

Fire Raging in Olympia Forest

Olympia, July 3 (AP)—A hard-to-kill forest fire above the Hamma Hamma river in Washington's Olympic National Forest was reported out of control again today.

The blaze is on a precipitous ridge southwest of Quilcene, L. D. Blodgett, assistant to the forest supervisor, said here he did not think the situation was "too bad yet" although the blaze had jumped fire lines.

It started originally by a lightning-strike June 16 and was temporarily controlled after several days of fighting.

The state forestry division reported meanwhile that the Fourth of July week-end has already been a hot one for state crews. Asst. State Forester L. T. Webster said 26 fires flared up yesterday on state-protected timber lands.

They along with 10 fires which started Saturday, have been brought under control but not all of them have been put out. The 36 fires blackened 69 acres. Webster attributed the big jump in the number of fires to "the tremendous number of people who have gone to the woods for the holiday."

"Because of the fact weather conditions are now very critical we ask that people use every caution to guard against fires," he said.

School Budget Vote Very Close

Unofficial tabulation of the voting on the Marion county rural school budget elections was so close Monday at noon that only the actual vote canvass, to be conducted Thursday evening, July 6, will tell the tale.

Though the measure to approve a \$1,004,797 tax levy over the 6 percent limitation was behind with a total unofficial vote of 2074 for the measure and 2124 against it, a sufficient number of districts still had not reported while many others had submitted sealed envelopes of ballots without any marking, to make the issue still more or less in doubt.

Opponents of the measure were confident of victory and even the heartier of the proponents seemed a trifle resigned, but board members still awaited the official count before issuing any statement.

3 More Bud Spraying Airplanes Crash

Baker, July 3 (AP)—Budworm spraying operations have claimed three more planes in this area, the CAA reported here today.

Two planes were reported to have crashed and a third was missing on spraying operations out of Lagrange in the vicinity of Cove.

The CAA said details of the accidents are lacking here. One of the crashed planes belonged to Hammer Budworm Spraying company and the other two planes were owned by the Roberts Aircraft company of Lovelock, Nev.

CAA officials here said no further word has been received on the fate of a BT-13, also owned by the Roberts company, which disappeared last Wednesday in the Ponderosa area.

British Warships Unscathed in Battle

London, July 3 (AP)—The British admiralty disclosed today that British warships came through unscathed in their first fight with North Korean vessels.

Supplementing Gen. MacArthur's communique—which said a combined U. S. and British fleet sank five of six motor torpedo boats engaged off the Korean east coast yesterday—the admiralty released a message from Admiral Sir Patrick Brind, British naval commander-in-chief in the Far East.

The message said that one torpedo boat—the British call them E boats—got away. "Shore targets were also bombarded," Brind reported. "No damage or casualties were suffered by the British or U. S. ships."

It was the first British official statement on action in the Korean war.

Contract Is Let For Area of McNary Dam

Walla Walla, Wash., July 3 (AP)—Army engineers announced \$505,448 in contracts today for work connected with McNary dam construction.

A \$242,079 contract went to the Utah Construction Co., Richmond, Calif., for construction of railroad bridges at Juniper canyon and Spring gulch, plus highway bridges at the same points for relocation of U. S. highways 730 and 395.

A \$237,555 contract for construction of a sewage lift plant and a pumping plant at Richland, Wash., went to Fred J. Early, Jr. Co., San Francisco. They will go behind levees which will protect Richland when the McNary reservoir is filled.

The Central Asphalt Co., Pasco, got a \$25,814 contract for paving streets at McNary, Ore.

Korea Thanks UN, US for Aid

Taejon, Korea, July 3 (AP)—The foreign minister of invaded South Korea today thanked the United States and United Nations for support and said this may be "the hour of recession of the tide of communism."

Ben C. Limb issued a statement saying that "America's strong belief in liberty and freedom could not be better expressed than by her realistic action on this July 3, the eve of the United States Independence Day anniversary."

The invaded republic's national assembly today, at its fifth temporary session somewhere in Korea, thanked President Truman and the United Nations for its prompt assistance.

The message to President Truman said:

"The people of Korea and all who defend freedom thank your excellency and the American people for their quick and adequate decision to extend military aid to Korea in order to defend democracy and uphold the principles of the United Nations."

To the United Nations went this message:

"... until we completely overcome the root of this trouble which brings nothing but misery and disaster to the human race, we do expect your continuous aid in order to establish true peace in the world."

Both were signed by Assembly Chairman P. H. Shinicky.

Additional B-29s Ordered to East

Washington, July 3 (AP)—The Air Force today ordered additional B-29 superfortresses to the far east.

The exact number was not disclosed in an Air Force announcement.

Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff, said the planes will be flown from March Air Force base, Riverside, Calif., and Spokane Air Force base, Spokane, to advanced American bases in the Pacific.

The announcement said the B-29's "will be the first additional Air Force units assigned to that theater (the far east) since the invasion of South Korea."

Spokane, Wash., July 3 (AP)—The Spokane Air Force base, on an alert status for several days, confirmed today that "some" of its B-29 bombers had been ordered to the Pacific ocean area.

The Spokane base is the home station for the 98th bomb group.

Korean Invasion Testing Ground

Washington, July 3 (AP)—The invasion of South Korea is seen by Senator Tydings (D-Md) as a testing ground in which communist Russia is seeing how far she can go "before the democratic world will call a halt."

Tydings, chairman of the senate armed services committee, was one of several lawmakers who discussed the Korean situation in week-end radio programs.

Others included: Senator Taft (R-Ohio), who said "our own weak policy" in the far Pacific invited the communist attack.

Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) who said that "American boys are dying in Korea" because the aid program which congress voted was sabotaged, he charged, by "a group of untouchables in the state department."

Tydings said the action of the United States as a member of the United Nations in sending armed aid to the South Koreans actually may avoid or at least delay the start of a third World war.

"Russia is using Korea as a testing ground to see how far she can take territory by force before the democratic world will call a halt on her."

Moscow Reports Russians Angry

Moscow, July 3 (AP)—The Moscow press said today that popular indignation over American intervention in Korea is spreading throughout Russia.

The communist party newspaper Pravda said protest meetings were taking place in factories and office buildings all over the country.

It was also noted that the supreme Soviet of the Russian Socialist Federated Soviet Republic—largest of the U. S. S. R.'s 16 republics—meets in the Kremlin tomorrow. It is described as a routine session, which was announced last month. The supreme Soviets of the other 15 republics are also scheduled to meet soon in their respective capitals.

(Much of the press comment on public reaction to the Korean crisis appeared to be a reshuffle of stories which appeared last week. At that time the papers said the public remained calm. Now they appeared to be trying to stir the people up against the United States.)

"The Soviet people," Pravda said in a front-page editorial, "and all progressive humanity express a decisive protest against American aggression in Korea and are strengthening the struggle for a firm peace in all the world against warmongers."



Attacks Korea Aid—The CIO Marine Cooks and Stewards union, headed by Hugh Bryson (above) in San Francisco, has called on the government to "immediately cease American intervention in Korea." 3 Oregon Deaths Mark Holidays

Violent deaths in the Fourth of July week-end in Oregon increased to three today.

A highway crash two miles east of Scottsburg in southwestern Oregon fatally injured Charles S. Longfellow, 63, Lakeview yesterday (Sunday). He was thrown to the pavement when his car collided head-on with another driven by Arnold Lynn Voorhees, 60, Oakdale, Calif. Voorhees was charged with negligent homicide.

There also were two drownings, both children.

Kerry Michael Wilkins 1 1/2, of Bandon, drowned in a swift-flowing irrigation ditch at Medford yesterday (Sunday).

Saturday, Ronald W. Miller, 11, of Oregon City, was drowned while playing in the surf at Seaside. He and two companions were knocked down by a wave. The others were rescued, but Miller was swept away.

More of the ideal weather which has added to the pleasures of vacationers so far was forecast today, although a few scattered thundershowers were expected in the extreme southern portion of Oregon tomorrow.

The hot, dry weather, and low humidity, however, kept forest officials worried.

Blast Destroys 'Cracker Stand'

Richard Allen of Salem suffered a fire loss of around \$3000, and people in east Portland got a spectacular fireworks show Sunday when a fireworks stand blew up and burned.

Allen deals extensively in fireworks and has stands in Portland, Salem, Eugene and at coast points. He is the man who represented fireworks dealers and made arguments before the city council that caused the council to relent and permit a four-day sale and one-day shooting of fireworks in Salem this July 4 season.

His Portland stand that was destroyed Sunday was located on 82nd street near Powell and was in charge of Eugene J. Zuger, also of Salem.

The stock, valued at about \$2,000, went up with a thunderous boom that was heard for several miles. A tent valued at \$1,000 was burned.

Firemen said they thought a lighted firecracker tossed toward the stand caused the blast.

Elliott Kissed By Fair Red Head

New York, July 3 (AP)—Thrice-remembered Elliott Roosevelt rekindled speculation today on his arrival from Europe that he was again in the matrimonial market.

Shortly after stepping from an airplane at International airport, a beautiful, red-haired girl rushed into his arms.

Roosevelt kissed her warmly on the cheek, bundled her into an automobile driven by one of his brothers and left for an unknown destination.

The mystery girl was approximately five-foot six inches tall, brown-eyed and shapely. She wore a white linen dress and red shoes. Reporters said she was "the model type."

The son of the late president and his mother were abroad for approximately a month and toured nine countries.

As soon as he stepped from the plane, Roosevelt was bombarded with question about his reported romance with Fashion Model Betty Boyd, Bogalusa, La.

Control Tower Has Big Month

Good flying weather, the Air Force's use of McNary field for summer training of Portland Reservists, and Naval Air Reserve cruises during the month of June gave the Salem airport's control tower the biggest month since it opened here early in 1949.

The total of 8,723 operations for the month of June exceeded by 825 the previous high month of May, 1950, when there were a total of 7,998 operations.

U. S. Bank Hikes Rate on Savings

The United States National bank has increased the interest rate on savings accounts and has announced a proposed 20 percent stock dividend.

Savings depositors of the bank will receive 50 percent more interest on their savings beginning July 1, 1950. E. C. Sammons, president of the state-wide banking system, explained. The rate has been increased from 1 percent to 1 1/2 percent on savings accounts under \$10,000 and to 1 percent on amounts over that sum.

The rate increase will mean a savings "dividend" to depositors in the aggregate sum of approximately \$375,000 in 1950 and about \$750,000 in 1951.

Stockholders of the United States National bank will benefit from a proposed 20 percent stock dividend if a plan approved by the board of directors is ratified at the bank's stockholders' meeting called for August 11, 1950, and if the plan also meets with approval of the comptroller of currency, Sammons stated.

Rev. Browning Sent To Toledo-Siletz

The appointment by Bishop Kennedy of Rev. Ben F. Browning to the pastorate of the Methodist church of Toledo-Siletz effective August 1, has been announced by Rev. Roy A. Fedje, Salem district superintendent.

Rev. Browning has served the Silverton Methodist church for the past four years. He is a native of Oklahoma and was educated in the college and seminary of Southern Methodist university of Dallas, Texas.
