

Indian Affairs Topic of State Conference Here Next Friday

A state conference on Indian affairs will be held at the capitol Friday, Gov. Douglas McKay said today.

The meeting, said the governor, is designed to bring together top officials of the bureau of Indian affairs, tribal leaders and heads of state departments which are actively interested in law enforcement, welfare, health, education and employment.

\$320,000 Sum Alimony Paid

Portland, July 13 (AP)—The ousted president of Doernbecher Manufacturing company, Harry A. Green, will pay a \$320,000 lump-sum alimony to his ex-wife plus a half interest in his \$400,000 Portland mansion.

That was the settlement presented to Circuit Judge Martin W. Hawkins today. He approved it and granted the uncontested divorce decree to Ada Green, 57, from the furniture manufacturer.

On the witness stand, gray-haired Mrs. Green said her husband frequented taverns, "associated with persons he shouldn't have associated with," and made her life unbearable by drunkenness and use of barbiturates.

Last February Green ordered the huge furniture manufacturing plant and its associated sawmill here shut down. There was no explanation. Four days later it reopened and the board of directors issued a statement which said Green had been succeeded in the presidency by E. S. Boech.

Green is listed as owner of 200,000 of the 602,000 shares of common stock in the company. The Greens were married 41 years ago.

Lady Mendl Dies After Sickness

Versailles, France, July 13 (AP)—Lady Charles Mendl, American-born hostess to three generations of international society's great, died at her home Wednesday of an arthritic complication.

She died after a long illness in the Versailles villa where her fabulous parties set an unmatched standard for glamor and originality.

The perennial "best-dressed woman" of fashion polls gave her birth date as Dec. 20, 1870. Her intimates said she was perhaps 10 years older. Her illness forced her into a

wheel chair early last year, and she was forced to curtail her social activities.

She is survived by her husband, Sir Charles Mendl of England. Born Elsie de Wolfe in New York City, Lady Mendl had an international reputation as an actress, interior decorator, globetrotter, and hostess.

Even after she was 70, Lady Mendl never acted her age. She continued to add to her fame with lavish parties and often astounded her guests with hand-springs or by standing on her head.

As one of the world's best dressed women, she usually spent about \$15,000 a year on clothes. Often she would appear with her white hair dyed pink, blue, or green to match her costumes.

Lady Mendl attributed her long life to a devotion to yoga and to "thinking young thoughts."
