

'Bernie' Baruch, Truman Split In '48 on Fund-Raising Offer

Washington, July 28 (AP) — There's been something missing from this war.

Old timers sensed it. But they didn't know what they were looking for and couldn't see it until mid-morning Wednesday.

A husky and familiar voice sounded off then in a senate committee room on how not to lose the war in a hurry. Bernard M. Baruch was speaking.

Only then did it occur to old timers that the famous "Bernie" hadn't been around for some time. The adviser-to-presidents from Woodrow Wilson through FDR is out of a job.

Since 1948 he has been in President Truman's dog house after an exchange of letters and comment which blistered feelings on both sides.

Third in Series of Stamps Going on Sale

August 2 was selected for the first day sale of this stamp because it was on that day in the year 1776 the colonies completed the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

The central design is a reproduction of the U. S. supreme court building. Across the top is the inscription Washington 1800-1950. At the left of the shield of the U. S. on which is a circle bearing the dominion. The color will be purple.

It is not likely that Baruch will resume his role as White House adviser nor hold court on his park bench just across Pennsylvania avenue for the guidance of big and little shots of the administration. On these sunny days nurse maids or young mothers usually occupy Mr. Baruch's bench watching the kids feed peanuts to the pigeons.

If Mr. Truman summons the old gentleman back for consultation, it will be against all precedent. The president is a man who stands by his friends come fire or high water and who scorns his enemies for keeps.

Their troubles began in 1948 when mighty near everyone thought Mr. Truman was wasting democratic party funds by running as its presidential nominee. There couldn't be much waste, however, because the party was nearly broke.

In those circumstances, Mr. Truman invited Baruch to serve on the democratic fund-raising committee. That would have been a new role for Baruch, although he may have slipped many a personal check to democratic campaign managers and maybe to republicans, too.

Anyway, Baruch wouldn't do it on the battle was on.

Just what the president wrote Baruch remains a semi-mystery, the text of the letter still being suppressed. But enough is known to put the document among the sharpest White House communications in many a year.

That might have been the end of it but for columnist Westbrook Pegler. He got Baruch on the telephone shortly before the election and thereafter quoted him as referring to Mr. Truman as a "rude, uncouth, ignorant man."

Peg said Baruch confirmed he had received a scathing letter from Mr. Truman and added that he had never fallen for FDR's successor because he had been onto him all the time.

Baruch protested he never authorized anyone to quote him on the subject, but the columnist held that he had stated plainly he was asking his questions with intent to print. There was no denial that the conversation had taken place.

Since then Baruch has been little seen around Washington and not at all at the White House. On Aug. 19 he will begin his 80th year with a war on — but one he apparently will observe from the sidelines unless the president relents.

Baruch and Mr. Truman collided again last summer after Baruch told the graduating class at the Armed Forces Industrial college here that the administration was guilty of "vacillation and neglect" in blocking a plan for total mobilization in event of war. He said Mr. Truman had vetoed the national security resources board project.

Mr. Truman promptly told reporters Baruch was badly misinformed.

"I have not been misinformed," Baruch replied. "The president has been badly misinformed, himself."

What Baruch told the senate committee was that Mr. Truman and congress will endanger our national existence if they fail to clamp on all-out mobilization controls right now.

Seek Check Artist Using Stolen Blanks
