefoot, he told of four "terrible" days of wandering aimlessly after his burning plane crashed in the barren Humboldt-Carson area while en route from Seattle to Nevada.

"I thought I'd never make it back to civilization," he gasped from his bed at the veterans' hospital in Reno.

But today, he conceded his story was "not exactly true." In fact, he said, he made it all up because "he wanted a place to eat and sleep." And he might have gotten away with it except for the keen observation of Deputy Sheriff William Driscoll.

The deputy noticed that Pearce's feet were in remarkably good shape for a man who had spent four days without shoes on the scorching desert.

No cuts, no blisters—not even athlete's foot.

After some prodding, Pearce confessed that he had really hitch-hiked from Eugene, Ore., to Reno a week ago and had gone broke after "considerable drinking."

Pearce told deputies that he came from Oklahoma City where he was dishonorably discharged from the army in 1948.

Senate to Vote Social Security

Washington, June 19 (AP)—Senate democratic and republican leaders teamed up today in an effort to speed passage of an expanded social security program. Voting on amendments is set to start tomorrow afternoon.

In separate interviews, Democratic Leader Lucas of Illinois and Senator Taft (R-Ohio), GOP policy leader, told a reporter they expect the social security measure to go through in about the form it came from the senate finance committee.

Lucas is pushing for one amendment that would increase the taxable wage base to \$3,600 a year. It now is \$3,000 with employees and employers each contributing 1 1/2 percent of wages up to this amount.

Senator George (D-Ga.), finance committee chairman and in charge of the bill, was expected to go along with the Lucas proposal if he and other democrats would drop other amendments.

The senate bill would add an estimated 10,000,000 persons to the 35,000,000 now covered by the old age and survivors insurance program.

Both it and a similar measure already passed by the house would sharply increase monthly benefit payments to aged persons, but the senate committee dropped house provisions for increases in the related old age assistance program.

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Neighbor's Quick Action Saves Father of Six Trapped in Well

Elkhart, Ind., June 19 (AP)—A 33-year-old father of six who undertook to dig a well on father's day spent two hours trapped by a cave-in with only a hose to breathe through. The well digger, H. Milton Randall, survived through quick action of a neighbor and was pulled out unharmed by Elkhart and Goshen firemen.

Randall and the neighbor, Vernon Syninger, were digging the well at Randall's suburban home. They were down 18 feet when a pipe broke, and Syninger climbed out to get a wrench.

The sandy earth caved in, burying Randall completely except for his left hand. With it Randall pointed to his head. Yelling for help, Syninger scooped the dirt away from his face and got a garden hose to him. Randall breathed through the hose.

His wife, Judy, called the fire departments. They replaced the hose with a regular fresh air line and began to dig. The six children, the eldest 11, stood nearby crying.

Firemen dug for almost two hours. Finally they lowered a rope to Randall, and looped it under his arms. Slowly they drew him out.

Film Writers Off for Sentence

Los Angeles, June 19 (AP)—Five of the "Hollywood 10" left by plane last night for New York and Washington where they and three others are due in court this week for disposition of contempt of congress citations.

They are Edward Dmytryk, Lester Cole, Albert Maltz, Alvah Bessie and Ring Lardner, Jr. Another, Adrian Scott, left earlier yesterday. Two others, Samuel Ornitz and Herbert Biberman, are traveling by other means.

Two of the original 10 cited for refusing in 1947 to tell the house committee on un-American activities whether they were communists were convicted and are serving one year jail terms in Washington. They are John Howard Lawson and Dalton Trumbo.

The other eight decided to let their cases depend upon disposition of the cases against Lawson and Trumbo. The 10 were writers, producers or directors who have since been dropped by their movie studios.

A crowd of more than 1,000 demonstrated at the airport before the five departed last night, a protest demonstration arranged by the "committee for the Hollywood ten."

Early Peace Rally Staged in Japan

Tokyo, June 19 (AP)—The Japanese government is trying to rally all political forces behind a program for an early peace.

Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida will meet tonight with former Prime Minister Hideo Ashida, the behind the scenes leader of the democratic party, to discuss the peace issue.

Ashida is being tried for allegedly accepting bribes. He and Yoshida are bitter political rivals. But the meeting, which caused excitement in Japan, is an apparent attempt by the prime minister to impress U. S. Defense Secretary Johnson with the Japanese desire for an immediate peace treaty.

Democratic National Chairman Due in State

Portland, Ore., June 19 (AP)—William M. Boyle, Jr., chairman of the democratic national committee, will be in Oregon Saturday and Sunday for brief stops here and in The Dalles.

Making the western trip with Boyle is Mrs. India Edwards, director of the women's division of the democratic central committee.

Atomic Board Reappointed

Washington, June 19 (AP)—President Truman today renominated the four present members of the atomic energy commission.

Sumner T. Pike, Maine republican, was nominated for a new term of four years beginning July 1.

Returning to the old staggered system, the president named Gordon Dean of California for a new three-year term; Thomas Murray of New York, two years; and Henry DeWolf Smyth of New Jersey for a one year term.

The President acted after a top White House source said that Pike will continue as acting chairman pending appointment of a permanent chairman.

The sending up of the nominations today gave evidence that the president still has not decided upon a man to fill the vacant fifth membership, or upon a permanent chairman.
