

Defense Claims Wilson Car Not Used Day of Murder

Vancouver, Wash., June 22 (AP)—Four defense witnesses in the kidnap-murder trial of Turman and Utah Wilson today testified that the green 1937 Chevrolet coupe registered to Grant Wilson was not in working order during time Jo Ann Dewey was abducted and murdered.

The car had figured in the prosecution's case against the Wilson brothers. Grant is a brother of Turman and Utah.

Clarence Ostenson, brother-in-law of the defendants, who lived at the Wilson's Green Mountain home, told of escorting the car from Green Mountain to Grant Wilson's home seven miles away on March 17. Eighteen-year-old Jo Ann, with whose murder the Wilson brothers are charged, was abducted from a Vancouver street March 19.

Ostenson, a Sunday school superintendent at the Assembly of God church at Camas, Wash., testified that he had to push the car to get it started. He said he had to drive ahead in another car to light the way because the Chevrolet's lights failed. The Chevrolet's engine also quit, Ostenson testified, and the car rolled to a stop in front of Grant Wilson's house. The battery was down and the generator was not working, he said.

Dan McPherson, 19, Camas, who bought the Chevrolet from Grant; David Woodbridge, brother-in-law of Grant; and Mable Woodbridge, Grant's mother-in-law, all testified that the car sat in front of Grant's house without being moved from March 17 until March 28.

McPherson said he bought the car on March 28.

Grant had previously testified that he sold the car to McPherson on March 30.

Both McPherson and Woodbridge testified that the car finally started on March 28 after McPherson pushed it with another car and Woodbridge steered it. They took it three blocks away to a garage they had rented.

Lions Activities For Year Listed

Chief's Order To Get Review

A formal review of demotions ordered by Fire Chief W. P. Roble for two fire captains was tentatively scheduled by the civil service commission to follow expiration of a 10-day appeal period for the men.

At a meeting Wednesday afternoon, the commission took formal note of the demotions by merely listening to a reading of the copies of the chief's letters ordering demotions. The copies were filed.

By action of the chief J. F. Baggett and Ben Faught were demoted from captains to firemen under charges of insubordination and inefficiency. The two men have until Friday and Saturday to file a notice of appeal from the chief's order.

Chief Roble urged the commission to dispose of the case at the earliest possible opportunity to clarify departmental changes slated for July 1.

In another fire department personnel problem, the commission approved certification of Royce Linhart for appointment as a fireman. Linhart, who topped the civil service list, had passed the age limit since taking the examination. The commission's approval set the age limit as the age at the time of examination.

In police department consideration, the commission accepted the resignation of James F. Hunter and the appointment of Charles F. Nortness to the force as a patrolman.

Police Chief Clyde A. Warren was given approval for employment of six patrolmen as permitted by budget changes on July 1. The appointments will be temporary, pending establishment of a civil service list by examination later in the year.

Candidates Decided By Drawing of Lots

Two candidates for public office in the May 19 primary election have been decided by a drawing after final election results showed there had been a tie vote with their opponents, the state bureau of elections today said it had been informed.

In Malheur county, Vernon Wilson got the same number of write-in votes as Ernest Metcalf for democratic candidate. He also was a republican candidate. No one filed for the democratic nomination, but Wilson won over Metcalf in the drawing.

In Morrow county, the district attorney race ended in a dead heat, and Phil Mahoney was picked as democratic nominee over Bradley Fancher, a republican nominee.

However, Mahoney has publicly stated that he does not want the nomination. Under state law Mahoney must file a notice of withdrawal from the candidacy if he does not want the nomination. State laws make a drawing mandatory in cases of tie votes.

E Bond Sales Reported On

According to Sidney L. Stevens, county chairman, E bond sales in this county last week were \$22,144.

Total sales in the county to date are \$110,309, or 36 per cent of the assigned quota of \$302,000. The county is now in 19th place on the basis of percentage of sales.

In order to meet its assigned independence drive quota, the people of this county must purchase \$191,691 more in E bonds.

Oregonians purchased \$487,000 of E bonds during the week ending June 17, according to figures received from the Federal Reserve bank by E. C. Sammons, state chairman of the savings bonds division. This represents a total of 46 per cent of the state's quota of \$5,892,000 for the independence drive.

While the volume represented a drop from the sales of the previous week, increases in some of the hitherto lagging counties indicated a continuing surge of buying.

Gilliam county continues to lead the state with 128 per cent of its assigned quota. The largest single increase during the last week was made by Sherman county in selling 58 per cent of its quota. Other counties showing gains of 20 per cent or more were Morrow 39 per cent and Jackson 21 per cent.

2 Youths Off For Alaska Isle

Two Salem youths left Thursday for an all-summer assignment for the United States Fish and Wildlife service on an isolated island in Alaska. They are Dave Kowitz, 1961 Center street, and William McNeil of Cummings Lane.

The island is located about 20 miles from Wrangell, Alaska. Only one sordough family lives on the island. Kowitz and McNeil will be stationed there along with a two-way radio furnishing their only contact with the outside world. A U. S. Fish and Wildlife service boat will bring mail about once every three weeks.

The youths traveled by auto to Seattle, from where they left Thursday afternoon by ship for Ketchikan, Alaska. From Ketchikan, they will fly to Wrangell, and a Fish and Wildlife service boat will take them to the island where they will spend the summer.

Both Kowitz and McNeil are fish and game majors at Oregon State college, having just completed their sophomore year. Last summer they were employed by the Oregon state fish and game commission on the Oregon coast. They plan to return to OSC for the fall term.

'Bulldog' Jackson Facing License Charge

Ernest L. Jackson, better known as "Bulldog" or the "cauliflower culprit" for his thespian activities in the razzing ring, went to the mat Thursday for a bout with the law.

"Bulldog," who earned his reputation as a nationally-known meanie, reversed his field when faced with a charge of improper registration of a motor vehicle.

In a complaint signed by State Policeman Roy Hunt, Jackson was accused of making application to register a 1938 model car under the name "Yukon Jake." The first round of the case, however, was a no contest meeting. Jackson's charges were continued to Monday for plea.

Check Scaler Is Appointed

Appointment of Wesley Warman as timber sale check scaler and inspector on all state forest timber sales was announced here today by Lynn F. Cronemiller, assistant state forester in charge of the management division.

Warman, a member of the forest management section in the northwest state district, will assume his duties immediately under the new set-up and will work directly out of the forestry headquarters at Forest Grove.

The great increase in the number and size of timber sales on state forest lands was the reason for the assignment of a check scaler. At the present time a total of almost 150 sales are in effect in the northwest area. Warman will check all salvage operations in the burn and surrounding localities in Clatsop, Washington, Tillamook and Columbia counties.

The new forester took most of his schooling at the forestry school at Michigan State college and worked for some time for the forestry department of that state. He has scaled for private timber companies and until recently was assigned to timber sales in Tillamook county.

Mountain Goats Thrive in Wallowa

Portland, June 22 (AP)—Oregon's goat herd apparently has settled down in its new home in the Wallowa mountains.

Four, and possibly five, were sighted recently on a mountain near Wallowa lake, scattered on sheer rock formations at 7000 feet elevation. Mike McFerridge, Wallowa Lake packer, and Ted Laughlin, state game commission field agent, saw them through binoculars. Because of swirling clouds they couldn't be sure whether there were four or five.

Jane Cowl, 50, Stage Star, Dies

Santa Monica, Calif., June 22 (AP)—Jane Cowl, 50, stage star of a generation ago and once the nation's foremost Juliet, died today of abdominal cancer.

Miss Cowl entered a hospital two weeks ago to undergo surgery. At that time her physician said she was to remain under observation for an undetermined time.

The actress was born in Boston and made her debut in 1903 in New York City. She moved to Hollywood several years ago and since has appeared in films.

She was the widow of Adolph Klaubner, who for many years was drama critic of the New York Times. They had no children.

She played her famous Juliet role—to the universal acclaim of critics—for 856 nights and matinees. That was a record run for Shakespeare on Broadway, beginning January 24, 1923.

In her younger days she was considered one of the most beautiful women on the stage. In addition to starring in a score of plays, she also was the author or co-author of nine plays including such hits as "Smilin' Through" and "Lilac Time."

Gun of Suicide Victim Sought

State and county law enforcement officers appealed Thursday for information about a gun which would enable them to close their records concerning the suicide of George P. Smith, 46, last Sunday in Silverton.

Smith died from wounds from a .410 caliber shotgun. He was reported not to have owned a gun prior to the incident, and the weapon in the case bore a tag attached to the trigger guard which listed a price of \$5.50.

Officers checked Silverton, Salem and other cities in the area in an effort to find out where Smith purchased the weapon. But they were unable to find the seller.

The sale of the gun was not illegal, but officers would like to complete their record of the case and consequently they issued an appeal for information concerning where the gun was purchased.
