

Economy Drive Strikes a Snag

Washington, July 7 (AP)—A senate appropriations committee fight over individual items delayed today a republican effort to whack a big chunk out of the \$29,000,000,000 one-package spending bill.

Republican members agreed unanimously to support a proposed amendment which would force a 10 per cent cut in travel allowances for most agencies.

The FBI, secret service, customs bureau, immigration service and international revenue agents would be exempted.

In the post office department, the cuts would be two per cent for personnel and five per cent on travel.

Senator Bridges (R-NH) said the budget bureau had described the amendment as workable. It was proposed as a substitute for the house-approved Taber amendment which cut \$600,000,000 off the original house bill and the Jensen amendment which would have prevented government agencies from filling more than 10 per cent of the job vacancies that occur.

Under terms of the republican proposal, President Truman could increase appropriations in any emergency by submitting supplemental estimates to congress.

Members said the appropriations group, seeking a final agreement on the bill, may not get around to the republican proposal until tomorrow.

Money Asked for Hydrogen Bomb

Washington, July 7 (AP)—President Truman today asked congress for \$260,000,000 to speed development of atomic bombs and push experiments on the hydrogen bomb.

Mr. Truman said the money would be used to enable the atomic energy commission "to build additional and more efficient plants" to carry out his directive of Jan. 31 ordering work on the H-bomb.

The president said the fundamental objective is to use atomic energy for peace, but he added: "Until this objective is achieved, however, we must strengthen our own defenses by providing the necessary atomic energy capacity."

He pointed out in a statement that his January directive called on the AEC "to continue its work on all forms of atomic weapons, including the hydrogen or fusion bomb."

Mr. Truman did not mention Sumner T. Pike, who has been acting chairman of the AEC by name, but he had these words to say in connection with his confidence in the commission:

"In this new undertaking (speeding the progress of the atomic energy program) the atomic energy commission has my complete confidence, based upon the able and vigorous leadership it has given to the atomic energy program in the past."

Council of Churches Lauds Korean Action

New York, July 7 (AP)—Top officers of the nation's largest representative Protestant organization yesterday lauded the United Nations for its "prompt and vigorous" action in dealing with the invasion of South Korea.

Bishop John S. Stamm, president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, and the Rev. Dr. Samuel McRea Cavert, general secretary, said in a statement that "the aggression is a most direct challenge" to the U. N.'s authority in preserving peace.

The council represents 27 Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations.

Greenglass Indicted For Selling A-Secrets

Santa Fe, N.M., July 7 (AP)—David Greenglass, 28, has been indicted for selling U.S. atomic secrets to a go-between for Russian agents for \$500.

Greenglass, an army tech sergeant who helped assemble atom bombs during the last months of World War II, was indicted by a federal grand jury here yesterday on charges of conspiracy.

The grand jury charged that Greenglass delivered the atomic secrets to Harry Gold at Albuquerque, N.M., June 3, 1945—when America was at war—and received \$500 in currency from Gold.

UN Moves Into Korea
Tokyo, July 7 (AP)—The United Nations commission on Korea will set up headquarters in Pusan, South Korea, it announced today. Col. Alfred G. Katzin of South Africa, head of the U. N. commission, conferred in Pusan today with U. S. Ambassador John H. Muccio and Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, commander of American forces in Korea.

Mrs. Walter S. Heller, president, said that with this class, Guide Dogs for the Blind, Inc. has provided 135 blind persons with guide dogs at no cost to the blind. Of this number six have been residents of Oregon.

Miss King is employed here by the Arbuckle shoe store and Kirchoff by the Salem Automobile company. They were visiting at the hospital by Miss King's sister, Mrs. Chester Mulkey of Salem, and her brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Verle King of Silverton, who returned Thursday.

Kirchoff and Miss King were on a week-end vacation trip when their car collided with a truck. Kirchoff's car was demolished.

8 Million Feet Going on Sale

A minimum of 8 million board feet of timber will be offered at oral auction by the state forestry department, Salem, at 10 a.m. on July 24 for the sale of all salvable timber in the Rock Creek area south of Mill City, according to Lynn F. Cronmiller, assistant state forester.

The sale covers salvage of patches and scattered stands of yellow fir, snags, windfalls and hemlock and red cedar on some 7,000 acres of state forest land. This area was logged some 20 to 30 years ago by the Hammond Lumber company, using railroad transportation.

Present high lumber values make it possible to remove this type of material, which would not be economically feasible to cut under ordinary conditions. Removal of the old stagnated timber and replacement with young, fast growing trees is a part of the state forestry management plan to get the land back into maximum timber production.

The timber sale contract will require construction of 1.7 miles of new truck road and 5.7 miles of old railroad grade to be converted into a truck road. The contract also includes the installation of a number of corrugated iron culverts and two bridges. Following completion of the logging, the road system will be used by the state forestry department for fire protection and forest management purposes.

Minimum stumpage prices that will be considered are listed as follows: Old growth Douglas fir, \$5 per thousand board feet; Western red cedar and hemlock, \$3 per thousand board feet.

Conference on Korea Held

Washington, July 7 (AP)—President Truman summoned congressional military leaders today for a conference on what Senator Bridges (R, N.H.) said was "an emergency matter."

Senator Bridges made the statement to reporters: "He entered the White House for the meeting amid reports that an announcement dealing with increased troop strength might be forthcoming."

Members of the senate and house armed services committees formed the group that went to the White House.

Besides Bridges, there were Chairman Tydings (D, Md.), of the house group, and Rep. Arden (R, Ill.), a ranking GOP member of the house committee.

Bridges said he did not know the nature of the "emergency matter" and Tydings also professed not to know the occasion for the presidential summons.

President Truman talked over the Far Pacific fighting for an hour with his cabinet this morning.

Mrs. L. V. Benson is chairman for the group of volunteer staff aides to assist during the visitation and Mrs. William H. Burghardt is chairman in securing volunteer nurses aides for the visitation.

A second visit for the unit in Salem this month will be July 27 when the local naval reserves will sponsor the bloodmobile. This visitation will be during evening hours and effort is being made to get the interested public signed up to donate at that time.

No Orders Yet On Oregon Draft

Oregon draft boards have been given no instructions to step-up classification of men.

That was the word given the United Press in Portland Friday morning by Col. Francis Mason, deputy state selective service director.

Mason, who only recently returned from a conference in Washington of state directors of selective service, further stated that classification in this state has been going on in a routine manner.

In California that state's draft boards have been ordered to begin classifying men who do not meet deferment requirements as 1-A.

Speaking for the selective service office of that state Lt. Col. Walter Henderson told United Press that the order was not an emergency measure but a move "to get the selective service's affairs in order." He admitted that the Korean crisis was a contributing factor to the order.

County Court Sees Gravel Pit

Marion County Judge Grant Murphy and Commissioners Roy Rice and E. L. Rogers Thursday inspected the county's recently-acquired gravel site near Monitor.

The county has signed a ten-year lease with W. O. White, owner of the gravel site, where in Marion county gets first chance at all gravel coming from the property.

Members of the court who inspected the site reported Friday that the gravel bar is now cleaned up and in good shape, and a road leading up to it is to be completed sometime Friday.

The county will start setting up facilities to remove gravel immediately, and within a few days will be able to haul gravel out of the site. The gravel will be used for road-building and road-improvement purposes.

German Potato Bugs All Red Asserts U. S.

Washington, July 7 (AP)—Russia's charge that potato bugs were dropped from American planes to sabotage East German crops drew a comeback from the state department yesterday.

The department didn't dignify the Russian note with a direct reply. Instead, it issued a diplomatic statement which said:

(A) The charge was a "fantastic fabrication"; (B) the Russians borrowed the idea from German Nazi tactics; (C) it was an excuse for a serious potato shortage in eastern Europe and (D) the bugs, if there were any, must be communist bugs.

Spud Support End This Year

Washington, July 7 (AP)—Government price supports for potatoes—which have cost about \$475,000,000 since they were started during the last war—appear likely to end with this year's crop.

Congress has directed that supports after this year be provided only if rigid marketing quotas are imposed to hold down surplus production.

But as the law stands now, the agriculture department has no authority to set up quotas. Legislation providing quota machinery has been introduced, but department officials do not expect a busy and adjournment-minded congress to pass it.

Meanwhile, preliminary reports indicate it cost the government about \$85,000,000 to support prices of the 1949 crop. This is a sharp reduction from the \$225,000,000 spent on the 1948 crop.

The department is now buying early-harvested potatoes from the 1950 crop to carry out a price guarantee averaging about \$1 a bushel. Last year's crop was supported at an average of about \$1.10.

So far, the department has bought about 3,750,000 bushels of 1950-crop potatoes, largely in North Carolina and Virginia.

Russians Step-up War Maneuvers

Berlin, July 7 (AP)—U. S. intelligence agents disclosed today that the Russians have stepped up normal summer maneuvers in East Germany.

These informants said that in East Germany eight Soviet divisions are going through special exercises. Some involve tank-supported river crossings.

Experts, who with increased interest have noted every Russian move since the Korean fighting broke out, said this increased Red troop activity could be a normal step—designed to let the Germans know who is boss and possibly to give western allies a dose of jitters.

Oil Industry Geared

Washington, July 7 (AP)—The oil industry told the government today it is geared for overnight conversion for any emergency. Walter S. Hallanan, chairman of the National Petroleum Council, said in a letter to secretary of interior Chapman that the industry has the reserves, the productive facilities, the trained personnel and the technological know-how that may be required.

\$2 Million in Box Spurned

Birmingham, Ala., July 1 (AP)—A cardboard box jammed with more than \$2,000,000 in cash was spurned by Robert I. Ingalls, Jr., at odds with his father in a dispute involving a vast family industrial empire.

Ingalls refused to touch the money, offered him for 4,501 shares which he owns out of 13,000 shares in industrial holdings valued at \$25,000,000.

Armed guards brought the cardboard box to the office of Gen. John Persons, president of the First National bank. Ingalls had been asked to wait there.

Details of the offer, which was made Wednesday, were disclosed by participants yesterday.

When the offer was made, Ingalls conferred with his attorneys, then calmly turned it down.

"It was very simple," he said later. "I would have taken a loss of several million dollars."

France Approves U.S. Action
Paris, July 7 (AP)—The French national assembly's foreign affairs committee approved today, 25 to 13, United States action in Korea. The opposing votes were cast by communists, who proposed a motion terming the U.S. action "aggression." It was defeated by the same vote, 25 to 13.

Divided Report Looms on Reds

Washington, July 7 (AP)—Sharply-divided senate investigators disclosed today there will be at least three—and possibly five—separate reports on their communist inquiry.

Senator Tydings (D, Md.), chairman of a senate foreign relations subcommittee which made the investigation, told reporters the two republican members of the five man group had served notice that they each will prepare their own report.

As for the three democratic members, Tydings said: "We have not congealed on any one report yet."

Tydings talked to newsmen after the committee met behind closed doors for an hour and a half to discuss a proposed preliminary report prepared by the staff.

The committee's four-month investigation dealt with charges by Senator McCarthy (R, Wis.) that the state department harbors communists and fellow travelers.

In a new exchange between McCarthy and the state department, the senator accused Acheson of having "sabotaged and vetoed the attempt of congress to fortify south Korea" prior to the communist invasion.

Sewage Plant To Cost \$800,000

Completed plans for the Salem sewage disposal plant, to be built this year, were brought to Salem Thursday by John W. Cunningham, Portland engineer. Cunningham said he would be able to let City Manager J. L. Franzen know next week when a call for bids on the construction can be made.

The plant is estimated to cost around \$800,000. It is one of the first projects in the city manager's 10-year program of city development. It is on the "must" list because of the policy of the state sanitary authority in demanding disposal plants as a means of river purification.

The plant when completed will be connected with the new interceptor sewer, which is already in service. Until completion of the plant the sewer will have its outlet in the river.

Excavation for the plant is now being done and will be finished in a few days, with the exception of some excavation that will be needed later. The excavation contract is held by Salem Sand & Gravel company.
