

McCarthy Hits Acheson Again

Fond Du Lac, Wis., July 31 (AP)—Senator McCarthy (R., Wis.) declared yesterday a congressional plan to arm South Korea was "sabotaged by the state department."

He demanded again that President Truman fire Secretary of State Acheson, who McCarthy accused of having helped to "master-mind disaster for America and victory for communism in the east."

Speaking to 4,500 persons at an Izaak Walton League picnic, McCarthy said congress had passed one bill providing \$75,000,000, "any part of which could be used in Korea," while another bill provided more than \$10,000,000, "all of it to be used to arm South Korea."

"President Truman signed those two bills without word of protest," the senator said, "and then what happened? The state department crowd stepped in and how much of that money do you think actually was spent to arm Korea? Only \$200, and that to lead some baling wire."

McCarthy also assailed Acheson for the administration policy in western Germany, declaring that Russia is creating a powerful army in the eastern part of that country while "we keep our half weak."

The state department's position, McCarthy asserted, is that we will not prepare the western German people to help us fight if Russia invades that area.

McCarthy also told his home state audience that democrats conducted a "dishonest" inquiry into his communists-in-government charges.

'Blue Angels' Off For Korean Front

Dallas, Tex., July 31 (AP)—The navy's "Blue Angels," who have thrilled hundreds of peacetime audiences with exhibitions of precision aerobatics, took off today in their P-51 fighter planes for the west coast and probable Korean combat duty.

A crowd estimated at nearly 100,000 swarmed into the Dallas naval air station yesterday to watch the navy's top jet fighter precision team give its final exhibition.

At a west coast base, the "Blue Angels" will form the nucleus of a carrier squadron which will be assigned to fleet operations as the "Blue Angel" squadron.

Lt. Cmdr. John J. Magda, Louisville, Ky., commanded the flight of four Panther jets. In addition to Magda, pilots are Lt. A. R. Hawkins, Lufkin, Tex.; Lt. Jake H. Robcke, San Francisco; Lt. Ralph Hanks, Coeur d'Alene, Ida.; Lt. (jg) George W. Hoskins, Danville, Ill.; Lt. (jg) E. F. Roth, Palo Alto, Calif.; and Lt. (jg) F. J. Murphy, Chicago.

All the pilots came through World War II with several decorations.

Passing Boats Shot At Off Tongue Point

Astoria, Ore., July 31 (AP)—At least three passing boats have had warning shots fired near them as they passed the naval training station at Tongue Point, local mariners warned today.

Naval authorities said the Columbia river channel is still open past the piers where reserve ships are moored, and admitted they have no authority to impose a restricted zone around the piers.

But they confirmed one of the shooting incidents, saying a sentry fired when a boat passenger failed to stop taking pictures.

Flegel Fires First Volley in Campaign

Brownsville, Ore., July 31 (AP)—Austin Flegel, democratic candidate for governor, fired the first volley of Oregon's fall general election campaign yesterday at the Linn county democratic picnic in Pioneer park.

In his speech, Flegel attacked Oregon's republican utility commissioner for blocking power progress in Oregon.

"The republicans have fought new transmission lines every step of the way," he asserted, "already Oregon has an acute power shortage."

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'Woman Without a Country'

U.S. Calls in UN To Check War

Lake Success, July 31 (AP)—The United States called upon the United Nations today to adopt a three-point proposal designed to prevent the spread of the Korean conflict into other areas.

The proposal was submitted unexpectedly by chief U. S. delegate Warren R. Austin just 24 hours before Russia was scheduled to end her boycott return to the security council.

Austin proposed that his resolution be taken up at the next week of the council. This would be at 2 p.m. (EST) tomorrow when Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Jakob A. Malik takes over the presidency of the council after a seven-month boycott.

Austin's move would give the American resolution precedence over any proposals submitted by Russia, since the council's rules call for action on proposals in the order of their submission.

Progressives Enter Fall Race

Portland, July 31 (AP)—A 63-year-old Townsend club member, Harlin Talbert, of Albany, was nominated yesterday for the U. S. senate by the Oregon progressive party.

The progressives postponed nominating a gubernatorial candidate pending tonight's nominating convention called by State Pension Leader Joe Dunne. Dunne, who opposes the pension stand of both the democratic and republican nominees, is expected to make the November race for governor as an independent.

The progressives said candidates for the U. S. house of representatives, from the 3rd and 4th congressional districts, and for the state legislature from Multnomah county would be named later. The filing deadline is August 14.

Nels Peterson, Portland, declined to continue as state chairman of the party and delegates elected A. M. Church, Salem, as honorary chairman to serve an interim term.

War Risk Insurance To be Available

War risk insurance will again be available to industry through legislation now in congress, says a letter to the Salem Chamber of Commerce from Senator Guy Cordon.

When the Korean situation developed several Salem industries became interested and took up the question with Manager Clay Cochran of the chamber.

The letter from Senator Cordon said Representative McGuire of Connecticut had introduced a resolution which would again create the War Damage corporation, a group agency with authority to issue war risk insurance. The bill has been referred to the house committee on banking and currency.

Record Stock Of Atomic Bombs

Washington, July 31 (AP)—The atomic energy commission said today that since January it has produced a record amount of the explosive which goes into A-bombs.

It also disclosed that it is studying the possibility of making an atomic poison weapon.

In a semi-annual report to congress, the atomic agency told of a stepped-up program during the first six months of this year, involving "all forms" of atomic weapons, including the hydrogen bomb.

And it hinted that this may have resulted in greater production of atomic bombs by saying that during the six month period "the rate of current operations" on the entire atomic project had "accelerated."

In the same period, the commission said, production of uranium-235 and plutonium — the explosive ingredients used in making atomic bombs—hit "the highest rate in the history of the project." The same materials also are used in experimenting with atomic power for industrial plants and ships.

The commission carefully refrained from saying outright what its rate of A-bomb production was during the six months. "Atomic weapons and fissionable materials," it said, "were produced at the rate authorized by the president for the calendar year 1950."

It didn't give the rate Mr. Truman had authorized. The agency reported a possibility of increasing its supplies of precious uranium ores from both foreign and domestic sources.

Menace Grows Of Forest Fires

(By the Associated Press)
The weather bureau warned of increasing fire danger in Oregon's woods today as temperatures climbed and humidities fell.

Drying winds added to the worries of alerted forest crews. Humidities were expected to drop today to 30 per cent or lower over the northwestern interior and to 20 per cent or lower in southwestern and eastern Oregon.

Logging operations halt in Western Oregon when the humidity falls to 30. Peak temperatures near 100 were forecast in portions of southwestern Oregon by tomorrow and 85 to 95 elsewhere in the interior.

Freak weather made usually cool Brookings on the southern Oregon coast one of the hottest spots in the state yesterday. Hot air blown in from California brought the temperature there to 97 degrees. That was even warmer than most places in California.

Elsewhere on the coast normal temperatures in the high 60s prevailed. Medford had a high of 92 degrees yesterday. Most other places the temperature ranged in the 80s.

Nehru's Peace Offer Not Appeasement

New Delhi, India, July 31 (AP)—President Rajendra Prasad declared today that Prime Minister Nehru's peace overtures to Russia and the United States were not intended to condone aggression in Korea.

In an address opening a special session of parliament, Prasad said Nehru's letters to Generalissimo Stalin and Secretary of State Dean Acheson had been meant to bolster the strength and moral force of the United Nations "and to facilitate an early termination of the dangerous situation."

"Had it been acceptable to all concerned," Prasad said, "my government would have actively cooperated in bringing about a settlement through the agency of the United Nations."

Redwoods Fire Raging
Crescent City, Calif., July 31 (AP)—Unchecked flames last night raged through the Six Rivers national forest, about 15 miles north of here. Gasket forest ranger Leo Quackenbush said the fire had burned more than 300 acres of redwoods despite the efforts of 125 fire fighters.

Few Farm Prices Figured At Theoretical Control Level

Washington, July 29 (AP)—Despite price increases since the start of fighting in Korea, few farm products have yet reached levels which would make them subject to ceilings if the government had power to control prices.

Probably only hogs, beef cattle, veal calves, lambs, and cotton would be put under ceilings at current conditions.

The government has not said at what levels ceilings would be established should they be deemed necessary, but existing law sets a guide which in all probability would be followed.

That guide is farm legislation setting up a standard for measuring agricultural product prices. That standard is called "parity."

Parity is legally defined as a price which is equally fair to farmers and to those who buy their products. Parity prices are the goal of most of the government's farm aid programs. Ceilings below parity would be a contradiction of the farm program goals.

In World War II congress directed that no price ceilings be set below parity. It undoubtedly would make a similar direction in new price control laws.

The Truman administration itself would not likely propose ceilings at below parity levels. A proposal of such nature could be expected to weaken it among farmers—a group which has been influential in keeping the democrats in power.

The fact that President Truman and Secretary of Agriculture Brannan have been characterizing recent price increases as "unjustified" does not mean that they oppose parity prices for farmers.

What they have been saying is that price increases are unjustified on the basis of current large supplies. As they see it, handlers and processors and distributors of farm products have in many cases increased prices unnecessarily and are reaping big profits.

Farmers, they say, are getting little benefit because they already had sold most of last year's crops at lower prices than now prevail.

The government already is in a position to exercise control over prices of such products as corn, wheat, cotton, tobacco, dry beans, flaxseed, butter, dried milk, dried eggs and cheese. It has large stocks of these items and can put them on the market to help curb price increases.

But agriculture department officials say the government probably would use these stocks—except perishables like butter, cheese, dried eggs, etc.—only to keep price from going above parity.

They say action to hold farm prices below parity while prices of other products were going up would be unfair to farmers.

Rattlesnake Kills Steer
La Grande, July 31 (AP)—A steer died from a rattlesnake bite on the open range near Hot Cake, Owner H. W. Peebler reported today. The animal was found dead, and a veterinarian said it was bitten earlier in the day.

Maple Operates Marble Station

The marble service station on the southeast corner of Capitol and Center streets will be a Standard Oil company station, and will be operated by Kenneth M. Maple of 1662 South 13th street, both of Alderman Howard Maple. The station will be called Shopping Center Service Station.

Those facts came to light Monday, with the filing of an assumed business name certificate in the Marion county clerk's office.

An argument over whether or not a service station should be constructed on that corner ensued for months.

The city planning and zoning commission and city council finally stamped approval on the station, and the building started up.

The station is owned by Rhoten and Speerstra of Salem, who have leased it to Standard Oil company. Standard Oil in turn leased it to Maple.

Kenneth Maple came to Salem about April 1 from Illinois.

Construction on the station is now well underway, and it is expected to open in about a month.

\$950 Million For War Planes

Washington, July 31 (AP)—Members of the house appropriations committee said today they expect a White House request for \$950,000,000 to buy more navy war planes.

They said the new fund will be in addition to the \$10,517,000,000 requested recently by President Truman for all branches of the military.

The new request would boost to approximately \$26,000,000,000 the planned defense budget for the present fiscal year.

The expected new \$950,000,000 navy spending proposal would more than double the planned plane procurement of the navy since the fighting started in Korea.

The navy's plane procurement budget in the regular 1951 defense appropriation bill totaled \$1,095,000,000 — for 817 planes.

In his recent emergency defense budget, the president included an extra \$646,249,000 for navy plane procurement.

Appropriations committee members said the additional money would let the navy start building up toward the overall objective of a 69-group air force for all branches of the armed services.

A figure was not immediately available on how many more navy planes—in addition to the 817 contemplated from the regular appropriation request—would be provided from the extra appropriation request already made and the reported \$950,000,000 second extra money request.

\$150,000 Damage to Calipatria Quake

Calipatria, Calif., July 31 (AP)—Earthquake damage to the downtown section of this community of 2,000 persons is estimated tentatively at more than \$150,000 by City Engineer Richard Congrave.

The full extent of the damage wrought by Saturday's severe shock may be known later today after the 15 business structures on Main street are thoroughly inspected. All were cracked in the wave of earth tremors that included one size-

able jolt. Brick chimneys and facades toppled and store windows were smashed, but there were no injuries.

Other crews are at work repairing cracked highways and irrigation canals in the surrounding Imperial valley. In nearby Westmoreland that city hall and post office are closed pending a safety inspection.

Macomber Gets Life Prison Term

Medford, July 31 (AP)—Gerald T. Macomber today was sentenced to life in the Oregon state prison after pleading guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill.

The charge grew out of a gunfight here in which Macomber and state police officer Richard Korner both were wounded.

He had been indicted on two other charges of assault with intent to kill as a result of an exchange of gunfire with two Medford police officers.

Macomber, widely sought for questioning with a series of burglaries and robberies in the Lebanon and Albany areas, was captured at the home of Mrs. Wilma Nichols, where he had crawled after being wounded.

Previously Macomber had eluded a police posse which cornered him between Sweet Home and Lebanon.

Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna pronounced today's sentence.

Senate Defeats Slash in ECA

Washington, July 31 (AP)—The senate voted today to increase this year's Marshall Plan funds by \$58,070,000, raising the amount for western Europe to \$2,726,761,473.

Senator Hayden (D., Ariz.) proposed the increase which was approved 42 to 29.

A vote on the entire bill was still ahead.

Before taking up Hayden's amendment, the senate slapped down, 59 to 12, an attempt by Senator Kem (R., Mo.) to make a cut of \$718,691,473.

The senate voted down 39 to 33, an amendment by Senator Wherry (R., Neb.) to bar Marshall Plan aid to any nation which exports to Russia or her satellites any materials that are useful to their armed forces.
