Scientist Thinks Flying Saucers May Come From Planet Mars

Washington, June 30 (AP)—A scientist friend of mine thinks these flying saucers we've been hearing about may be from another planet. Mars, maybe.

The scientist, a serious young Alabamian named John Matthews, knows a thing or two about the saucer business; he has invented one of his own. More about that later.

The 38-year-old Matthews is sales manager of the hydraulic division of the A. O. Smith outfit. He has quite a theory.

He looks at the saucer business this way:

"It may sound fantastic," he says, "but it is possible that the people on one of the planets are far ahead of us. People have seen what they thought were flying saucers in the sky, but none has ever landed. My theory is that they are brought down from one of the planets and dropped from a mother plane. The up-pressure is so great that instead of falling where we can look at them they go back to the mother ship. Sounds silly, but that is what I think. The pilots can't make it to earth, because possibly they can't breathe here. We don't know whether they live on mud pies or ether, or what."

Matthews thinks that in the next half century we may find out.

"Our life span is around 70 years or so," he said. "How do we know that it might not be 500 years on Mars or Jupiter? They say it would take us 40 years to make it to Mars and back since man cannot travel faster than light. It probably would be worth it to find out."

"I'll bet that if we had a ship we claimed could make it, you would find a line of volunteers stretching from Bolling field to Washington."

Gas Pipeline to N. W. Planned

Houston, Tex., June 30 (AP)—Permission to build a \$200,000,000 natural gas pipeline from Houston to the Pacific northwest was requested yesterday of the federal power commission.

The request was made by the Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation.

Robert R. Herring, president of the company, said the 2,400-mile pipeline would deliver 350,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily to Seattle and Spokane, Wash., Portland, Ore., Salt Lake City, Utah, and other cities. It would extend all the way to Vancouver B.C.

It would also deliver fuel to atomic energy commission plants in Washington and Idaho, Herring said.

No definite route for the line has been set, but the company officials said it would originate in the gas-rich Gulf coast fields near Houston, cross Texas for 500 miles to tap the fields of west Texas and the Panhandle.

"The link established in our defense chain by this transmission system is of great strategic importance in the face of our pending international situation," he said.

Fire Regulations Effective July 1

Portland, June 30 (AP)—National forest fire regulations go into effect July 1, the forest service headquarters here reminded prospective week-end and July 4 vacationists.

Campfire permits will be required in all of the Oregon and Washington national forests except Rogue River, Siuslaw, Whitman, Umatilla and Olympic. Permits can be obtained from any ranger.

Regulations forbid smoking while traveling except on hard-surfaced roads and require that camping parties have a shovel, ax and bucket.

Fireworks are banned from national forests.

Kermit W. Linstedt, regional fire chief, warned that despite recent rains many forests are dry and the expected influx of holiday campers holds a serious fire threat.

Inside there is a bell crank, which is connected to the elevator, or tail control. Two steel wires come down to earth and the guy guiding things has a firm hand on both. He twists his wrist, much as the operator of model planes do, to keep the saucer from going afoul.

Scientist Matthews is proud of his latest creation, which he put together in two nights. But he is even more proud of the first one he built—the little job that would stay in the air only 10 seconds.

That one cost him about \$5 in balsa wood, plus the glue and paint, plus \$2 for a motor which he re-built, plus a lot of work. But Uncle Sam put the thing on tour and picked up over \$1,000,000 in war bonds.

"We wore the darn thing out," he said.

Believe Bus Thief Sighted

Albany, June 30 (AP)—A school bus thief was hunted in the Cascade mountains six miles northwest of Sweet Home today as a possible accomplice of a man held as a safe-cracker.

The search was launched by Sheriff H. A. Southard and state police after receiving a phone call from a McDowell creek farmer named Lamson that the stolen bus had been located near his home. It had been stolen Tuesday night at Foster.

Southard speculated that the thief might have been one of two men seen in the Quartzville creek cabin belonging to Dr. Henry Garnjost of Corvallis. Garnjost reported he saw them when he drove up Sunday. One had a rifle, he reported.

Police found Ted Nichols in the cabin, but the man carrying the rifle had disappeared, and Southard believes he may have stolen the bus.

Police Chief Ray Maddy said Nichols admitted three burglaries and safe-cracking jobs, one at Lebanon and two here.

Oh Where, Oh Where Can She Be?

Albany—State Police Sergeant Ernest Larion asked that anyone seeing a stray school bus please report to headquarters here.

The officer said that at about midnight Tuesday someone as yet unidentified drove off with the Sunnyside district No. 97 bus from Foster, where it was being kept. Late Wednesday it had not been recovered.

The bus, 9-passenger Chevrolet carryall, bears the name of the district painted on both sides on the customary yellow background. Sgt. Larion said. He added that an associate of Ted Nichols, held on charges of burglarizing three Linn county establishments during the week-end, is suspected as the school bus thief.

New Trial to Be Sought for Wilsons

Vancouver, Wash., June 30 (AP)—Defense attorneys announced they would file a motion today for a new trial for Utah and Turman Wilson, convicted of kidnapping and slaying an 18-year-old girl.

The attorneys, Irvin Goodman and Sanford Clement, said the state's case was based solely on circumstantial evidence and "mere suspicion."

They charged, too, that Clark county law enforcement officers failed to "exert every effort and explore all clues" in their investigation, and mentioned that clothes of the victim, Jo Ann Dewey, were not found.

The girl's nude body, sexually violated, was found in lonely Wind river a week after she was kidnapped from a dark street here March 19.

Diapers Get Hurried Call In Evacuation

Tokyo, June 30 (AP)—Diapers were in big demand today among American mothers evacuated from war-torn Korea.

Hurried departure prevented them from bringing enough with them and the Red Cross does not carry diapers in its usual overseas stocks.

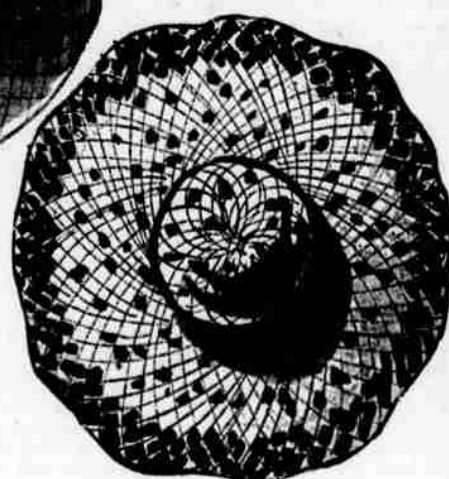
