Tuna Hearty-Party Casserole

1 7-oz. can Tuna
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
2 cups milk
4 cups thinly sliced potatoes
1 cup thinly sliced onions
½ cup dry white wine
Melt butter in saucepan, stir in flour, mustard, salt and pepper. Add milk gradually while stirring and cook over low heat until smooth and thickened. Arrange potatoes, tuna, and onions in alternate layers in a well-greased casserole dish. Add wine to sauce, pour over all, and bake in a moderate oven (375 degree F.) for 45 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

Tuna & Egg Casserole

2 7-oz. cans 2 (cups) Tuna
2 tablespoons lemon juice
4 sliced hard-cooked eggs
1 cooked or canned peas
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
3 tablespoons flour
2 cups scalded sweet milk
¼ cup grated cheese
1 cup fresh bread crumbs
Salt, pepper, nutmeg
Drain tuna and reserve oil. Flake fish and sprinkle lemon juice over it. In greased 1½ quart casserole arrange in layers flaked fish, eggs, and peas, seasoning to taste with salt and pepper while arranging the layers.

In a saucepan melt butter or margarine, blend in flour and grated cheese, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens.

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Tuna à la King

1 7-oz. can Tuna
1 can condensed mushroom soup
½ cup milk
2 tablespoons butter
Worcestershire sauce
Salt
Pepper
Add milk and butter to soup and season with salt, pepper and a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Add tuna; heat and pour over crisp toast. Serves 4 to 6.

4 Recipes for Using Tuna Fish

You've heard, of course, about the sweet young bride who couldn't boil water. Frankly, it is doubtful if anyone in this day and age is that helpless in the kitchen. Nevertheless there was quite a number of very young, newly-marrieds around now who are interested in sure-fire never-fail dishes. Accordingly here are four good ones, all made with tuna, and all easy to prepare, even for the most inexperienced cook.

First there is Tuna à la King which is pretty much of a classic in the recipe line. You can't miss with this one. Just be sure your liquid is cool when you add it to the roux. Serve your Tuna à la King on hot biscuits or a crisp waffle, with a tossed green salad for accompaniment.

There is no chance of failure with the Hearty Party Casserole either. You can prepare this one a little ahead of time too, which simplifies that last-minute rushing about. Keep this one in mind for Sunday night suppers.

Tuna and Egg Casserole is another dependable dish, especially when there's a hungry man around. Tuna of course is extra-rich in protein. Ounce for

Pour this cream sauce over the tuna in the casserole. Bake the dish in a moderate oven (375 degree F.) for 25-30 minutes and serve hot from casserole. Serves 6 to 8.

Tuna Sandwich
1 7-oz. can Tuna

½ teaspoon lemon juice
1 tablespoon catsup
3 tablespoons salad dressing
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Flake tuna and add lemon juice, catsup, salad dressing and Worcestershire sauce. Fills 4 to 6 sandwiches.

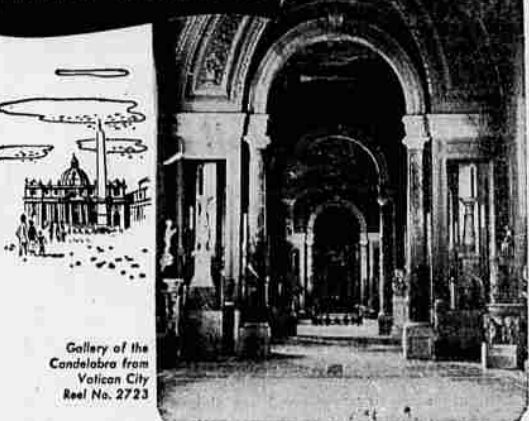


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
