

10 Percent Cut For U.S. Economy

Washington, July 14 (AP)—An economy plan calling for a flat 10 percent cut in all non-essential government spending was polished up for presentation in the senate today.

Senator Bridges (R-NH) said the proposal, sponsored by members of both parties, would chop some \$600,000,000 off the \$34,688,000,000 one-package appropriation bill now being debated by the lawmakers.

The big bill would finance the activities of most government agencies for the 12-month period which started July 1.

The economy amendment would order the heads of most of these agencies to spend no more than 90 percent of the funds allotted by the bill. Among the items exempted from the cut would be defense funds, atomic spending and certain fixed expenditures, such as the interest on the national debt.

The senate yesterday rejected on a 53 to 25 rollcall vote an effort by Senators Fulbright (D-Ark) and Lehman (D-Lib-NY) to add \$3,945,000 to funds for the Voice of America and its related programs.

It acted just as a request arrived from the White House for a new \$89,000,000 program to carry a "campaign of truth" to the peoples of the world in opposition to Soviet propaganda.

President Truman originally asked congress for \$36,645,000 to finance overseas information activities for the 1951 fiscal year. The house whacked \$2,645,000 from this total and the senate appropriations committee cut it back another \$1,300,000.

Mill Workers Ignore Pickets

Longview, Wash., July 14 (AP)—The sulphite pulp mill and the plywood mill of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, both AFL operated, were running on a full basis today as their employees decided to go through picket lines of the striking CIO International Woodworkers of America.

The plywood workers decided at a membership meeting this morning to man the plywood plant on the two-shift schedule it has maintained for the past several weeks.

The pulp mill employees are at work on a full schedule also after hearing orders last night from their international representative, William Riggs, to go to work.

Earlier yesterday it was explained by pulp union officials that the union officially ordered the men to work but that it would leave individual decisions up to the men. At the mill this morning, it was found that virtually all of them had decided to work.

Involved in the decision, union members disclosed, was the fact that seniority rights of the men would be endangered by refusal to report for work.

There was no trouble at the picket lines maintained by the IWA, which had 10 pickets on duty.

Britain's Doctors Threaten to Strike

Southport, Eng., July 14 (AP)—Britain's doctors threatened yesterday to quit working for the national health service unless the take-home pay of general practitioners is boosted.

Under the national health service all Britons are guaranteed free medical care.

A resolution approved by 400 delegates attending the British Medical Association's annual meeting called for a general withdrawal from the government-run health scheme because of delays in negotiations to raise the pay of general practitioners.

The delegates represent most of Britain's 80,000 doctors, of whom about 19,000 work for the national health service.

Santa Monica Stages Biggest Square Dance

Santa Monica, Calif., July 14 (AP)—Santa Monica, celebrating her 75th birthday, staged the world's largest square dance last night, and 8,000 costumed performers do-si-doed, dug for the clam and swung their partners as 36 callers took turns at the amplifier.

A crowd of 50,000 watched from grandstands, parkways and sidewalks. The dance floor was newly-laid pavement at Wilshire boulevard and Ocean avenue.

Largest previous square dance turnout, officials said, was the 2,608 performers at a Houston, Tex., festival.

Guest of honor was Dr. Lloyd Shaw of Colorado Springs, national authority on the square dance.

New Campaign For Propaganda

Washington, July 14 (AP)—An attempt to blast through the Russian radio jamming screen by sheer power is part of the proposed new "campaign of truth" sent to congress by President Truman.

Mr. Truman asked yesterday for \$89,000,000 to launch an immediate stepped up campaign against communist propaganda throughout the world. The president termed such a program "vital to our national security."

The biggest share of the special fund would be for powerful new transmitting equipment to carry the "Voice of America" in to all corners of the Far East and Europe—and to get through Soviet interference to listeners in Russia.

At almost the moment Mr. Truman's request reached Capitol Hill, the senate was defeating a proposal to add \$4,000,000 to the \$32,700,000 set aside for the "voice" in a big appropriations bill carrying funds for most government agencies for the year ending next June 30.

Some of the opposition to boosting appropriations for the state department broadcasts came from senators anxious to trim the \$34,688,000,000 "one-package" money bill wherever possible.

But other lawmakers who voted against the increase said they did so on grounds that congress would get another chance to consider additional funds for the voice after looking over the White House request.

U. N. Naval Craft Blast N. Korea

Tokyo, Saturday, July 15 (AP)—General MacArthur's communiqué today reported United Nations naval vessels blasted North Korea west coast ports with "fair to excellent results."

The communiqué did not specify nationalities of warships involved, but British and American vessels are the only ones that have been announced as being in that area. The Netherlands and French governments have promised ships, but their arrival has not been announced.

The communiqué said the United Nations naval vessels hit Uchih, Samehok and Bokuko, on the east coast, and British naval forces off the west coast shelled shore batteries at Peng-yong (Paengnyong) silencing three enemy gun positions. Peng-yong is an island in the Sir James Hall island group just below the 38th parallel.

The ships fired on enemy concentrations at Uchih, west coast railroad town 130 miles north of Pusan, the communiqué said. More communist troops were reported moving into Uchih.

Evanveline Booth Said Critically Ill

Hartsdale, N.Y., July 14 (AP)—Gen. Evangeline Booth, 84, retired head of the Salvation Army, was reported critically ill at her home today.

A Salvation Army spokesman quoted her physician as saying her death could be expected "in a matter of days."

Miss Booth, whose father founded the Salvation Army, became commander-in-chief of the international organization in 1934. She served until her retirement in 1939.

Bulgars Raid Slav Frontier

Belgrade, July 14 (AP)—Yugoslavia accused Bulgaria today of sending army patrols across the frontier yesterday in four separate incidents in which shots were exchanged and one Bulgarian soldier killed.

The Yugoslav foreign ministry handed the Bulgarian legation here a formal note, charging that the four incidents were touched off by Bulgarian efforts to capture Yugoslav guards on Yugoslav territory.

Yugoslavia demanded "most energetically" that the Bulgarian government "halt these practices."

The charge intensified the Balkan cold war of nerves between Premier Marshal Tito's government and the Russian-dominated Cominform which ousted Tito in 1948.

A broadcast recorded by the Belgrade radio said the incidents began early last evening when a Bulgarian soldier crossed the border into Yugoslav territory.

An hour later a group of 15 Bulgarian soldiers, with rifles at the ready, approached the frontier. Yugoslav guards ordered them to halt. One Bulgarian crossed the line, was ordered to drop his arms. He did so. Then, according to the Belgrade radio, after moving about 40 yards inside Yugoslav territory he seized a hidden hand grenade and threw it at a Yugoslav guard.

The Yugoslav patrol shot and killed him "in self-defense," the report said. The explosion caused an exchange of fire between the guards on each side of the border.

Later, Belgrade radio reported, a group of 50 Bulgarian soldiers approached Yugoslav territory but returned to their own soil later.

Still later, according to Belgrade radio, a Bulgarian guard opened fire on a Yugoslav guard, discharging more than 100 rounds.

ECA Says Britain Paid for Lumber

Washington, July 14 (AP)—The economic cooperation administration told Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) today that Great Britain's recent purchases of lumber from Russia and Poland were not made with ECA funds.

Norblad had written the ECA suggesting the purchase of some 480,000,000 feet of lumber had been made with money advanced by it.

William Foster, acting administrator, wrote Norblad that Great Britain bought the lumber from Russia with its own money, which was required to be spent in England for purchase of such supplies as the British permit to be exported to Russia.

Foster said this was an advantageous deal for Great Britain and that the American embassy in London reported the base price made the lumber a "good buy."

Fifth Congressman For Oregon Doubtful

Washington, July 14 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) said today it is doubtful that Oregon will get another congressional district even though it has had a large increase in population.

He told a reporter it has been generally assumed that the state would merit a fifth congressional district.

But, he continued, because of the increase in population throughout the country, the national ratio of population per congressman has risen from 302,688 in 1940 to 342,500 this year, based on a total population of 150,000,000.

Angell's district—Multnomah county—in 1940 had a population of 355,099, and this year's census gives it 467,760. This, he pointed out, is only about 115,000 more than the average.

Oldest Hippo

New York, July 14 (AP)—Pete, the oldest hippopotamus in captivity, celebrated his 47th birthday Thursday at the Bronx zoo.

Confesses to Killing Woman

Detroit, July 14 (AP)—Chief of Detectives Jack Harvill announced today that Sam B. Sampson, 42-year-old grocer-butcher, had confessed the strangulation slaying of Mrs. Vivian Stanley, attractive 37-year-old housewife.

The reported confession came shortly after police said Sampson had blamed "another man" for the killing.

They quoted him as saying an unidentified man jumped into a car in which he and Mrs. Stanley were riding and strangled her with his belt.

But police pressed their intensive questioning of Sampson after they said three lie detector tests "indicated he was lying."

Mrs. Stanley's body, clad in a nightgown and housecoat, was found in a weed patch yesterday two miles from her home. Police quoted Sampson as saying the "other man" forced him to drive to the vacant lot where the body was dumped.

The victim was garroted.

Rita Hayworth 'Not Expecting'

Rome, July 14 (AP)—American film star Rita Hayworth said today "unfortunately, no"—she is not expecting another baby just now.

"Do I look like it?" she asked, laughing.

Her crisp, white dress fitted trimly and she looked like an auburn haired schoolgirl.

She and her husband, Prince Aly Khan, are on a summer cruise off the Italian coast in the yacht "Vaca," leased from the Hollywood actor, Errol Flynn.

Carleton Back from Colorado Conference

E. A. Carleton, principal of Salem high school, will return to Salem Sunday morning after attending a week-long educational conference at the University of Colorado in Boulder, Colorado.

The conference was an invitational affair, sponsored by Dr. Harl Douglass, nationally known authority on education. He was a member of the University of Oregon staff several years ago and is now head of the department of education, University of Colorado.

The meeting was conducted by Dr. Butler Laughlin, assistant superintendent in charge of secondary schools for Chicago. Thirty principals from 14 western states took part in the discussions on current problems. No formal lectures were given and the emphasis was on exchange of ideas in an informal manner.

Assault Charge Denied by Uncle

San Francisco, July 14 (AP)—Douglas Carapata denied today he had bludgeoned his niece, Mary McIntyre, 24, former Vancouver B. C., career girl.

Police charged Carapata, 45, with assault with intent to commit murder after the young woman identified him Wednesday as her assailant. She was beaten June 3 with a hammer.

Suffering from loss of speech because of the attack, Miss McIntyre scribbled her accusation of her uncle.

"As God is my judge I did not strike Mary," Carapata told reporters.

Stanley Boulter, accused as an accessory, also denied guilt.

New Trial Given Jailed Minister

Rochester, N.Y., July 14 (AP)—The appellate division of the New York state supreme court has ordered a new trial for the Rev. George P. Hetenyi, 40, who was convicted last January of second degree murder in the shooting of his 25-year-old wife.

Hetenyi is now serving a sentence of 50 years to life in Attica prison.

The Erie county Episcopal clergyman's conviction by a Monroe county court jury was unanimously reversed yesterday.

The appellate division held that Judge Daniel J. O'Mara erred in charging the jury.

Mrs. Jean Gareis Hetenyi's body was found in the river in April, 1949. The minister had reported her missing from their home in the town of Amherst, near Buffalo.

Bill to Outlaw Rail Strikes Put on Shelf

Washington, July 14 (AP)—The senate labor committee yesterday shelved a bill to outlaw rail strikes. The 10 to 1 vote—with only Senator Donnell (R., Mo.), the bill's sponsor, voting to send it to the senate for debate—confirmed a recommendation made by a subcommittee last week.

Welcome Aid In Korean War

Washington, July 14 (AP)—The United States is quietly informing other interested United Nations members that it would welcome participation of their ground forces in the fighting in Korea.

There is no expectation among top officials here, however, that the main burden of battle can or will be borne by other than American troops. Several reasons are advanced for this, the chief one being that the United States is the nation in the best possible position to do the job.

President Truman was asked at his news conference yesterday what he thought about ground forces from other countries joining the fight. He simply referred to a news conference statement which Secretary of State Acheson had made on Wednesday.

Acheson said the state department was discussing the problem with the United Nations and the Army. Obviously, he added, any offer of troops would be most helpful.

The problem has dramatized by demands in congress for a greater effort by other United Nations members in the Korean war, and it is reported to have been a source of concern to top authorities in both the state and defense departments.

Cloud Seeding Increased Rain

Prosser, Wash., July 14 (AP)—Cloud-seeding put five to 10 times more rain on one wheat ranch than fell on land under unseeded clouds, a report said today.

The report was from the Water Resources Development corporation of Pasadena, Calif., based on its work on the 100,000-acre Horrigan farms.

Not only was there more rain, Irving P. Krick, corporation president, said, but it came in a long, gentle fall while nearby areas sometimes got hard, erosion-creating rains.

Krick said the Horrigan farms, big wheat operation, retained the corporation to see what could be done about producing rain in the normally dry region. The method, he said, was to project silver iodine into the air when favorable cloud formations approached.

The result, Krick said, was 430 per cent above-normal rainfall over the Horrigan lands in June.

Cloud-seeding in this region is useful only from September to mid-June, Krick said, adding that the Horrigans plan to repeat the seeding next season.

Clackamas Citizens Win in Tax Battle

Property owners in northern Clackamas county won their battle yesterday against having property valuations increased this year.

The state tax commission voted 2 to 1 to keep the valuations the same as last year, until the entire county has been reappraised. The action reversed the county's assessor, Rufus Wood.

Wood had increased the valuations in that part of the county as much as 200 percent. The tax commission said the increases would be unjust unless the whole county's valuations are adjusted at the same time.

Commissioners Ray Smith and Carl Chambers voted against Wood, while Commissioner Robert MacLean voted to support him.

Boy Killed by Car

Portland, July 14 (AP)—Four-year-old Philip Kail ran from a sunken driveway into a street here yesterday. A car killed him in the city's 21st traffic fatality of the year. Police investigated, and did not hold the driver.

Boeing Clears For War Orders

Seattle, July 14 (AP)—The Boeing Airplane company reported a "hurry-up" work program to clear the decks for any possible special orders from the air force.

"Since the Korean conflict began," said a statement issued by the company, "the air force has requested Boeing to make proposals on various types of work. The company has done so and now is awaiting the military's decision on these projects."

The company issued a call for more than 100 skilled machinists. It said they are wanted for "stepping up of certain work." Employment cutbacks, scheduled to begin this month, "are being held off for the time being because of the international situation," the company added.

Total employment in the firm's Seattle and Renton plants is about 18,000.

American-British Naval Maneuvers

London, July 14 (AP)—Ships of the U. S. sixth fleet and units of the British Mediterranean Navy will hold combined training exercises in the central Mediterranean from July 17 to July 29 and on August 18-19, the Admiralty announced today.

Its brief announcement said: "The combined exercises will involve air, sea and amphibious attacks and will afford tactical
