

Nist Commands 7th Cavalry

Camp Drake, Japan, June 30 —Col. Cecil W. Nist, a native of Salem, Ore., has officially assumed command of the Seventh Cavalry regiment, First Cavalry division, on occupation duty in Tokyo, Japan.

Veteran of 27 years of army service since his graduation from West Point in 1923, Colonel Nist is a "soldier's soldier."

With his entire adult life devoted to the army, Nist, in addition to a varied history of peace-time service in the United States and Panama, has an impressive war record that includes participation in the Pacific campaigns against Leyte and Okinawa.

During the war years he served in the 77th division from its activation in March, 1942, until April, 1944, and also saw duty as G-2 with the XXIV corps in Korea until October, 1946. He wears the Legion of Merit with Oak Leaf cluster and the Army Commendation ribbon.

The colonel is the son of Mrs. Charles W. Nist of 2245 North Liberty street, Salem. His wife is the former Miss Ellen Mary Swan, who resides at 2547 Flower street, Huntington Park, Calif.

Colonel Nist is the father of two sons, Allan S. Nist, 22, and Cadet Cecil W. Nist, Jr., 24, who is presently in his second year at West Point.

The party, says a letter to Manager Clay Cochran of the Chamber of Commerce, from Frank McCully, public relations director of the Joseph chamber, will arrive here in a chartered DC-3 and will be ready for breakfast at 10 a.m.

Flagg Reversed In Phone Case

The supreme court overruled a decision of Public Utilities Commissioner George Flagg Friday in which he had prohibited certain payments from the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company to its parent organization, the American Telephone and Telegraph company.

The PT & T contract with the AT & T provides for payments to the parent organization on the basis of a percentage of the company's earnings in Oregon. The high court ruled that Flagg had exceeded his authority in limiting the type of payments made. The items involved came to \$383,000 and \$317,000 for the past two years.

The ruling was written by Chief Justice Hall S. Lusk and reversed an earlier decision by Marion county circuit court Judge George Duncan.

A voter-approved ban on use of fixed fishing gear in the Columbia river or its tributaries was declared valid today.

The measure had been approved by the voters in the November, 1948, election, but two suits had been brought to block enforcement of the measure.

The suits, filed by fixed gear and drag net operators, asserted the law was discriminatory in that it exempted Indian fishermen.

Justice Arthur Hay, in writing the ruling, stated that the Indians were operating under an early treaty with the federal government over which the state courts have no jurisdiction.

The opinion reversed an earlier decision by Marion county circuit court Judge George R. Duncan.

New Schedules Work Better

The first month of operation of the new time and route schedules of City Transit Lines, and the zone fare plan, indicates the plan is working satisfactorily, according to R. J. Davidson, Salem manager for the lines.

"Usually such a change is followed temporarily by a falling off in patronage until the public becomes accustomed to it," he said. "But that doesn't seem to have happened this time."

"One reason for that may be that our telephone number has been published on the schedule cards with the result that we have had many phone calls. I would say that 98 percent of these calls have been for information, and very few to make complaints."

City Transit Lines set up the zone fare plan for a trial of 60 days, and it still has a month to run.

Salem Nudges 45th Parallel

New York, June 30 (AP)—You, too, may be on that 38th parallel—the imaginary latitude which marks the boundary between North and South Korea.

If you live in Evansville, Ind., you're smack on the line, same for Stockton, Calif., Lake City, Colo., Syracuse, Kas., DuQuoin, Ill., and Hot Springs, Va.

San Francisco, Berkeley and Oakland, Calif., are only slightly below it. Louisville and Lexington, Ky., are slightly north. Washington, D. C., is about one degree north, Richmond, Va., and Wichita, Kas., a half degree south.

Passing out east, the line travels through Seville, Spain; Messina, Sicily; Athens, Greece; near Ankara, Turkey; through Sinkiang province western China; and Tientsin China.

West Salem P O Opens July 1

The new West Salem post office will be opened July 1 for the distribution of mail over two rural, two city and one mounted route. Postmaster Albert C. Gragg stated Friday. Because all of the necessary equipment has not been received, the new office will not be ready to handle the sale of stamps, postal notes and take care of other functions.

The post office is housed in a new building located at Second and Kingwood by Col. C. A. Robertson.

The office will serve rural routes Nos. 1 and 8, formerly handled from the Salem office and carried by Floyd C. Crabtree and William Clearwater, respectively; foot routes carried by Donovan Morrison and Clyde Johnson and a mounted route in charge of Wayne Hockett.

The West Salem office will be in charge of Stymie D. Leslie, one of the clerks transferred from Salem.

Until such time as the necessary furnishings have been received, parcel post, stamps and registries will be cared for at White's Kingwood market, a contract station.

The other former Salem men are also known to be stationed in Japan with the Air Force. They are First Lt. Lynn F. Cronmiller, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn F. Cronmiller, and Maj. Edwin Hauser. Hauser, prior to returning to active duty with the Armed Forces was a member of the Army Reserve here. Both men have their families with them in the Orient.
