Maud Russell to Speak—On Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, in the study room of the First Congregational church, 700 Marion street, Maud Russell will deliver an address on topics of the Far East. 2 of Reserves Called by Navy

Two more men from Salem's organized naval reserve surface division have received their call to report to active duty with the navy.

DC-4 Services Lost to Salem

On the day that Salem dedicates its new airport administration building here, August 6, it will lose its DC-4 service.

Two of United Air Lines DC-4 flights will stop service on that day and the big four engine planes will be taken for military transport with the air force, chartering the planes for the Far East airlift.

Replacing the four-motored planes on the two flights will be DC-3s.

One of the planes is that running between San Francisco and Portland with stops in Salem, Eugene, Medford and Sacramento. The second plane makes the Portland-Salt Lake City run with stops in Boise and Pendleton.

No changes in trips or stops on the flights now being made by the DC-4s will be made by United Air Lines when the two-motored DC-3s replace the big planes.

July Jobless Benefits Total \$571,681

Unemployment benefits totaling \$571,681 were paid to Oregon workers in July, the figure being 29 per cent less than in July, 1949.

The state unemployment compensation commission also said today that only 17,933 claimants were on the books, compared with 28,647 a year ago.

The commission said about 2 per cent of the insured workers are now out of work, compared with 10 per cent last February.

Teachers and their instructors in the Indian service, who are attending the summer school at Chemawa, have some free hours in the evening. As a diversion they have been making a study of square dancing, and will pass it on as a diversion to their pupils when they return to their schools and reservations.

During the summer the Indian teachers have had about 15 evenings of square dancing, the latest one Monday night of this week. Their instructor has been mainly Mrs. Ethel Babcock of the Carson Indian school at Stewart, Nevada.

Monday night they called in the services of Mel Day, an expert caller from Boise, Idaho, who contributed much to the enjoyment of the evening. The director is highly approved by H. A. Mathieson of Phoenix, director of the summer school.

Square dancing is especially appropriate for the reason that most of the teachers are from isolated areas. Sixty-five are from Alaska alone.

Salem people have helped in arranging the dances and a large group from the city attended Monday night.

Clamp Down On Dog Licenses

A clamp-down on dog licenses will begin in Marion county immediately.

Owners of dogs not displaying licenses on their collars are to be cited into court, county dog law enforcement officer Irvin Ward said Tuesday.

Ward will conduct an actual house-to-house campaign throughout Marion county. Whenever he finds a dog over eight months old with no license on its collar, he will issue a citation to the owner of the dog.

Ward has been issuing warnings for the past few days. He will start making arrests immediately, and advises that all dog owners make certain that their canine wears its license at all times.

He reminds that any dog requires a license upon reaching the age of eight months. To merely secure a license is not adequate, Ward points out. The license must be attached to the dog's collar, and remain there at all times.

Dog licenses are available at the county clerk's office in the courthouse. The fee is one dollar for males or spayed females and two dollars for other females.

Airmen to Keep Former Grades Stalin Reaffirms War Policies

Air force veterans, needed to fill important technical jobs in the air force under the current military expansion, can return to duty in their old grades. That information was received this week by the Salem army and air force recruiting station.

According to the word received by the local office these men will also be guaranteed re-employment protection under the selective service law.

Former airmen can enlist in their old grades in the air force enlisted reserve corps and then apply for immediate active duty for a period of one year.

Specialists needed by the air force include men trained in radio, radar, mechanics, armament, medical and dental work and in some 20 other technical fields.

Career fields with immediate openings include intelligence, weather, communications and electronics, wire maintenance, construction, food service, transportation, supply administration, security, fire fighting, fabric leather and rubber and a number of other specialties.

Midwest Cooler but East Sweltering

Chicago, Aug. 1 (AP)—The midwest cooled off today but another day of hot and humid weather appeared in prospect for most of southern and eastern states.

The cool air from northern great plains states spread eastward into Wisconsin and Illinois early today, bringing relief from the hot and sticky weather. The sultry belt extended from Texas and the Gulf states northward to the southern Great Lakes region. Temperatures were in the high 80's and 90's yesterday. In contrast, the top at Duluth, Minn., was 54 and 56 at Marquette, Michigan.

There were showers early today from the Ohio river valley northward to the Lake Superior region and in an area from Kansas southward to the Texas Panhandle.

Receipts Decline — A slight drop in postal receipts was shown during July as compared with the same month, Postmaster Albert C. Gragg reported Tuesday. Receipts for last month were \$57,757.59, or \$438.89 less than for July of 1949, or a decrease of .75 of one percent.

After a meeting of the house GOP policy committee, republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts told newsmen "the consensus was that the powers should be on a standby basis, with the president having authority to put them into effect when he thinks they are needed."

Mr. Truman's letter went to Chairman Spence (D-Ky.) of the house banking committee as well as to Maybank.

Quick Action Needed
In it, the president said he refrained from proposing wage, price and distribution controls to congress "because it seemed more important to obtain quick action on the powers contained" in his proposed defense production bill.

That measure asked powers for the government to take over any plants needed for national defense and to divide up scarce materials among manufacturers.

Mr. Truman said that measure was designed to meet the problems immediately before the country and that he avoided a request for stand-by controls for fear of having action "dangerously delayed."

No Objection Listed
He went on to say he has no objection to addition of standby wage-price-rationing powers but he listed four conditions:

1. These should be supplementary to the production and credit controls first asked.

2. They must not delay action in the senate or house on the earlier requests.

3. Controls over prices and wages "should not set up a rigid formula or freeze in advance of experience."

4. Administration of price and wage controls should be left flexible.

"Strict enforcement of the parking regulations is essential, if the plan is to operate satisfactorily," Baldock said.

The board directed Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry to request the Salem city council to designate one-hour parking on all city streets situated within the capitol group area.

New T. B. Hospital Unit
Plans and specifications for a new tuberculosis treatment building at the Oregon State hospital in Salem, estimated to cost approximately \$720,000 were approved by the board. Bids for the two-story building will be opened August 18. The building will provide for 140 beds and will be a fireproof building with brick facing.

Digging of a well at the state school for the deaf at an estimated cost of \$5,000 was also approved. M. B. Clatterbuck, superintendent, told the board he had been informed by city authorities that the city of Salem, lacking surplus water, was not in a position to furnish water to the institution during the summer months, hence the necessity for the well.

To Hire Nurse Aides
Approval was granted Dr. Irvin B. Hill, superintendent of Fairview home for hiring of seven nurses' aides to be used in Snell cottage for 38 children now on the application for admission list. The children will be admitted as soon as the new hospital is completed. At present a portion of Snell cottage is now used as a hospital.

The cost of the additional help up to July 1, 1951, will be met out of savings made in administration of the hospital by Dr. Hill during the present biennium.

The MacArthur release described the front as running roughly from one mile south of Yongdok to seven miles northwest of Andong to 10 miles southwest of Sangju, one mile southeast of Kwanni, seven miles northwest of Kumcheon, four miles northeast of Chirye and six miles southeast of Chinsu.

No Forced Withdrawals
The summary spoke of slight UN troops withdrawals but said they were not forced and were made to prepared positions.

The push to near Masan in the south represented a gain of about 10 miles since Monday.

Other Red thrusts were developing around Kochoang and flaming Hypochong in the southern sector and at Andong in the north. But no serious gains had been reported made at these three points.

The Reds apparently hoped to push United Nations troops off the Korean peninsula before sufficient arriving U.S. aid could reach them.

But hour by hour anxiously awaited American troops stepped ashore at a south Korean port. Some rushed to the front to brace battered American and south Koreans who have been shoved back for days by the Red hordes from the north.

Second Infantry Landed
These fresh troops included elements of the U.S. Second infantry division, which landed Monday, and two following army units not otherwise identified.

In addition, the main force of the U. S. First Marine division units was looked for by doughboys weary of retreating.

An advanced administrative unit of the marines has arrived in Korea from the United States to prepare for the oncoming leatherneck fighting forces. But they had not been sighted in Korea at 10 p.m. (7 a.m. EST).

Frontline troops had been given a breather since the Reds broke through the south Monday morning. The Americans had braced and dug into new positions.
