

Army Reserve Commissions About to Expire are Frozen

Washington, July 25 (AP)—The army has frozen reserve commissions expiring or about to expire, a spokesman said today.

These are five-year commissions held by officers who are not now on active duty.

2nd Marines Moved to West

Washington, July 25 (AP)—The marine corps announced today that part of the second marine division is being moved from Camp Lejeune, N.C., to the Pacific coast.

Marine headquarters said the second division troops will go to Camp Pendleton, Calif. The first marine division recently sailed from there for the Korean theater.

The number of marines being moved from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast was not given. An official announced only that they are "certain ground elements of the fleet marine force, Atlantic."

The full second division includes five battalions compared with the three-battalion strength of the peacetime first division.

The air force announced simultaneously today that it is calling up immediately for active duty a "very limited number of air reserve units."

An air force official declined to specify either the number or types of units included in the call. He said the call is now "in process" of going out.

The air force said there is "no intention" of calling units of the Air National Guard.

Jap Artist Must Die for Slayings

Tokyo, July 25 (AP)—A mild mannered Japanese artist was sentenced to death yesterday for the poison slaying of 12 persons in a \$456 bank robbery.

The painter, Sadamichi Hirazawa, muttered "frameup," His attorney filed an appeal.

Witnesses testified: Hirazawa walked into the Teikoku bank in Tokyo Jan. 26, 1948, and told the bank workers he was a health official. He insisted they drink some "medicine" he put in their tea.

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Sixteen workers drank it. As they collapsed, writhing, Hirazawa made of with 164,400 yen (about \$456).

Four of the stricken workers recovered.

Hirazawa had signed a confession but later repudiated it. He pleaded not guilty.

Tot Swallows Fuel Oil In Kitchen, Dies

Longview, Wash., July 25 (AP)—Elvin McLean, 18-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. McLean of Longview, died in a local hospital Saturday after he accidentally swallowed fuel oil in the kitchen of his home.

Mrs. McLean said she rushed the infant to the hospital after she saw him drinking from a bottle she used to catch oil dripping from the stove.

Primaries Held In Four States

(By the Associated Press)

Democrats in four southern states are holding primaries today, with national interest centered primarily on a senatorial race in Oklahoma.

There, Senator Elmer Thomas, chairman of the senate agriculture committee and a veteran of the Washington scene since 1927 is trying to hold off the bid of Rep. Mike Monroney, who has been in the U. S. house 12 years.

The other states, in brief: Arkansas—There is a national angle in the race for the nomination for governor, between Gov. Sid McMath and former Gov. Ben Laney. Laney is a leader of anti-Truman democrats while McMath has supported much of the Truman program.

Louisiana — The main race here is for the senate, between Senator Russell Long, son of the late Huey P. Long, and two opponents: Malcolm Lafargue, Shreveport lawyer endorsed by the major groups which oppose the Long faction, and former Rep. Newt Mills of Monroe.

South Carolina — Most statewide races were settled in a first primary July 11 but two congressional district nominations are being decided. Rep. Hugo Sims of Orangeburg faces former Rep. John J. Riley of Sumpter and Rep. James B. Hare of Saluda is opposed by former Rep. W. J. D. Dorn of Greensboro.

Democratic nominations in South Carolina, Arkansas and Louisiana mean election in effect; this generally true, too, in Oklahoma.

The army and air force may order up some reservists who are not on a drill-pay basis, but the navy and marine corps contemplate no such move at the moment.

The army, now calling up smaller than divisional organized units, says that some volunteer reserve officers expert in radar and communications are being called up as individuals and units.

The air force says it may call on volunteer training units for specialists if such reservists are readily available and their skills are critical.

The navy expects to get all the men needed from its organized reserve and fleet reserve, made up of those put on inactive duty after 20 years' service. The marines, likewise, do not contemplate any involuntary recall of volunteer reservists.

Members of the reserved officers training corps (ROTC)—army, navy and air force—are exempt from the draft during their junior and senior years in college. The exemption then ceases unless they accept their commissions and go on active duty for two years.

The Oregon policy leader, a critic of U.S. policy in Korea before the fighting, conferred yesterday with department of labor officials. He is scheduled to talk to state department aides tomorrow.

Jail Escapee Known Here

Port Townsend, Wash., July 25 (AP)—Willis Cook, Jr., 23, changed his mind again last night and Jefferson county had its third jailbreak this month.

Cook, held on an auto theft charge, escaped with two other prisoners during the early morning hours of July 1. The trio knocked out a bar which had been welded back into position after a previous prisoner had sawed it out to escape several years ago.

Cook subsequently returned from Salem, Ore., and voluntarily gave up. Last evening, Sheriff Peter J. Naughton discovered at a 7 p.m. checkup that Cook had changed his mind again and departed through another window from which a bar had been sawed.

The second break of the month occurred during the night of July 5—when two men knocked out the same re-welded bar used as an exit in the July 1 exodus.

Naughton's wife is the jail matron. They live in the court house basement down the corridor from the jail. The sheriff was out of town on business yesterday afternoon and discovered Cook's absence on his return.

The prisoners had free-run of the jail corridors night and day before the first two breaks of the month. They were reduced to daylight promenading since then.

Another of the five men who escaped was picked up later at Mount Vernon. The other three are still at large.

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Work Starts on Balanced Plan

The bi-partisan committee for the "balanced plan" met in Salem Monday, starting work on the election campaign to reappoint the Oregon legislature.

The committee is headed by Marshall Swearingen, vice-president of the Oregon Farm Bureau.

Swearingen said, "The committee's aim in the campaign is to tell the voting public what the balanced plan is and what is at stake in reappointment. We intend to broadcast the four basic points of the balanced plan, they are:

Regular and fair apportionment for all of Oregon.
A representative for every county.
Senators to represent no more than three counties.
Any county limited to one-quarter of the seats.

Committee members attending the meeting were: Charles McCulloch, Baker, vice-chairman; Ed Boehnke, Eugene; Freeman Holmer, Salem; Judge Day, Medford; Giles French, Moro and Henry Bushner, Portland.

Swearingen said that additional members of the state committee will be appointed in the near future.

Re-activation of the county committees who obtained the signatures to put the "balanced plan" on the ballot is already taking place, Swearingen said.

Commandos Get Decorations

An American Far East Naval Base, July 25 (AP)—Fourteen U. S. navy and marine commandos were decorated today by Vice Adm. Charles T. Joy for blasting a rail tunnel on Korea's east coast north of the 38th parallel.

Joy, commander of naval forces in the Far East, also awarded combat bronze stars to the captains of the light cruiser and destroyer from which the commando party was organized. They are Capt. Jesse C. Sowell of Washington, D. C., of the cruiser and Cmdr. E. H. Headland, whose destroyer moved to within 3000 yards of the shore.

Lt. Cmdr. William Porter, executive officer of the cruiser and leader of the raiding party, received a legion of merit for combat.

He relayed commendations from General MacArthur and added: "You have made naval history and the whole service is proud of you."

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
