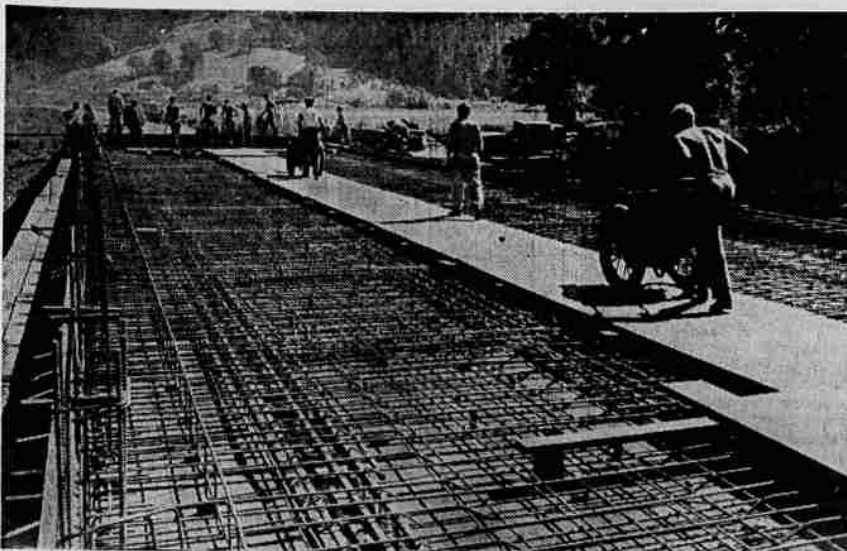

Construction of a new, reinforced concrete, deck girder bridge over the Little Luckiamute on the Dallas-Kings Valley highway six miles south of Dallas is now under way by Johnson & Amens, subcontractors under J. C. Compton of McMinnville, with a completion date set for near September 1.

'Spare' Grand Juries Ordered Convened

Washington, July 29 (AP)—Attorney General McGrath today ordered that one or more federal grand juries be kept ready here at all times to deal with cases of subversive activity.

McGrath announced that the justice department is giving up priority treatment "to all criminal matters in the internal security and defense fields."

In line with that policy, he asked U.S. District Attorney George Morris Fay to begin assembling "spare" grand juries, so that promptest action might be obtained on any cases involving spying sabotage or other subversive activity.

Under his plan, there will be four federal grand juries on duty here after October 1, in place of the usual two.

An old white covered bridge, a landmark of distinction and one of three or four covered bridges remaining in Polk county, was removed to permit construction.

The new structure, 182 feet in length, will have a deck 26 feet in width and steel side rails. Cost is placed at about \$49,000 and a crew of 20 workmen is hastening the structure toward early completion. Concrete mix is being hauled to the job from Independence.

Little Luckiamute, flowing eastward beneath this bridge, forms a sharp bend at this point and state highway engineers have both widened the channel and raised grade approaches, hoping thereby to reduce flooding and keep the bridge open for traffic throughout the winter.

Luther Jensen, state highway engineer, is state supervisor of construction.

Tank Company Drills Intensified at Dallas

Dallas — Special afternoon drills each Monday at 1 p. m. have been scheduled by heavy tank company, Dallas, Oregon National Guard, according to Lieut. Carl Woods of the company.

Men who cannot attend drills Monday evening because of interference by night jobs are required to attend the afternoon training sessions.

Failure to do so will mean that the member's name will be turned over to the selective service board, Lieut. Woods states.

Intensification of the drills is believed necessary in view of the current world crisis.

Debra Breaks Into Movies With Help of Mother, Friends

Hollywood, July 29 (AP)—This is one of those how-to-break-into-the-movies stories.

I've been writing them for years and never tire of them, any more, apparently, than you do of reading them.

Today's subject is a shapely, green-eyed brunet beauty with the improbable name of Debra—Debra Paget.

When I heard that name, I asked, "Who thought that up—the publicity department?"

Debra's mother, Mrs. Margaret Griffin, a couple of hundred pounds of good nature and native shrewdness, answered. "I did. I christened her Debra. Her father's people were Pagets. I used to call her Debra Lee, thinking that would be a good professional name. But Paget is more unusual and there are no Pagets in the movies."

Mrs. Griffin says something like this to all stagestruck mothers: Don't think you can come here and get your daughter into the movies you daydreamed about 25 years ago without great effort and patience. It requires years of preparation, of training and grooming, of dieting and dramatics. But even all those are not enough.

"It helps to know somebody," said Debra's mother. "In fact, you have to have an 'in.' Mrs. Griffin's good many years with stock companies, touring shows and even burlesque gave her a wide show business acquaintance. She knew Ivan Kahn, who is Zanuck's talent scout, when she came here with Debra six years ago.

The Mrs. Griffins of the world who would like to meet the Ivan Kahns of Hollywood must outnumber the customers at a World Series finale. But these fellows are hard to meet. They avoid going places, particularly Little Theaters.

More than enough talent gets to them, through agents, friends, and friends of friends, in normal working hours. They have to be sold.

Debra's mother spent some years getting her daughter ready and selling Ivan Kahn.

"I tell mothers who have heard about Debra that the only way for their daughters to be

seen is in a Little Theater," says Debra's mother. "But that isn't enough. A scout or an agent must see them there. But the good agents already have enough talent and the poor agent, with a million people already, can't do you any good."

I suggested then, that luck and friendship play great parts.

Mrs. Griffin said they sure do. "I am very lucky," said Debra, who, being 16 and well-mannered, usually speaks only when she is spoken to.

Debra is being built up now as a Polynesian glamour girl for "Bird of Paradise," to be filmed soon in Hawaii.

No too-revealing Lamour sarong for her, though, but almost-genuine Polynesian stuff. The build-up includes learning to swim. Debra used to have nightmares about drowning, but she has to do what she is told and so she is learning to swim.

She has the proper Hollywood attitude, namely, that you can do anything the script says you have to do. Mrs. Griffin has been preaching that theory to her daughter for years.

Debra looks older than her 16 years and Twentieth Century-Fox press agents would be happier if her age were not mentioned. They're afraid that love scenes with a man old enough to be her papa would not be convincing if everyone knew she's just a kid. James Stewart, a mere youngster of 40, makes love to her in "Broken Arrow."

Please try to forget these statistical facts if you see that film. This is keep-press-agents-happy week.

Trunk Project Starts Monday

City Engineer J. H. Davis said today that work would be started Monday on the north Salem trunk sewer, which will connect the Washington school area with the new interceptor sewer, entering the latter at North Commercial street.

The trunk will require over 6000 feet of 48-inch pipe, and various lengths of smaller pipe. The cost of the project, including manufacture of the pipe, is estimated at \$94,500. The city is building the sewer, but the pipe is being made by the Collins Concrete Pipe company of Portland at the plant of the Salem Concrete Pipe & Products company.

City Engineer Davis said the job would take about four months for completion. Two machines are being used on the project, one digging trenches and the other to lay pipe. A flatbed truck will be received in

a few days for hauling pipe. Bids are to be opened August 14 on the sewage disposal plant at 2 p. m., and will be passed on by the city council at the next following meeting.

John W. Cunningham, Portland engineer, has furnished the city four sets of the plans and specifications.
