## Friday is Moving Day For United Air Lines

Moving day is coming this week at Salem's McNary field. Today Contractor Henry Carl is to turn over the new administration building on the west side of the airfield to the city of Salem and Friday night United Air Lines will start its move across the field.

United began installing its new counter in the building Wednesday and following flight 282 which comes in at 8:15 p.m., daylight time, will start moving from its present building on the east side of the field to the new administration building. By morning they will be ready to take care of their flights on the west side of the field.

July 1 is also to mark the date of the move of the office of Airport Manager Charles Barclay. The manager's office, since the navy leased the hangar on the east side of McNary field, has been in a small building just north of the large hangar on the west side of the field. Beginning Saturday Barclay will occupy a room just off the lobby and waiting room of the administration building.

Also occupying quarters in the new building will be the U.S. weather bureau, which has had its offices upstairs in a lean-to on the hangar occupied by the Naval Air facility.

Date of the move of the weather bureau still is not certain and is awaiting the transfer of funds in the nation's capital. Several of their instruments have been installed, however, and outlets for their teletypes are ready for use in the new building.

The move of United Air Lines to the west side of the field will leave the building that the air lines has used for the Naval Air facility. Already the navy has started construction of a quonset hut on the south end of the building to enlarge it for its use.

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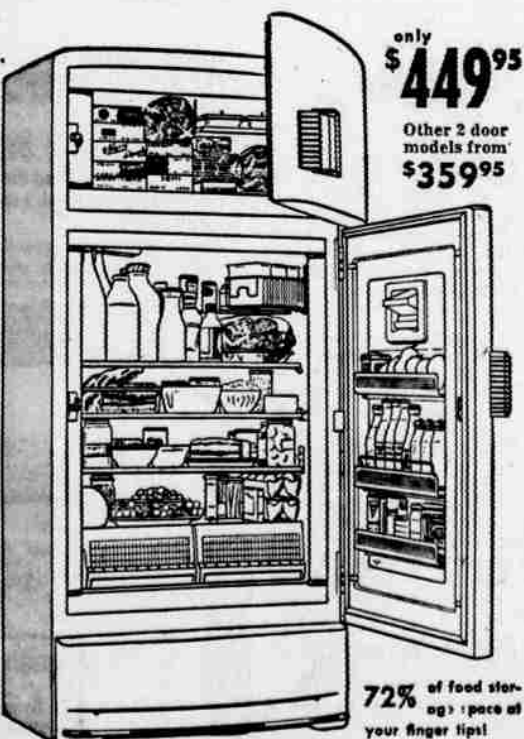
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
