

Golden Held On \$1500 Bail

John Golden, 59-year-old Salem jewelry store proprietor, was free Tuesday under \$1,500 bail on morals charges brought by the father of an 11-year-old girl.

The jeweler was arrested Monday afternoon at his store at 311 State street. It was at his place of business where the alleged incident took place.

According to police information, the complaint upon which the warrant for Golden's arrest was made was based on the third incident of molesting small girls. In the other cases, parents, unwilling to drag the incidents through court, merely advised police of the details concerning reports of their children.

The girl whose father made the complaint told police how she was enticed into the store to try on a ring and then invited into a back room. Her account alleged that Golden asked how the zipper on her slacks worked.

At that point, the girl's story explained she had been kissed six or seven times while the jeweler felt her body.

A customer, who slipped into the store while no one was in attendance, was heard to remark that it would be easy to rob the place. Then, the girl said, Golden left the back room to return to his business.

The jeweler's signed statement given to police confirmed incidents of the girl's story with the implication that she had taken the initiative on looking at the ring and going to the back room. In part, it read:

"While the little girl was standing in the doorway (of the back room) I bent down and kissed her and put my hands on her breasts."

Police reports for April of 1948 and May of this year related similar incidents involving another 11-year-old as well as a 7-year-old.

The case was continued in court for plea to Saturday. Golden's bail was reduced from \$3,000 to \$1,500. The charge, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, can be considered a misdemeanor or a felony. Conviction can bring a five-year penitentiary term.

Dr. W. D. Smith, Geologist, Dies

Eugene, July 18 (AP)—Dr. Warren Du Pre Smith, 70, nationally known geologist and a member of the University of Oregon faculty from 1914 to 1947, died at his home here last night.

The author of numerous scientific articles and a number of books on geology and geography, he headed the university department of geology 33 years.

Born in Leipzig, Germany, May 12, 1880, he came to this country early in life and received college degrees at the University of Wisconsin and Stanford.

He was a geologist for the U. S. mining bureau in the Philippines in 1905-06, and in 1920-22 was chief of the division of mines in the bureau of science of the Philippines government.

In 1947 he was geographer in the Far Eastern section of the office of strategic services.

He was a member of the Royal Geographical Society of England, the American Geographical society, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Chi and a number of honorary organizations.

Surviving are three children, Mrs. Wayne Atwood, Eugene; Warren E. of Portland and James F. of Long Beach, Calif.; a brother, Charles F. Smith, Wausau, Wis., and two sisters, Mrs. W. E. Blakeman, Berkeley, Calif., and Mrs. E. J. Harvey, Deerfield, Wis.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

Atom Monitors To Be Trained

Portland, July 18 (AP)—Atomic radiation monitor crews are to be trained soon in Oregon cities.

They will operate as "detectives" for local civilian defense corps.

Dr. Arthur F. Scott, Reed college faculty member, said the first class of 13 qualified monitors will complete a five-week course this week. The graduates will then scatter to 10 or 15 cities of the state to train the home town monitors.

By the end of the year there should be 250 persons trained for the tasks, he said.

The Reed professor said the training at the school is part of an atomic energy commission research program in biology and medicine. Since 1948, the college, the University of Oregon and its medical school and Oregon State college have composed one of four such research centers in the nation.

Eight high school science teachers, two state board of health engineers and three Portland city firemen are in the radiation monitoring class here.

Credit Curbed On Housing

Washington, July 18 (AP)—In a move against inflation, President Truman today ordered a series of credit restrictions on housing.

One action was to tell the federal housing and home finance administration to increase down payment requirements substantially, both for new construction and for modernizing and repair loans.

It is imperative, Mr. Truman said, "that these requirements be met fully and without delay. These increased demands will aggravate inflationary tendencies already evident in some of these materials unless positive actions are taken to reduce pressures in residential construction."

In his message to congress tomorrow Mr. Truman is expected to propose some sort of allocations of scarce materials, perhaps on a voluntary basis.

The president told the housing agency to take certain actions, including:

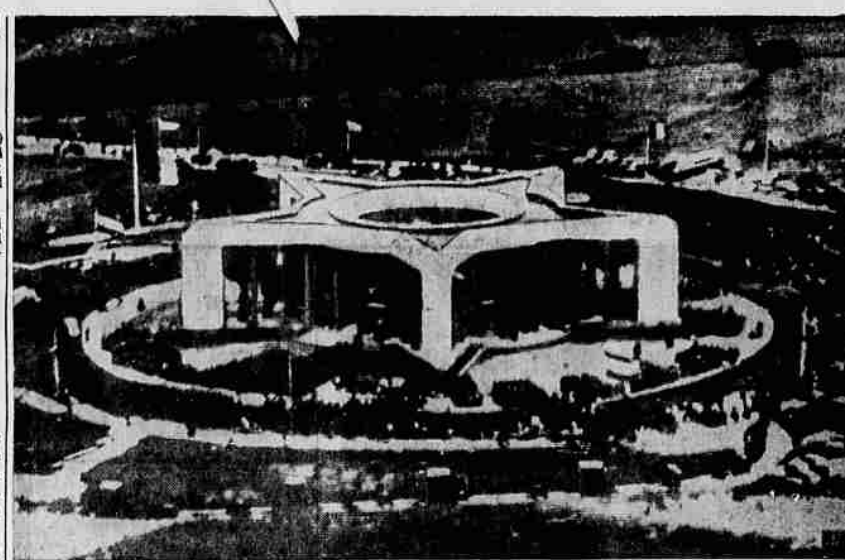
1. Use construction costs existing on July 1 of this year as a ceiling in analyzing property for mortgage insurance.

2. On all future applications for mortgage insurance, reduce either the maximum principal amounts or the maximum percentages of appraised value or cost, or both, of mortgages "so that required down payments will substantially increase, especially for higher priced housing, excluding military housing and the Alaska housing program."

3. Require substantial down payments for modernization and repair loans.

4. Cut substantially the availability of Federal Home Loan bank credit to member institutions, especially for business expansion, and by supervisory action encourage stricter credit standards on new mortgage loans by member financing institutions.

Neuner Construes Rules On District Hospitals

Any physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Oregon whether he be an osteopath or other physician, is entitled to practice in a hospital operated by a hospital district organization under Oregon law, Attorney General George Neuner said today.

Neuner wrote the opinion at request of State Sen. Irving Rand of Portland.

Neuner said the board of directors of a hospital district has discretion to make reasonable rules governing the conduct of practitioners while in the hospital, but it has no authority in law to exclude any licensed practitioner.

Neuner said specifically that the board of directors of a hospital district "has no authority or discretion to refuse use of the hospital to an osteopathic physician or his patients."

Noting that nowhere in the act, passed by the 1949 legislature, is there any limitation as to type of care or treatment of patients in a district hospital, Neuner said a district hospital is made possible through issuance of bonds upon the credit of the taxable property in the district and the levy of general and special taxes. And he said:

"It is difficult to see how a public institution, supported by taxation, could legally be limited to the use of less than all the inhabitants of the district." Neuner concluded.

"The board of directors of a hospital district should not attempt to legislate by adding conditions and restrictions to a law that was clear and complete as enacted by the legislature. The rule-making power of an administrative body can neither transcend the constitution nor ignore the intention of the legislature."

West Coast Phone Workers May Strike

Everett, July 18 (AP)—Approximately 450 western Washington employees of the West Coast Telephone Co. authorized a negotiating committee last night to call a strike if it is unable to obtain contract demands.

The employees, members of the AFL International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, have been working without a contract since July 1.

Acheson Sends Reply to Nehru

Washington, July 18 (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson has sent a reply to India's Prime Minister Nehru on the Korean question. In it, he is reported to have said that no peace negotiations can start until the communist invaders withdraw.

Nehru and Stalin also have exchanged notes on Korea, and Tass, the Soviet news agency, has said they both agree that communist China must be admitted to the United Nations before any peace settlement can be made.

The state department said today that Acheson's reply to the Indian leader's peace move was sent to Ambassador Loy Henderson in New Delhi last night.

Press Officer Lincoln White said it would be published after word is received that Henderson has delivered the note to Nehru. Another copy was given

to Madam Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, Indian ambassador and Nehru's sister.

Defense officials said the nominations are not unusual and have nothing to do with the Korean war or with any mobilization plans that may be under study.

Nomination of a state national guard general to the same rank in the national organization constitutes federal recognition of his capacity to command or perform the other functions of his rank, a defense spokesman said.

The nominations included one major general — William Ray Carroll of the Washington national guard and commander of the 41st division—to be major general of the line. Line officers perform command duties.

Brigadier generals nominated to the adjutant general's department included Lilburn H. Stevens, Washington.
