Western World Must Arm For War, Says Gen. DeGaulle

Editor's Note: Gen. Charles DeGaulle, who foresaw many of the pitfalls of World War II, discusses the current world crisis and his proposals for meeting it in the following interview with A. L. Bradford, United Press vice president for Europe.

It is the first interview DeGaulle has granted since 1945, when he still was in power in France.

Paris, July 13 (AP)—The western world must prepare for a war with Soviet Russia, Gen. Charles DeGaulle told me today.

He said the communist adventure in Korea was preparation for a Soviet attack on Europe.

He stressed the weakness of the western powers and urged sweeping rearmament to meet the danger.

Europe is in "mortal peril," according to the French leader, who, in the opinion of observers, is more likely than ever to come back to power through elections that may be hastened by repeated political crises.

"We are a coalition," De Gaulle said, emphasizing that Europe must first be covered as the advance danger zone.

Germany should be included in the system of western strategy, he said, but on the basis first of an accord between France and Germany, to be followed by a federation of Europe to include Germany.

Spain should not be left out of the western security system, in De Gaulle's opinion.

Describing the attack against South Korea as a "signal of alarm which is reverberating around the world," De Gaulle said it was to President Truman and Gen. Douglas MacArthur that credit should go for the decision finally to resist communist aggression.

De Gaulle said the American intervention has been of "tremendous significance" in showing the world the U. S. will throw in power and lives as well as money and propaganda to fight communist domination.

The war carried on by France for four years in Indo-China is part of the same struggle, he said.

The Asiatic struggle proves to the western powers that their forces are insufficient, De Gaulle said, adding: "That is grave enough in Asia. But for Europe it is a mortal peril."

"Perhaps civilization will be saved because Korea has revealed the weakness of the western powers in time for them to remedy it."

"God only knows whether war is inevitable between Russia and the west... We should expect the worst and do everything necessary to win if the worst takes place."

Wally Not Mentioned

Los Angeles, July 13 (AP)—The first husband of the Duchess of Windsor, Earl Winfield Spencer, Jr., left his entire estate to his widow, Lillian.

Filed for probate yesterday, his will made no mention of the former Wallis Warfield, whom he married in 1923. They were divorced in 1927.

Spencer, who died at age 61 in Coronado, Calif., May 29, left an estate worth "in excess of \$25,000," his attorney said.

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Parents Learn Of Son in News

Klamath Falls, July 13 (AP)—The worried parents of a Klamath Falls soldier now on the Korean fighting front were relieved last night to receive word he was all right.

O. H. P. King, Associated Press war correspondent, reported from the Korean front that Cpl. George Seymour, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Seymour, was one of several messengers distributing maps of Korea. (It appeared in last night's Capital Journal.)

Mr. and Mrs. Seymour were not at home when the newspaper dispatch reached the office of the Herald and News here. A reporter left a note at the house, and the Seymours hurried to the newspaper office as soon as they returned home.

Their son, they said, is a veteran of World War II. He enlisted in 1948 and was sent to Korea. When fighting broke out, he was evacuated to Japan, but was sent back to Korea July 2.

"We hadn't heard anything from him since he wrote he was going back to Korea," Seymour said.

Marines Relax Some Standards

Washington, July 13 (AP)—The marines relaxed some physical requirements today to spur leatherneck recruiting.

The marine corps eased the standards on teeth and color preclusion.

The move was taken both to get experienced veterans to reenlist and to encourage new recruits.

The marines said that both reserve and nonreserve veterans may volunteer for a year's active duty. The marines want veterans up through the rank of sergeant.

New recruits may sign up for four years. The veterans are needed to fill the gap until recruits are brought up to combat efficiency in training camps.

Albany — Hoarding tactics came into vogue here this week with news of the Korean war serving as an impetus to buyers.

A major run on sugar was reported by a large number of local grocers Tuesday. One large chain store here was completely out of sugar in all sizes by Tuesday, another sold the last of its 100-pound sacks Monday, and had orders for 25 more.

If the buying spree continues, despite assurances across the country that there is not even a threat of sugar shortage, the sugar supply may be temporarily exhausted locally, it was reported. All wholesalers, however, report ample supplies available.

Grocers also report a run on coffee, canned goods and soap.

FBI to Cope with State Sabotage

Governor Douglas McKay said today that all state agencies which might be useful in protecting key industries would be placed at the disposal of the federal bureau of investigation if they are needed.

He added that he has full confidence in the ability of the FBI to cope with any sabotage of war industries.

The governor said he is conferring several times a day with Adjutant General Thomas E. Rilea on measures affecting security. He said that the state civilian defense agency's main role is not to prevent sabotage, but that it would help if asked by the FBI or local law enforcement agencies.

Casualty List Shows 20 Killed

Washington, July 13 (AP)—The defense department has announced that army Cpl. James P. Darcy, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Darcy, of La Mesa, Calif., had been killed in action in Korea.

This brought the number of identified killed in the Korea area to 20. Other casualties identified brought the number of missing to 23, wounded to 28, and injured to 14.

Second Lt. Donald A. Schwartz, Potter, Neb., was reported missing since July 7. He is an air force officer.
