Marshall Nations Open Own Bank

Paris, July 8 (AP)—Europe's 18 Marshall plan countries prepared today to do business through their own international bank, a European Payments Union (EUP) to unfetter trade by cancelling out foreign currency shortages.

The nations, members of the European Economic Cooperation Organization (OEEC), agreed unanimously yesterday to set up the currency clearing house. OEEC secretary-general Robert Marjolin called it the "most important financial decision" since foundation of the world bank in 1946.

Experts now will draw up detailed rules for EPU operations. They hope to have a final convention ready for signature early in August. Its provisions will be retroactive to July 1.

Previously European nations, their trade geared to a system of bilateral agreements with each other, could buy only in the countries whose currency they had stocks of. Now they will deposit their holdings with the central agency, receiving in return EPU credits good for purchases in any other member country.

The union provides Europe's first postwar multilateral trading system. The adherence to it of Britain and the sterling area links that major financial bloc with European nations in a postwar British commercial policy.

Grandchildren of Mrs. Hammack who are living in Salem are Richard Van Pelt, Miss Mary Hammack, Donald Hammack, James Hammack, Miss Norma Hammack, and Mrs. Gladys Miller. There are six great grandchildren and one great, great grandchild in the clan. The Hammacks have always lived in this vicinity.

Polio Group Building Up Reserve for Emergency

Because of several recent contributions, the Marion county polio group is building up a slight reserve to meet any new emergency this summer, it is reported by officials of the chapter.

At the meeting of the group this week, a check for \$200 was received from Salem Spinners club, a check for \$25 from Holly-wood Lions club auxiliary, and a check for \$200 from Salem Lions club auxiliary.

Bills are running \$1000 or better a month, however, and with payment of the past month's bills the balance will be slightly more than \$3000. During the winter the group's balance was practically nothing but a grant extended from the national foundation has given some reserve for the local group. Last year, more than \$14,000 was spent in aiding local persons stricken with polio and any outbreak in the county this summer would again find the chapter's books in the red.

One event this summer to boost funds for the chapter will be the Horace Heidt show in early August.

A check on some of the cases for the past year shows more than \$5000 spent for one man who is still in a Portland hospital receiving treatment. The man has a wife and six children but the chapter's assistance is for the man only and his hospital and physiotherapy treatments.

Another case, that of a young girl, also has been given some \$2000 in assistance by the local chapter.

Seattle 'Bomb' Raid Monday

Seattle, July 8 (AP)—Seattle will be A-bombed twice next Monday—one an underwater blast in Elliott bay at 6:50 a.m., and the second an aerial explosion from a height of 2,500 feet at 3:05 p.m. Both will be imaginary.

The theoretical attack will test the city's new civilian defense organization and provide a dress rehearsal of possible future disaster.

Results will be scrutinized, studied and analyzed by government officials from Washington, D.C., along with mayors and other officials of west coast cities.

They will assemble here a week from the day of the hypothetical attack and hold daily critiques to review in detail the defense program put into effect. The date and times of the atomic explosions were relayed to Mayor William F. Devin yesterday by the national security resources board. The areas of devastation were definitely outlined, supposed casualties in killed and wounded were given in exact numbers, the size of the tidal wave presumably created by the underwater blast was fixed and the number of evacuees was listed.

Seattle is one of three cities in the United States chosen for the simulated A-bomb attacks. The others are Chicago and Washington, D.C.

Lebanese Vote To Support UN

Cairo, Egypt, July 8 (AP)—Guarded Lebanese support of United Nations action in Korea appeared today to promise defeat for efforts to create an Egyptian-led Arab neutrality front on the Korean question.

Syria and Iraq were reported considering decisions on Korea independent of Egypt. Circles close to Hashemite Jordan's King Abdullah already have indicated that, while not a UN member, his government sided with the western powers on the Far East fighting.

There was an indication, too, that Egypt, who abstained from the security council call for military action in Korea, might modify her "absolute hands off" policy. The Arab league's secretary-general, Abdel Rahman Azzam Pasha, said in Alexandria yesterday that Egypt's policy toward Korea "does not necessarily imply that Egypt wants to stay aloof from UN measures in the interest of peace."
