

Red Organ Raps Wall Street

New York June 28 (AP)—The Daily Worker official organ of the communist party in the United States, carried this page one headline today: "Prevent World War III! Communists urge people halt Wall St. intervention in Asia."

In its lead story on the Korean situation the publication quoted a statement by communist party National Secretary Gus Hall, Henry Winston, organizational secretary, and John Williamson, labor secretary, which said in part:

"Atomic war threatens the people of the world. President Truman precipitated the danger of that catastrophe yesterday when he ordered hostilities against the peoples of Asia without an official declaration of war."

"His orders speeding our bombers and warships to intervene against the Korean people are the adventurist, aggressive imperialist operation of Wall Street for domination of all Asia and the Pacific."

Allen Talks on Cherry Industry

"Brined cherries" are a misnomer since sulphur is used to extract the color from the fruit in preliminary preparation for the production of maraschino cherries, W. G. Allen informed members of the Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon.

Allen, one of the veteran canners and fruit processors of the valley explained that Italian exporters of cherries in barrels added a small quantity of salt to them in order to avoid the payment of duty. Olives were being admitted duty free because they were packed in brine.

Importation of duty free cherries crippled the industry in the northwest for a number of years, said Allen. Since 1935, however, with a duty imposed, the industry has been picking up, plagued only by untimely rains and insects.

Approximately 275,000 barrels of cherries were packed last year and about 1000 carloads have been absorbed in the fresh fruit market. Canners processed about 7000 tons.

Allen sketched the canning industry of the valley and said the first plant in Salem was formed in 1890 with R. S. Wallace and Dr. H. J. Minthorne, two of the principal stockholders.

Kenneth Sherman Heads Exchange Club

Kenneth Sherman was elected president of the Salem Exchange club Wednesday, heading a slate of candidates which was unopposed.

Pat Campbell was elected vice president with George Martin re-elected secretary and Stuart Compton named treasurer.

Peter Geiser, Thomas Kay and Oscar Specht were elected to serve on the board of control. Seven names had been submitted for the three board of control offices.

Following the election, Frank Lockman, 52, a 1950 graduate of Willamette university, told members of the Exchange club how to deal with speech problems.

Ex Oregon Con In Slaying Quiz

Omaha, June 28 (AP)—A former Oregon state prisoner is under questioning here in connection with the slaying of a prominent Alexandria, Va., couple in 1947.

He is Harry Shamp, 25, who was released from the Oregon penitentiary three days before Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. May, II, were slain near Omaha, Aug. 28, 1947.

It was known that a man was under questioning, but his name was not disclosed until his attorney filed a writ of habeas corpus here yesterday.

The writ asked his release from solitary confinement in Douglas county jail, and asserted Shamp had been "grilled and put under drugs" by the police.

Another man previously confessed the slayings. He is Charles McClellan, who made the confession while an inmate of Colorado's Canon City state prison. He now is serving a life sentence in the Nebraska state penitentiary for the slayings.

Deputy County Attorney Joseph P. Inserra said Shamp "neither denies nor admits the murders while not under the influence of truth serum, but he has given us very definite information while under the serum. He has told us just about everything but the actual pulling of the trigger."

Shamp was received at the Oregon state prison from Douglas county on Dec. 2, 1946, to serve a two-year sentence for burglary not in a dwelling.

He was issued a parole on August 23, 1947, just three days before the Omaha slaying.

In October, 1947, the parole board ordered Shamp's parole revoked, and he was finally apprehended and returned to the Oregon state prison on January 20, 1948. He was given his final discharge on November 30, 1948.

Thousands Idled By Rail Strike

Chicago, June 28 (AP)—A switchmen's strike against five big mid-western and western railroads entered its fourth day today. Thousands of non-rail workers were being forced into idleness, and there was no immediate sign of a break.

Four of the five roads struck have shut down. The fifth has reduced operations.

Leverett Edwards — national (railway) mediation board member—said yesterday after talks with railroad executives:

"Things look dim. There is no indication of a quick settlement."

As the strike went on, its effects were felt:

The rail strike spread to the National Tube company at Lorain, O., the company closed down, and 12,000 men were idled. The shutdown followed a wildcat strike by 300 plant railroaders represented by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. They are protesting the same board report that led to the switchmen's strike.

The Great Northern railway halted operations on 15 branch lines, shut down repair shops in five cities, and announced last night system-wide reductions in personnel in all departments. The GN was the one struck road which was trying to keep rolling.

Five thousand coal miners were laid off in Utah mines using the D&RGW lines.

Seattle Bakery Strike Now Settled

Seattle, June 28 (AP)—The city's 10-day-old bakery strike ended early today.

John C. Tutt, federal conciliator, said the settlement was reached on the basis of a 9-cent hourly increase and assurance by the Bakers' bureau that all court actions filed against the AFL Bakers' union local, its officers, and the international would be withdrawn.

Tutt said the 800 striking workers would return to their jobs today.

"Bakery goods will be on the shelves Thursday morning," he declared.

The agreement was reached in a 13½ hour meeting after the union empowered a committee to settle the strike on the best terms possible.

The union had asked a 35-hour week of five consecutive days, no holiday work and time and a half for Sundays. Tutt said none of these provisions were in the final agreement.

The Salem Trades and Labor council at its meeting Tuesday night adopted a resolution endorsing the Community Chest.

The resolution states further: "Whereas, Organized labor and their families receive more benefits from the Community Chest than any other single group, particularly the children through the YMCA Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls, and the Boy Scouts, and

Memorial Forest Proposed As Honor to Nels Rogers

Creation of a memorial forest in honor of the late Nels Rogers, state forester, was proposed at a meeting of the state board of forestry Tuesday.

Several thousand acres of land in the vicinity of Owl camp in the Tillamook burn area would be included. Rogers was state forester for several years and was responsible in large part for the forest rehabilitation program now in progress in the Tillamook burn area.

The board will make a definite decision on the proposal at a later meeting.

State Forester George Spaur told the board that 110,000 acres of timber in the La Grande and Heppner areas of eastern Oregon have been treated in connection with the budworm control program.

The board said it was considering the exchange of some of the lands in the Short Sand beach and Arch Cape areas for highway commission lands along the Sunset and Wilson River highways. The highway commission will be consulted about the trade.

The board suggested the expediting of slash burning as a means of reducing the fire hazard in Oregon forests. The recommendation will be included in a general burn policy laid down by the state forester. The board decided to expand the in-service training program of fire fighters. It also recommended an educational program to convince logging operators of the value of adequate slash burning and the necessity of cutting snags during logging operations.
