### Bulldog Jackson Wins Fast One

Yukon Jake, alias "Bulldog Jackson" won a fast match in district court Wednesday morning, but it wasn't on the wrestling mat.

Arrested some time ago on a charge of improper registration of motor vehicle, the state asked for dismissal of the case and Judge Joseph Felton immediately granted the request.

The entire proceedings appeared a bit bewildering to Yukon Jake, better known in the valley as Bulldog Jackson, professional wrestler and promoter.

"I don't understand what it is all about, perhaps I'd better run for sheriff," muttered Bulldog after the court had acted.

Documents in the hands of counsel for the defense showed that the defendant had been known as "Yukon Jake" for many years and that as recently as the past few months motor vehicle licenses had been issued to him under that name.

"Jake" and his wife were slightly amused over the actions of the arresting officer when he appeared at their home. "He stood off from me like he was afraid of something," related "Jake" or "Bulldog." "Perhaps the guy felt I wanted to rattle him for it."

### Chemawa Gets New Building

Plans and specifications for an employees' building at the Chemawa Indian school have been mailed to general contractors by the office of Indian affairs, Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. Bids will be opened in Washington, August 23 at 2 p.m.

The structure will be built on a concrete slab and will have masonry exterior walls, frame interior, asbestos shingle roof and brick veneer on outer walls.

Sixteen bedrooms, 12 bathrooms, a large living room and a dining room are provided.

### Truman's Choice Trails by 11,000 in Missouri Primary

President Truman's choice trailed by more than 11,000 votes today in the democratic senatorial primary race in Missouri.

The man supported by Mr. Truman, State Senator Emery W. Allison of Rolla, had 159,396 votes to 171,002 for former U. S. Representative Thomas C. Hennings, Jr., of St. Louis, in 4,199 out of 4,676 precincts.

This gave Hennings a lead of 11,606 with 477 precincts still to be counted, many of the missing ones in southeast Missouri where Mr. Truman always has polled a heavy vote. So the outcome appeared still in doubt.

And in the neighboring state of Kansas Alf M. Landon, republican candidate for president in 1936 apparently was losing his campaign to regain control of the state party organization.

Other primaries, for candidates for the house of representatives, were held in Virginia and West Virginia with no national issues at stake. All members of the house were re-nominated.

In Kansas Landon supported Willard Mayberry, his secretary when Landon was governor, against Edward F. Arn, former Kansas attorney general, for the republican nomination for governor. With 2,334 out of 2,793 precincts counted Mayberry had 67,363 votes and Arn 105,726.

Arn had the support of Senator Harry Darby, who two years ago gained control of the Kansas delegation to the national convention after a scrap with Landon.

Gov. Frank Carlson, also backed by opponents of Landon, was leading Harry W. Colmery, former national commander of the American Legion, for the GOP senate nomination. Senator Darby was not a candidate. With

## Police to Direct Benefit Traffic

The Salem police department is making preparations to handle the expected heavy traffic caused by the Horace Heidt polio benefit show Saturday night.

The show will be at the Salem high school auditorium with two performances, and extra officers and special traffic rules will be used to handle the congestion of cars.

A total of 12 officers working extra duty will be on the detail, with Captain Leland D. Weaver in charge.

No parking will be permitted on D street between Capitol and 15th, on either side of the street.

On Marion street no parking will be permitted on either side between 14th and 15th.

No parking will be permitted on the east side of 14th between Marion and D streets.

Parking lots will be used at Parrish junior high and at the high school, three lots in all, and officers will be assigned to each lot.

An officer will be stationed at 14th at Marion and D streets, one in front of the high school on 14th, and one on D street at 14th, and an officer will be at the entrance of each of the parking lots. Another will be stationed at North Capitol and Lamberson.

The traffic lights at North Capitol and D will be on several hours overtime as a further protection of traffic. Two motorcycles will patrol the district, and over 80 special "no parking" signs will be posted for the evening.

### Edwards Again Returns to Salem

Having completed the possibilities of a number of the larger communities of western Oregon from the California line to the Columbia river, Jack T. Edwards, until recently a Court street restaurant operator has decided that Salem remains one of the best communities on the Pacific coast in which to live.

This is the second time Mr. and Mrs. Edwards have reached this decision. A few years ago he disposed of his holdings here and returned to California where he had lived for many years. He found that things had "gone crazy" there so he came back.

Recently when the lease expired on the room in which the Edwards were operating, they decided to have another look around. So they disposed of their home at 14th and Court and started traveling. This time they visited southern Oregon and much of the territory in a half circle to the south of Portland.

"We found people from California are moving into southern Oregon and their purchases have spiraled real estate prices far beyond actual worth," reported Edwards.

Their investigation of the area within a few miles of Portland revealed higher prices than here in Salem. Edwards believes that Salem real estate is priced at least 10 percent below that of other communities. He and his wife have purchased a home in another section of the city and will remain here.

### Chinchillas Show At Miller's Store

George D. Lionberger, local representative of the Allied Chinchilla Ranch, is showing three 3-month-old chinchillas at Miller's this week.

Lionberger says that many people are breeding chinchillas in the United States both for fun and for profit. Chinchilla breeding is a comparatively new industry in the United States, having gotten started in 1923 when 11 animals were imported from the Andes mountains of South America, which is their natural home.

The biggest percentage of the chinchillas now in this country are directly descended from these 11 animals. However, not all the animals being bred in this country are really top breeding stock. For their own protection and the protection of the American buying public, the chinchilla breeders have set up a scoring and registration system.

### Mrs. Bradford Funeral Set

Word was received in Salem Wednesday morning of the death at Bellflower, Calif., of Mrs. Etta Belle Bradford, former Salem resident, who for 20 years was matron at Hillcrest school here.

Mrs. Bradford died at her residence at Bellflower, August 1. She was 78 years of age.

Born at Washington, Iowa, April 4, 1873, Etta Belle Amspoke was the daughter of David Lyons Amspoke and Sarah Jane Amspoke. She was married December 28, 1892, at Washington, to Rollo Phillip Bradford, who died October 14, 1918, while the couple resided in Salem.

The Bradfords came to Salem about 45 years ago and Mrs. Bradford resided here until after World War II. On leaving here she went to California. She was a life long member of the Methodist church.

Survivors include a son, Don E. Bradford of Long Beach, Calif.; a brother, Frank Amspoke of Humboldt, Iowa, and a sister, Mrs. Lena Lewis of Denver.

Graveside services are to be held in Salem at the City View cemetery Saturday, August 5, at 2 p.m. with Rev. Brooks Moore officiating and under the direction of W. T. Rigdon company.

### Crowd to View Dam Pouring

Valley cities from Eugene to Portland will be represented at the ceremonies in connection with the first pouring of concrete at Detroit dam Saturday at 2 p.m.

Ivan Oakes, executive secretary of the Willamette Valley basin commission said Wednesday that he had received assurances from many of the valley communities that delegations would be sent.

Albany plans to send four cars; Dallas at least two cars; Lebanon, four cars; Sweet Home, three cars; Eugene, three cars; Independence, one car; and five or six cars from Portland.

In addition there will be a large delegation present from Stayton and Mill City and also from other communities that have not yet reported to Oakes.

The Consolidated Builders, Inc., contractors on the huge project, will set a public address system so that speakers can be heard by the crowd and also to inform the people assembled on what is happening on the job. Governor McKay will release a valve that will result in the dumping of the first bucket of concrete onto the dam site.

### Tree Removal Causes Worry

Removal of trees from parking strips in the process of widening South Liberty street has brought numerous inquiries to Mayor Robert L. Elfstrom and to members of the City council from residents who want to know if the trees will be replaced.

While no definite program has been prepared, the mayor is of the opinion that something will be done.

The council has already directed the appointment of a special committee to prepare a city-wide tree and shrub policy. The committee has not yet been appointed. Mayor Elfstrom thinks the Liberty street situation will be handled either by the committee, or by special action of the council if it is necessary to replant trees on Liberty before the committee can prepare its program.

### Widow to Get Pay from State

The state industrial accident commission said today it is obeying a state supreme court order to pay the widow of a National Guard employee who was electrocuted at Camp Adair March 30, 1949.

The woman, Mrs. John M. McLean of Buena Vista, has four children. The commission gave her a check yesterday to pay her up to date, and will continue to give her a fixed amount each month.

The commission had refused to pay the claim because the National Guard had not contributed to the workmen's compensation fund. But the supreme court, pointing out that the legislature ordered the National Guard employees covered, told the commission to pay Mrs. McLean.

Mrs. McLean should receive more than \$30,000 in monthly payments.

The commission said it expects the National Guard to pay back to the commission the total amount of compensation paid to Mrs. McLean.
