

New Pooling For W. Europe

Strasbourg, France, Aug. 8 (P)—British conservative delegates in the European consultative assembly today presented a new project for pooling Europe's steel and coal production as an alternative to the Schuman plan.

The British outline drafted by David Eccles and Harold MacMillan, is said to represent the limit to which Britain would go in joining such a pool.

British labor party delegates in the assembly said they would remain neutral in discussions. Support for the new plan, they explained, might embarrass their own government. On the other hand, they will not oppose it.

Under the Eccles-MacMillan proposals, the key control over the international steel-coal authority would be a committee of foreign ministers of the member countries with the veto right over authority decisions.

The project was contained in a 21-point resolution for the assembly's consideration when it debates the Schuman plan. It outlines a treaty which member nations would submit to their respective parliaments.

Truman Raps Alaska Strike

Washington, Aug. 8 (P)—President Truman today with Secretary of Defense Johnson today in denouncing a housing construction strike in Alaska as one that jeopardizes "the security of the United States."

Johnson emerged from a White House talk with the president to say that the strike of AFL steamfitters and plumbers on defense housing in Alaska is "jeopardizing the security of the United States."

And, he added, "I say that after consulting with the president of the United States."

"Then, the president approves your statement?" a reporter asked.

"Yes."

Johnson said that defense housing projects in Fairbanks and Anchorage primarily were affected.

He said the steamfitters and plumbers have been out since July 26 after demanding a wage raise of \$2.50 an hour plus double pay for overtime and room and board outside the cities.

He said the projects were held up recently by a strike of carpenters, but that the strike was settled.

Johnson made his statement after his regular Tuesday call on the president for a conference in which he was joined by Secretary of the Army Pace.

Claude Ingalls, Editor, Passes

Corvallis, Aug. 8 (P)—Claude Eugene Ingalls, for 35 years publisher of the Gazette Times here died at his home today. He was 72 years old.

Death followed a long illness that forced his retirement from active work at the newspaper last February.

Prior to his retirement he had guided the destiny of the paper through many a campaign. A strong republican and with deep convictions he frequently took a firm stand on controversial issues and spoke his mind editorially despite severe criticism from other newspapers and political figures. He was known far and wide for his witty paragraphs.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Friday in Corvallis at the Demoss-Durand Mayflower chapel. Interment will be at the Oaklawn cemetery here.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Stanton Wallace, Corvallis, and a son, Robert A. Ingalls, Corvallis, editor and business manager of the Gazette-Times.

Sunspot Activity Disrupts Radios

New York, Aug. 8 (P)—Trans-Atlantic communications were disrupted today by sunspot activity after a display of the northern lights over the eastern part of the United States.

MacKay radio, RCA communications and Western Union Cables said press copy and messages from London and European cities were garbled or delayed in transmission.

Land communications apparently were not affected by the sunspots.

Gordon Moore Called to Duty

One of Marion county's deputy district attorneys, Gordon Moore, is winding up his affairs with that office this week and reporting for duty with the Marine Corps.

Moore, a captain in the reserves, and an associate officer with C battery of the 4th 105 howitzer battalion, Marine Corps Reserves, requested assignment to the unit about a month ago. His orders assigning him to the unit arrived Tuesday morning at the inspector-instructors office and the same day he reported for duty with the unit.

A veteran of service with the Marines in World War II, Capt. Moore was a member of the Willamette University football team in Hawaii at the time of the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941. He enlisted in the Marines in April, 1942, and reported for duty following his graduation from Willamette that year.

A year and a half was spent overseas by Moore, who saw service in the Russell Islands and Okinawa. His last service overseas was with the 12th service battalion in Okinawa during the campaign for that island. Moore was relieved of active duty Thanksgiving day, 1945. He resumed his studies at the Willamette University Law school and was graduated in 1948. Moore received his appointment as deputy district attorney January 1, 1949.

Remaining in Salem, at least for a time, when Capt. Moore leaves here with the Marine unit will be his wife and the couple's 6-year-old daughter.

150 Planes in Overnight Fly-in

Tillamook, Ore., Aug. 8 (P)—Pilots from Oregon, Washington, and California, accompanied by their families, will flock to the Tillamook naval air station for the second overnight fly-in Aug. 19-20, sponsored by the local airport committee.

More than 150 planes were already signed up to participate, according to Walt Herd, Tillamook airport operator. Plans call for a dinner at their air station Officers club Saturday followed by a dance.

Most of the group is scheduled to take off for Pacific City Sunday morning following a breakfast to attend the dedication of a new landing strip at the beach resort.

Groups participating in the flight include the Oregon Sportsmen Pilots, Flying Farmers, Oregon Flyers, Inc., and the Astoria, Oregon, Flyers.

Grant Forbidden Ever to See Children

Los Angeles, Aug. 8 (P)—John Henry Grant, convicted of attempting to wipe out his family with a time-bomb, has been forbidden ever to see his children again.

The 32-year-old aircraft engineer, who faces a possible 120-year prison term, was divorced yesterday by his wife, Betty, 29. The decree specifically denies him the right to see his two children, Marie Ann, 5, and Robert Earle, 5. The charge was cruelty.

Grant was found guilty of trying to murder his wife and the children for \$25,000 insurance. The bomb, placed in a suitcase, was discovered just before the scheduled departure of an airliner on which they were passengers April 17. No one was injured.

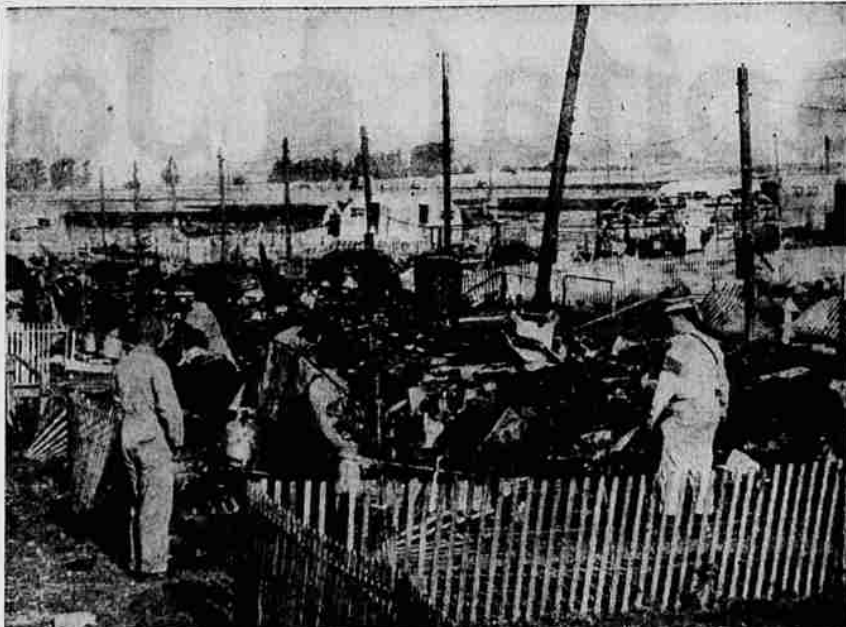

Hollywood, Aug. 8 (P)—Gloria Swanson revealed today that maidenly modesty almost kept her from being a movie star. She ran out on old time producer Mack Sennett when he "clothed me in a mental bathing suit."

"The way he eyed me, I thought he was a wolf," she said. "He said come back tomorrow, but I didn't go back."

Miss Swanson was delivered to posterity by Sennett's chauffeur, who eventually went and got her.

Thirty-five years later, she's still a movie star, and she still looks good in a bathing suit—mental or material.

If there were more grandmothers like herself in movie theaters, and less popcorn, business would be booming, she said.

"People over 35 are staying away from movies, and that's because there are no people over 35 in movies," she said. "How can older people identify themselves or interest themselves in those babies?"

Miss Swanson was thrown out of movies for being too prim even before she flunked as a Sennett bathing beauty. She wouldn't cooperate with Charlie Chaplin in a scene in which he was to kick her.

"I thought I was a great tragedienne," she said. "I was so serious I was funny. Mack Sennett said he was going to make a second Mabel Normand out of me."

"I said, 'you won't make a second anybody out of me.'"

"He said, 'Oh, no?' and tore up my contract."

Delay Action On Control Bill

Washington, Aug. 8 (P)—The house today postponed until at least tomorrow further debate on an economic controls bill — while its banking committee worked on a compromise.

Speaker Rayburn told newsmen he hoped that the house would be in a position to resume consideration of the bill tomorrow. It already has spent almost a week on controls legislation without making any substantial progress.

Chairman Spence (D., Ky.) said the banking committee would meet again this afternoon to seek a common ground on which opposing factions could agree. He expressed hope that an agreement would be reached shortly.

There was a possibility that the senate may pass a controls bill before the house does. The senate banking committee reached agreement on a bill last night, and that bill is being used as a base for the house committee's discussions.

President Truman would get virtually full discretion as to when or whether to impose economic controls under the senate committee plan.

Army in Trouble Over Priorities

Washington, Aug. 8 (P)—The army is having trouble with its policy of assigning priority to men with no dependents in calling up individual reservists, it was learned today.

While there has been no official change of the overall policy announced only last Friday, individual army area commanders are discovering they must set aside the priority program and

bring in reservists purely on the basis of requirements.

The difficulty is that only a small percentage of reservists fall in the no-dependent category. To fill out national guard and reserve units and provide key specialists for expansion of the regular army, the army is beginning to call in men regardless of their dependency status.

In announcing last week its intention to summon 62,000 individual reservists during September and October, the army had said that:

"Priority will be determined by the number of dependents of the individual reservists. Those with no dependents will be called up first, those with one dependent, second, and those with more than one dependent, last."
