## Wonder Drugs May Rate As Heroes of Next War

New York, Aug. 1 (U.P.)—The heroes of the next war might well be the "wonder drugs," the fighters that attack disease in man.

Pennicillin was developed during the last war and saved the lives of thousands of soldiers, but since V-E and V-J days science has produced one new drug after another.

The drug manufacturing companies are geared to step up production of all the new disease and infection fighters and some no doubt would be used as defense weapons against any bacteriological warfare.

Streptomycin, developed on a wide scale since the end of the last war, is plentiful now and is used to fight tuberculosis and many other infectious diseases where penicillin doesn't work. Aureomycin, a "cousin" of streptomycin, is brand new since the war and in some respects covers a wider field than penicillin.

Another cousin is chloromycetin and it, too, has special attack powers, attacking some bacteria that neither aureomycin nor penicillin can conquer.

One of the newest—and one of the most powerful, with only minor undesirable side effects on the patient—is terramycin. It has a double action, attacking both groups of bacteria in some cases.

If bacterial warfare comes, most of these drugs also will go into action to protect the civilian population. Even more significantly, aureomycin, for one,

## Coffee Cookies Delicious

Speaking of iced coffee—as who isn't in this weather?—don't forget that, to be at its delicious best, it must start with good, hot coffee. You have your choice of two simple ways of preparation. One way is to prepare hot coffee, regular strength, about two to three hours before serving. (Regular strength means one standard coffee measure of coffee or its equivalent, 2 level measuring tablespoons, to each three-quarters of a measuring cup of water.) Store coffee in the refrigerator in a non-metallic container. Pour into tall, ice-filled glasses to serve. For last minute preparation, make hot coffee double strength by using one half the amount of water to the usual amount of coffee and pour it directly into glasses filled to the top with ice. Serve it with cream and sugar or simple syrup for sweetening.

Coffee Walnut Bars  
2 eggs  
1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 tablespoon soluble coffee  
½ cup sifted enriched flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
½ cup butter or margarine, melted

Beat eggs until light and lemon-colored. Gradually beat in

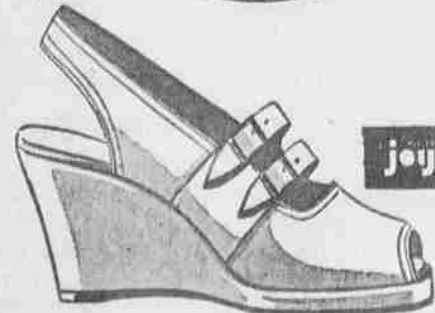
