

Construction, Food Plants Create New Oregon Jobs

Construction and food processing were responsible for 10,100 new jobs, or nearly two-thirds of a 15,200 increase in employment during June, the state unemployment compensation commission said today.

Lumbering and service firms also showed a seasonal pick-up, and the 437,500 employed in non-agricultural jobs was 7,400 greater than a year ago but slightly below the June, 1948 figure of 439,000.

Partly because of a labor dispute involving 2,800 workers, the commission said, lumber and other wood products had jobs for only 79,300, about the same as last year but 6,500 short of the record June total in 1948.

Unemployment dropped only slightly during the month, mainly because of in-migration and entrance into the labor market of several thousand housewives and students.

Overall Situation Bright
The commission said its local offices listed 29,419 as seeking work July 1, but in some farm areas only a small fringe were without jobs. For the entire state it was the best mid-year report since the end of the war—and 13,000 under the unemployed of a year ago.

Claims received in the second week of July increased 20 per cent over the previous week, mainly due to the new benefit year, but still were nearly 30 per cent under the same week of 1949.

The commission, noting that construction jobs were up to 28,400, nearly twice the mid-winter low, said prospects were good for the 1948-49 peak of 30,700 might be exceeded by mid-summer.

A late start in food canning and packing added 6,400 jobs last month, but the 20,200 total was a thousand or two short of recent June.

Service firms reported 900 more on the job. Trade picked up 1,300 for the best recent June figure. In the manufacturing field, machinery put on 400 workers and metals 300 more. But textiles, paper and furniture failed to show gains.

Area Report Made
Portland (including Hillsboro), Oregon City, Albany, Astoria, Baker, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Freewater, Roseburg, Salem and Toledo offices reported considerably less unemployment than the previous month or a year ago. But increases came from Eugene and Klamath Falls.

Of the 29,419 seeking jobs, 14,090 had wage credits in covered employment, but 4,864 could draw no compensation because of having exhausted 1949-50 benefits. Only 4,231 were listed as unable to find farm jobs, while 11,008 others usually working for small firms or other non-subject groups also were looking for employment. Nearly 37 per cent of the total were women.

Baptists Hope for Peace But 'Will Not Fail if Test Comes'

Cleveland, July 22 (AP)—Faith impels the Christian people of the United Nations to hope and pray there will not be another war, the keynote speaker of the Baptist World Congress declared today.

But Dr. Wilfred L. Jarvis, pastor of the Central church in Sydney, Australia, keynoting the eighth international congress, said although peoples of the free nations of the world pray for peace, they will not fail if the test of war comes.

"In this situation," he said, "Baptists like their fellow Christians in other denominations have an unfailing source of inspiration and hope."

This inexhaustible source of power and courage, he continued, is the knowledge that Christ has said "I am the light of the world." The quotation was the theme of his keynote address.

The theme of the congress, which opened its six-day program today, is "and the light shineth in the darkness."

The Baptist world alliance, which sponsors the meeting, expects 20,000 delegates to take part in the fellowship meetings. Delegates will hear a message from President Truman, who originally had planned to deliver it in person, but was unable to be present.

An address in today's afternoon session contained an assertion by Dr. Robert J. McCracken, of New York's Riverside church, that only a spiritual conversion can save man in the atomic age.

Ex-GI's Beat Up Suspected Reds

Los Angeles, July 22 (AP)—Three Chrysler auto plant workers were severely beaten outside the company gates at Maywood yesterday, because, sheriff's deputies reported, they refused to tell fellow workers whether they are communists.

Two hundred men and a few women either took part in the disturbance or watched the officers said, while the three men, identified by spectators to deputies as Tom Creed, Basil Gordon and Leo Blanket, were punched and kicked and knocked off their feet.

Assaults and their victims had left before six sheriff's deputies and two California highway patrolmen reached the plant.

Frank W. Zaffina, 32, of Monterey Park, employed as a car inspector for the Santa Fe railroad, told reporters he was the leader in the plan to give the three men their choice of stating they are not communists or taking a beating.

Zaffina said the trio refused to answer.

"I'm in the navy reserve and if I have to go over to Korea to fight the commies I might as well start by cleaning them up over here," said Zaffina. "A bunch of us ex-GI's got together and decided to make an example of the commies working in this plant. If any of them show up for work again Monday they'll get the same treatment."

Washington, July 22 (AP)—Alexander Blair, Jr., looked at the news from Korea, then took a gander at Western Union.

Alex, the son of a Washington patent lawyer, was not quite old enough to fight a war. So he put on brown-green pants and a soldier-like cap and delivered telegrams for good old W. U.

Alex pumped up the tires of his bike and reported for work in the National Press building office of Western Union, making it clear he was a monotone and would stand for none of this nonsense about singing birthday telegrams.

His first assignment was multiple.

The boss loaded him with a flock of telegrams to be delivered among certain government offices, plus a \$200 money order. Alex, dreaming of his first payday, stuffed his job—the messages—under his cap, put a leg up on his high-seated wheel, and took off in a high wind down F street.

Just as our boy arrived in front of the White House, this same wind did a dip and dumped the Western Union cap off the Blair noggin. Out tumbled half a dozen telegrams, plus the very important money order.

Young Alex turned his wheel to the curb, flung it on the sidewalk and went chasing telegrams; dodging traffic the while. He retrieved the common variety of messages, most of which said nothing more than "bid a half million, your request for bulldozer tires" and "Mom, send a fin, be home Friday night."

The money order, playing ball with a tricky wind, wound up in the slot through which Washington street cars receive their power to get ahead.

It should be explained that this slot between the rails is about an inch wide. The money order found the slot which was not big enough to accommodate Blair's fat little hands. Also, the kid was aware that lurking three feet below were 610 volts.
