A Bread Recipe

An important item in any meal is bread. But for summertime meals based on a nourishing soup and sandwich, or a soup-and-salad, the bread service is extremely important from many angles. Bread can tempt the appetite and revive interest in food. When breads are appealing, they are eaten in greater quantities, too, and thus furnish a goodly amount of food and energy value.

A fruity bread, such as this orange marmalade nut bread, is quick and easy to prepare and is a distinguished addition to many a menu. The marmalade imparts luscious color and engaging flavor, and the tangy shreds of peel together with the crunchy pecans are a texture delight. Evaporated milk, quickly soured by the addition of lemon juice or vinegar, imparts rich flavor and moistness and makes the bread keep well.

Orange Marmalade Nut Bread
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup coarsely chopped pecans
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 cup orange marmalade
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1 tablespoon lemon juice or vinegar
1 tablespoon butter, melted
Sift flour with baking powder, soda and salt. Stir in nuts. Add orange marmalade to beaten egg and blend well. Add lemon juice to milk, and stir into egg-marmalade mixture, blending well. Add to the flour mixture together with the butter. Stir until dry ingredients are moistened. Pour into a greased one-pound loaf pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) until brown, about 50 minutes. Makes 1 loaf.
