

War to Step-Up West's Projects

Port Angeles, Aug. 5 (AP)—The Korean war may mean a step up in federal construction projects in the Pacific northwest, the northwest rivers and harbors congress heard here yesterday from an army engineer.

Col. O. E. Walsh, division engineer from Portland, said that while he has not yet received a fundamental policy from the national security resources board, he believed the military situation may accelerate federal hydroelectric and reclamation projects. He pointed out that increased war production will call for more power supply.

Col. Walsh told port officials from Oregon and Washington that addition of westerners to the chief engineer's board in Washington, D.C., has resulted in a better understanding of west coast improvements presented to the board for approval.

Another district army engineer, Col. I. C. Itchner of Seattle, reviewed projects recommended by his district office this year, including Shilsee bay at Seattle, Everett harbor and the Quillayute channel.

Truman's Man Concedes Defeat

St. Louis, Aug. 5 (AP)—President Truman's candidate for the Missouri democratic senatorial nomination conceded last night absentee ballots will not give him enough votes to defeat Thomas C. Hennings, Jr., of St. Louis.

State Senator Emery W. Allison of Rolla, the president's choice in Tuesday's primary, said Hennings "has the most votes and I go by the figures." The figures, exclusive of absentee ballots, showed Hennings leading 180,321 to 175,327 with all but seven precincts reporting. Allison picked up 2,918 votes and Hennings 1,719 in first compilation of absentee ballots yesterday, but the remaining mail votes are too few to change the result.

With absentee ballots from only 23 counties remaining to be checked Hennings' lead stood at 3,797. Among the big counties still to report their absentee ballots are Mississippi, which issued only 100, and St. Louis county, where 800 mail ballots will be counted Monday.

Hennings will face republican Senator Forrest C. Donnell in the November election.

Sea Monster Washed Ashore, Ocean City

Ocean City, Wash., Aug. 5 (AP)—A 40 foot "sea monster," which washed ashore a mile south of this community, is assailing the nostrils and the curiosity of beach residents.

Even veteran observers of the sea are having difficulty in identifying the badly decomposed creature, which is four feet in diameter at the thickest point, has a bill like appendage at its head and two tusks teeth in its lower jaw.

One oldtimer declared it is a killer whale, a small type common in waters off the Washington coast. Others believe it is some other type of sea mammal. Some, standing to windward as they observe, theorize that it is a prehistoric animal freed from a melting glacier.

All agree that it has a whale of a smell.

San Francisco, Aug. 5 (AP)—Federal Judge George B. Harris today revoked the bail of Longshore Leader Harry Bridges but defense attorneys said they would immediately seek a stay of execution.

Strikers Demand Walkout End

New York, Aug. 5 (AP)—A group of World-Telegram and Sun employees yesterday demanded that the CIO Newspaper Guild of New York accept management's last offer and end its seven-week strike.

The group, 23 members of the Newspaper's Guild unit, terms itself "the guild committee for common sense."

It outlined its position in a 600-word mimeographed letter addressed "dear fellow staff member" and signed by David Snell and Harriet Van Horne, chairman and vice-chairman respectively of the committee.

The committee said in its letter that the last management offer, "embracing the New York Times grievance and security clauses," offered a means of returning to work "with honor."

The letter describes leaders of the strike as "dictators" with a "tyrannical grip" on the Guild unit.

Edward Easton, chairman of the Guild's World-Telegram and Sun unit, said the letter "parrots management's claim that Guild leaders do not have the backing of the membership."

He called the committee a "tiny minority" and said the letter represented a "strike-breaking maneuver... apparently in cooperation with management."

Taylor Leaves \$520 in Motel

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 5 (AP)—Sen. Glen H. Taylor (D., Idaho) said today he left "exactly \$520" in a motor court here, not \$5,000. However, the motor court owner stood by her statement that the amount was about \$5,000.

Taylor issued a statement saying "I was shocked at the report that I had forgotten \$5,000 in a motor court."

"In the first place, the amount involved was exactly \$520, instead of 'approximately \$5,000,' as reported."

"I have forgotten things in motels many times, and this is the first time it ever made the headlines. Of course, I wouldn't accuse anybody of trying to cook up a political story, but it is almost election time," (Taylor is seeking renomination in next Tuesday's primary).

Mrs. C. H. Bancroft, the motel owner, said she found the money yesterday after the Taylors had occupied the room Thursday night. She said she and her daughter, Mrs. Jerry Bauer, counted "approximately \$5,000."

She added that Mrs. Taylor returned to the motel before she was able to locate the senator and his family and return the money. She said that she and Mrs. Bauer received a \$3 reward.

Robeson "Persecuted"

Moscow, Aug. 5 (AP)—Moscow's two leading newspapers, Pravda and Izvestia, today called cancellation of American Negro Singer Paul Robeson's passport by U.S. state department "persecution." They printed brief dispatches from the U.S. giving details of the American decision.

No Allowances For Uniforms

Washington, Aug. 5 (AP)—Reserve and National Guard officers who have once received the \$250 government allowance for uniform purchases will get no more on being called to active duty.

Officers who haven't received the allowance, however, will be entitled to it; those who have received only part will be entitled to the balance when they are called up.

The uniform allowance is provided by law for National Guard officers in federal service and for reserve officers who are on active duty.

Most of the guard and reserve officers now being called to active duty collected the allowance during World War II. If such officers find their old uniforms worn out and have to buy new ones, they will have to pay for them out of their own pockets.

Uniforms worn during the war are still generally acceptable. The air force has adopted new blue uniforms, but its old style uniforms may continue to be worn until July 1, 1952.

Enlisted men of all the armed services are outfitted at government expense. During service they will receive monetary allowances to replace items that are worn out. This system of monetary allowances, rather than issues of replacement clothing, was announced by the defense department recently as a means of encouraging enlisted personnel to take care of their clothes.

One Way Street Plan Approved

Los Angeles, Aug. 5 (AP)—Oregon motorists approve the one-way street plan, the Oregon state highway department traffic engineer said here yesterday.

F. B. Crandall told a western meeting of the institute of traffic engineers that business men at first opposed one-way traffic on state highways through cities of Oregon.

Later they found they liked it, he said, and added they also found new business resulting along the new one-way streets.

Fred T. Fowler, Portland traffic engineer, reported the one-way grid in downtown Portland was "an eye-opener."

It speeded up traffic, increased the number of cars entering the downtown section and reduced accidents, he said.

The average speed in the business section has gone up from 5.5 miles an hour to 14.20, and streets now carry from 5 to 105 percent more traffic, he said.

Runaway Auto Bangs Into Porch

A runaway automobile caused a lot of excitement and plenty of damage at 255 East Superior street and neighboring premises Friday afternoon.

Ralph A. Kinzer, 1265 North 21st street, had parked his car in the 1700 block on Saginaw. Somehow it started moving south, the direction in which it was parked. It crossed the curb at 225 East Superior and crossed the lawn. It also crossed the premises at 245 East Superior and then banged into the porch at 255 East Superior. The house is owned by U. F. Neiderhiser and was being remodeled. A supporting post was knocked out.

The car also was considerably damaged.

Malik Threatens Chinese Reds to Russian Veto

Lake Success, Aug. 5 (AP)—Russia climaxed maneuvers designed to keep the security council from condemning North Korean aggression by threatening yesterday to veto any decision taken without communist China and North Korea present.

Soviet Delegate Jakob A. Malik, who ended a seven-month boycott of the United Nations to take over the council presidency Aug. 1, introduced a resolution calling for a cease-fire, the withdrawal of foreign (American) troops, and the presence of the two Asiatic communist states at the council's deliberations.

U.S. Delegate Warren R. Austin assailed Malik's move as "irregular conduct."

Malik has fought a delaying, procedural action since he returned to the council Tuesday to prevent a debate and vote on a U.S. resolution condemning North Korean aggression and asking members to help localize the conflict.

Austin was joined by Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb in maintaining that only the UN-recognized Republic of Korea (south of Korea) belonged at the council table.

Oregon Lamb Crop Increases Slightly

Portland, Aug. 5 (AP)—Oregon's lamb crop increased slightly this year, despite fewer breeding ewes, the department of agriculture reported today.

The number of lambs was estimated at 532,000, an increase of one percent over the record low crop of 1949.

There were only 566,000 breeding ewes, the smallest number in 27 years.

But for the first time since 1941 there was an increase in the number of lambs saved.

The number saved was estimated at 94 per 100 breeding ewes. The average for the past ten years was 92 per 100.

Carrier Boxer Back from Japan

San Francisco, Aug. 5 (AP)—The carrier Boxer is home from a record speed run ferrying fighter planes across the Pacific and is rarin' to go again.

The speedy, 27,000-ton seagoing airbase surged into Tokyo bay eight days and seven hours out of San Francisco with a full load of planes, including 150 air force F-51 Mustang fighters. Leaving every flyable plane in Japan, the Boxer sped home in seven days, 18 hours, 36 minutes, an average of about 23 knots for the more than 5,000 nautical mile voyage.

The Boxer came home yesterday morning and immediately began taking supplies for new duty, with a speed which indicated she may not be long in these parts.

Capt. Cameron Briggs, the Boxer's commander, said he had no idea what the new assignment might be.

"But," he declared, "the Boxer is ready."

The big carrier had barely returned to the western Pacific when the Korean invasion started. Berthed at San Diego, the carrier was ordered to San Francisco and crewmen on leave were hastily recalled.

Refitted, the Boxer started her record run with a full navy composite squadron, plus the deck load of air force fighters and a group of air force officers and men.

Diver Hikes Way Across Hampton Road

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 5 (AP)—Deep Sea Diver Roy Butler, weighted with 425 pounds of lead, today finished his heavy hike across the bottom of Hampton Roads.

Sick at his stomach he was hauled to the surface a quarter mile off Ocean View after 10 hours under water. He walked about 14 miles avoiding deeps and skirting derelicts on the trip over from Old Point Comfort, he said. The airline distance is about five miles.

The first words the 38-year-old diver said when he was hauled up to the barge which carried his air pumping rig were: "Never again." He had blacked out once for a minute and a half at a 90-foot depth and had to be pulled into shallow water. But he insisted on returning to the point and resuming the hike.

Butler is getting paid for his trek by an Ocean View amusement park which sponsored the stunt as promotion.

Explosions on Diomed Island

Anchorage, Alaska, Aug. 5 (AP)—Recent unexplained explosions on or near Russian-owned Big Diomed Island in the Bering Strait were reported here today.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Morgan of Anchorage returned yesterday with the report from Little Diomed Island, owned by the United States and only three miles from the Soviet Far East island outpost.

The Morgans said that several times during a four-month stay on Little Diomed they heard loud noises at sea. They believed the noises may have been from a survey ship taking soundings or from the Siberian mainland. Fog prevented them from locating the sources.

The Morgans expressed doubt that the Russians are bolstering Big Diomed as Eskimos reported that only one Soviet plane was on the island last winter.

The natives also reported that the Russian island was strangely inactive, Morgan said. Last spring, tourists said the island was being evacuated of its residents as the Russians prepared to construct a large base on Big Diomed. No large construction is evident there, Morgan said.

Two Youths Drown

The Dalles, Aug. 5 (AP)—Two 17-year-old youths drowned in a lake in Hog Canyon west of here yesterday.

Deputy Coroner Leonard Smith said the bodies of Harry Neeley and Robert Bailey of Parkdale in Hood River county were recovered last night.
