Bridges Seeks Jail Release

San Francisco, Aug. 7 (P)—Harry Bridges' lawyers will seek his release from jail today on a writ of habeas corpus.

The president of the CIO Longshoremen's union was taken into custody Saturday after Federal Judge George Harris revoked Bridges' \$25,000 bail.

Counsel for the labor leader said they would ask the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for a writ of habeas corpus. They also said they would appeal to a higher court for his release on bail, contending that Harris went beyond legal precedents in ordering Bridges imprisoned.

Harris held Bridges to be a menace to national security, and granted the department of justice petition for cancellation of bail. The court termed Bridges "probably one of the most cogent figures in the communist party in America today," adding: "As such, his allegiance cannot be to the United States of

America. His conduct since the beginning of the Korean crisis and his remarks during this (court) proceeding are of such a nature as to justify this court in concluding that his loyalty and allegiance are and must be with the communists."

Bridges was on bail pending appeal of his conviction in April on a perjury charge. The jury found that he lied when he declared under oath at his naturalization hearing that he was not a communist. Bridges, born in Australia, became a citizen in 1945.

Bridges Jailing Has No Effect on Union

Deep-Sea Diver Completes 14-Mile Underwater Hike

Ocean View, Va., Aug. 7 (P)—Deep-sea diver Roy Butler, aided by a fast-running tide, completed a daring 14-mile underwater hike across historic Hampton Roads Saturday in less than half the 20 hours he had thought it would take.

The 38-year-old veteran of below-surface expeditions was sick as he came up nine and a half hours after submerging off the pier at Old Point Comfort, Va.

"I've taken the worst beating of my experience," he said. Rough weather and the constant jerking of his lines had bruised the tough diver and made him ill.

A favorable wind plus a fast-running tide practically swept him along the muddy, treacherous bottom of Hampton Roads.

Heavy swells prevented him from walking up on the beach, but his tender and float remained off Ocean View park.

The walk gave the father of four children two unofficial world's records for time under water and distance travelled under water.

Butler had estimated it would take him about ten hours longer to fight his way through the tricky currents of the roadstead which conquered the mighty battleship Missouri and left her stranded on a mudbank for 18 days.

Butler himself solved his greatest fear—the fear all divers

have of the "bends," a blood vessel condition caused by decompressing too fast after prolonged periods under water.

As he approached the shore, the gradual shallowing of the water decompressed him slowly.

The veteran of 16 years' diving experience was haggard and pale when the heavy diving helmet was lifted off.

He said he "blacked out" when he stepped into the 90-foot ship channel.

"I was out for at least a minute and a half," Butler said. "They pulled me up part way, and I came out of it. It was the first time I've ever blacked out on a dive." He said it made him "deathly sick."

Otherwise, he said, there was no serious trouble. But Hubert Elliott, who handled equipment aboard the tender, said the channel "gave us some worried minutes."

He said that after Butler blacked out, he doubted that he could have stayed down the 20 hours originally planned for the crossing.

Nation Enters Critical Period of Polio Season; Cases Below '49

New York, Aug. 5 (P)—The nation is now entering the critical phase of the polio season.

The number of cases this year is below that of 1949 at the same time, but experts of the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis point out that August, September and October are the months in which the rate of polio incidence shoots upward.

Latest figures from the public health service showed that 6,119 cases have been reported since January 1. In the same period last year there were 8,279 cases. The 1949 total was 42,375, highest in the country's history.

Scientists working in the laboratory and in the epidemic areas don't know why polio goes hand in hand with hot, dry months. Neither do they know for sure just how the disease, caused by a virus, is spread.

However, in recent years medical science has found better means of diagnosing the disease and as a result more cases have been recognized earlier, bringing about more prompt attention and less paralysis.

Each epidemic year, there seems to be a "hot spot." Last year, it was San Angelo, Tex. This year, it is Wytheville, Va., where polio in the county was

AFL Passes Up Endorsement

Portland, Aug. 7 (P)—The Oregon Federation of Labor decided Saturday to pass up endorsement of candidates for state labor commissioner.

The executive board reported both republican William E. Kimsey, incumbent, and democratic nominee Howard Morgan have good labor records.

It opposed legislative reapportionment on a county basis instead of by population, a proposal on the November ballot.

Endorsed were measures providing for: Increase in legislators' pay to \$800 a year; sale of bonds for farm and home loans to veterans; the 1949 legislature's old age pension bill, which repeals the so-called Dunne initiative; a referendum on a bill giving the governor power to proclaim daylight saving time only if four bordering states

adopt daylight time; a veterans bonus.
