

Ward Names 2 Manager's Aides

Appointment of Roger Cochran and T. S. Jackson as assistant managers of the Montgomery Ward store in Salem was announced Thursday by Manager Paul Wulf.

Cochran has been active in Salem business circles since the war in which he served overseas with the army air corps. He joined the Montgomery Ward staff a year ago. His promotion after only a year "is unusual and speaks for itself as to his work with us," Manager Wulf said.

With Mrs. Cochran and their two children he lives at 841 South street. He is a son of Manager Clay Cochran of the Chamber of Commerce.

Jackson has been with Montgomery Ward stores for several years, both before the war and since. He was formerly with the store at Roseburg, but more recently has been assistant manager of the Albany store, and came to Salem only this week for his new assignment. He is not married.

"He has a thorough background in the organization," said Manager Wulf, "and has earned his promotion to one of the Pacific coast's largest Ward stores."

Jackson becomes assistant in charge of operations, succeeding V. Haan, who resigned. Cochran fills a new position as assistant manager in charge of merchandising.

Manager Wulf said the appointment of a second assistant manager was necessitated by the growth of the business.

Fear Showers Injure Cherries

Cherry growers gloomily watched the showers, Friday morning, although leaders in the cherry industry stated so far very little damage has been reported because the cherries have been too green to do much splitting. Continued heavy showers, however, would bring another situation.

Picking of some of the early white cherries is due the latter part of next week, processors state.

Cool temperatures and showers annoyed the Salem area Friday, despite the fact summer is supposed to be well on its way. In Salem, .06 of an inch of rain fell in the 24-hour period ending at 10:30 a. m., most of it during the heavy showers of the mid-morning.

Forecast for tonight and Saturday is for more of the same with the occasional fresh winds and showers to hinder agricultural activities. Rainfall to date in Salem has totaled 2.68 inches, against a normal of .97 of an inch for the period.

Transient Family Find Home on Farm

A family of four, found living under a ditch bridge near South 14th and Oxford streets by Salem police on a routine check of transient "jungles" was in better circumstances Friday.

The Red Cross provided funds for groceries, and the employment office found work and a home for the transients. A farmer, Don Mueller, offered work on his fruit farm and the house for the family.

The four transients, including two boys aged 6 and 9, had been traveling through the Willamette valley seeking employment.

Post-war Low in Oregon Jobless

Oregon's reviving seasonal employment pushed the state's jobless figures to a postwar low in early June, the state unemployment compensation commission revealed Friday.

Only 30,434 persons were actively seeking jobs June 1, a drop of over 10,000 from the previous month. The commission said the figure would probably remain stable throughout June as farm jobs are balanced by housewives and students entering the labor market.

Lumbering, logging and construction led the list of industries increasing employment since mid-winter.

2 Strikes Threaten Detroit Auto Plants

Detroit, June 23 (AP)—Two strikes which would severely affect the automobile industry loomed as possibilities today.

The CIO United Auto Workers called a walkout of 30,000 Briggs Manufacturing Co. employees for 10 a. m., Monday.

Another 10,000 were authorized to strike at the Hudson Motor Car Co. No date was set.

The crux of each dispute evidently is whether Briggs and Hudson are to match the UAW's contract with General Motors Corp.

Privately Built Public Schools

Atlanta, June 23 (AP)—How do you build new public schools when the cash isn't to be had?

Let private enterprise do it, and rent them back to the school system.

That was the plan worked out yesterday between Georgia's attorney general Eugene Cook and superintendent Pat Heldon of the Union county schools.

Two rural schools in Heldon's little county of 75 miles north of Atlanta had burned down. The county had no money to replace them and had reached its legal debt limit, that is, could not borrow any more.

Private sources told Heldon they had money to build new schools and would lease the buildings to the county. They also offered to transfer title to the county as a "gift" when the rentals have equalled the investment.

But was it legal? Heldon asked the attorney general for a ruling. Legal, he said.

Collins Low on Drainage Pipe

Low bidder on drainage pipe for Salem's drainage projects of this year was the Collins Concrete Pipe company of Portland. Bids were opened Thursday in the office of City Manager J. L. Franzen.

A contract will not be awarded until the bids are submitted to the city council with a recommendation from the manager.

Four concerns bid on the six items.

Collins Concrete Pipe company, bidding a total of \$28,100.20 on an all size basis, agrees to deliver the pipe as specified in the call for bids, ranging from 300 to 350 feet a day.

Oregon Gravel company, with a total bid of \$198,782, offers to deliver eight feet per day each of five of the items and of the 30-inch pipe 150 feet per day.

Seattle Concrete Pipe company, bidding a total of \$107,187, would operate two shifts, and furnish 96 feet of six-foot lengths, and 128 feet of eight-foot lengths per shift. Of the six items bid on, it would not make the last four without the first or second or both.

Salem Concrete Pipe company bids on only five items. It offers to deliver 300 feet daily of the 48- and 36-inch pipe and the 30-inch as required.

41st Division Ends Two Weeks Training

Fort Lewis, June 23 (AP)—The 161st infantry regiment of the 41st national guard division ended a two-week summer training program here today.

The encampment of 5,500 officers and enlisted men was the largest force mustered by the division since its inactivation at the end of World War II.

Members of the 161st infantry will leave by train from here tonight for their eastern Washington homes. Other units of the division will leave tonight and tomorrow by train and car for their homes in Washington and Oregon.

Gunboat Fires on Chinese Planes

Taipei, Formosa, June 23 (AP)—Chinese warplanes, attacking a freighter at the entrance of Swatow harbor, were fired on today by an unidentified gunboat in territorial waters, Nationalist air headquarters announced.

Pilots reported the gunboat was standing by when they discovered a 4000 ton freighter beached or anchored less than a mile from the mouth of the Tow river. Then, they said:

The planes dived on the freighter.

The gunboat, carrying no flag, opened fire in an attempt to drive them off.

"The planes made five attacks and scored repeated hits while under constant fire from the gunboat which moved less than a mile from the ship" headquarters added.

The Nationalists said the gunboat at no time raised its colors and was not identified. Neither was the freighter.

(In not identifying the gunboat as communist, headquarters implied it was a foreign warship. The British navy has been patrolling sea lanes off the Chinese coast since the Nationalist blockade was imposed a year ago. The gunboat could have been Russian, although no Russian warships have been reported in Chinese waters.)

Green Light for Tele Network

Washington, June 23 (AP)—The federal communications commission today gave the go-ahead signal for the construction of the last links in a cross-country television network system.

Permits were issued to the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. to bridge the final gaps by Jan. 1, 1952, with a chain of microwave relay stations between Chicago and Omaha, and between Omaha and San Francisco.

A similar microwave system between New York and Chicago is nearing completion.

The microwave relay consists of spaced radio stations which pick up and amplify the video signal and "bounce" it on to the next station.

In all, the transcontinental system will cost around \$37,590,000.

In addition to the coast-to-coast microwave relay the A. T. & T. also has underground coaxial cable chains carrying TV in many parts of the country.

Saturday morning a parade composed of cars, trucks and floats will wind through Salem from the north city limits on River road to the city center, proceed through the Capitol Shopping center, on north to Highland, then out on Cherry avenue and back to Keizer, all under the escort of Salem city police.

In the afternoon a bicycle parade will assemble at Keizer school grounds at 1:15 and follow their route from Keizer corner down North River road to Orcutt's market.

Judges will decide on the winners of the various bicycle division contest winners at 1:30 at the school grounds.

Three businesses are planning a grand opening Saturday and three more are scheduling re-openings. A service station is conducting a guessing contest on volume of business done during the day.

Bookies Take in \$500,000 a Day

Washington, June 23 (AP)—Senate crime investigators disclosed today that a St. Louis gambling firm has been doing a \$500,000-a-day mail-order and telegraph bookie business on horse races and baseball bets.

Chairman Kefauver (D., Tenn.) of the crime investigating committee named the firm as C. J. Rich and Co. He said the firm's records are now in the hands of committee investigators.

The disclosure came as Kefauver questioned chief post office inspector Clifton Garner on the possibility of charging gamblers with violations of postal regulations in the use of mails.

In other developments:

1. Kefauver told reporters senate investigators will go into Ohio assured by Gov. Frank J. Lausche of full cooperation from state law enforcement agencies.

2. U. S. prison director James V. Bennett told the senators the American Bar Association is considering recommending legislation aimed at slapping an excise tax on gambling profits.

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
