

Upjohn Rites Set for Friday

Funeral services will be held at the Clough-Barrick chapel Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock for Donald H. Upjohn, member of the Capital Journal staff since 1923 and Oregon newspaperman for many years, who died at his home Monday after an illness of several months.

Rev. George H. Swift is to officiate at the service and concluding services will be at Belcrest Memorial park. Pall bearers will be a group of men with whom Upjohn had worked at the Capital Journal, Stephen A. Stone, Doug Thomas, James D. Olson, Fred Zimmerman, W. A. Scott and E. A. Brown.

Upjohn, who was born March 3, 1884, at Kalamazoo, Mich., came west in his early 20s and prior to coming to Salem was on the staff of newspapers in Idaho and Washington. He came to Salem in 1909 to take the position of city editor with the Oregon Statesman.

Green Gets 20 Years for Rape

Albany—William Sanford Green of Sweet Home must serve a 20-year state prison term for rape of a 63-year-old Sweet Home woman and furthermore may spend the rest of his life at the Oregon penitentiary.

Green was given the maximum sentence by Circuit Judge Fred McHenry Wednesday and information charging Green with having been convicted of four felonies. He was convicted on the Linn county charge by a circuit court jury late Monday. He is on parole from a statutory rape charge, also committed in Linn county, and reportedly had been convicted on two felony charges in Coos county, all within limitation of the Oregon law.

Transient Dies While Going Through Dallas

Dallas—William Morgan Malaney, 47, a transient, died of a heart attack about 6:30 Wednesday evening on Dimick road.

Dallas ambulance crew made the report after a companion of Malaney's, who remained unidentified this morning, had hailed a passing car and requested aid for the sick man.

The man reported that he and Malaney were walking beside the road when Malaney complained of a chest pain, reeled, and sat down on the ground. His companion hailed a car for aid, but Malaney was dead on the arrival of the ambulance.

The remains are at Henkle and Bollman funeral home.

Lutheran Congregation to Miss Departing Minister

Silverton—Rev. S. L. Almle is leaving the Immanuel Lutheran pastorate to accept the work of two congregations at Pigeon Falls, Wisconsin, taking over his new assignment the latter part of August, leaving Silverton Monday, July 31.

The Almles are to be sadly missed in their church work and by the entire Silverton community, district and state affiliations of religious and civic importance.

From the "Immanuel Lutheran" publication of July, 1950, Rev. Almle is quoted in a news letter:

"It is a difficult experience for a pastor and family to bid farewell to members and friends of a beloved congregation. We wish we had time to visit each one of you to bring greetings and expressions of gratitude. But in the midst of so many things to do preparatory to leaving, we find that impossible. Therefore, we would through this news letter, say to all: Thank you and God Bless You!

"Time works its changes. When we came to Silverton, John was 10 years, Rachel, 7, and David—well he just was not—he is strictly Oregonian. Now John is 17, Rachel is 14, David, 5. . . Seven years is seven years to us all with many local changes."

Among these changes accomplished under the supervisory direction of Rev. Almle has been a several thousand dollar church building program with the Church on the Hill, now one of the most attractive in Silverton. Membership is near the doubling figure, from July 1, 1943, 325 members; and June 1, 1950, 625 members. During the seven years' work in Silverton, losses from congregational membership have been 43 by death and 42 by location transfer.

The church, pastoral parish, grounds and social rooms offer adult and youth members a program of center for worship, Christian education, fellowship and recreation.

The beautiful daughter of the Almles, Rachel, has presided at the church organ each evening for many months, at 7 o'clock.
