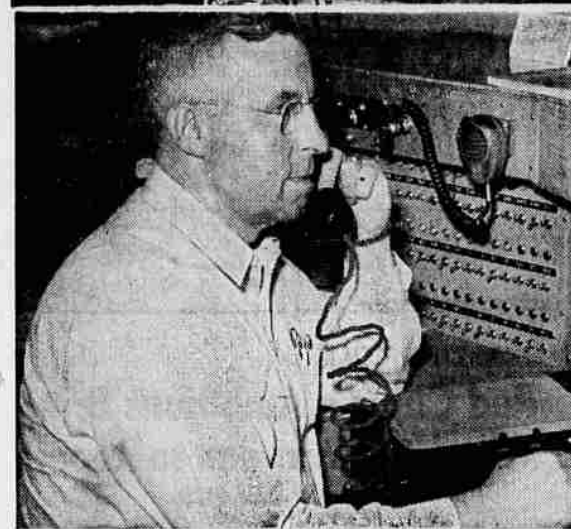




**Doney Changes Uniforms** — Last week Herman Doney, member of the Salem police force for the second time in eight years changed his uniform for that of the U. S. Marine Corps. Doney, a reservist, Friday reported for active duty with the Marines, his third time to serve with the U. S. Marine Corps. ### Sergeant Herman Doney Third Time in the Marines

Duty with the Marine Corps of the United States at three different times and twice with the Salem police force. That is the record of Tech. Sgt. Herman M. Doney, who Friday for the second time in eight years exchanged his blue police uniform for a Marine Corps uniform.

The big sergeant, a resident of Salem since 1918, first enlisted for service with the Marine Corps in 1929. Prior to that enlistment he had been a truck driver for Paul Traglio.

Doney remained with the Marine Corps until 1937 and that year was granted his discharge as a private first class at San Diego. During those years of service he saw duty at the Marine Corps Base at San Diego, aboard the USS Saratoga and the USS Lexington, the Marine Barracks at Bremerton, Wash., and at Pearl Harbor.

Returning to Salem after his discharge Sgt. Doney in 1938 joined the Salem police force. He stayed there until 1942 and then again returned to the Marine Corps.

As a sergeant with the Marines Doney was assigned to duty in Salem at the recruiting station and remained there until discharged in 1945. Following his discharge the sergeant returned to the Salem police force and remained there until the Marines again called him to active duty last Friday.

Doney, who with others of the Salem unit which is C battery of the 4th Howitzer battalion, Marine Corps Reserve, leaves for a California camp soon, was among the first Salem men to join the local reserve unit when it was formed. He signed with it in July, 1947.

For two years he has been a member of the unit's rifle and pistol team. In 1948 the pistol team took first place in district competition and in 1949, while the team rated only third, Sgt. Doney took top honors for individuals in pistol competition in the district.

When Doney leaves for California remaining behind will be his wife, the former Miriam Baker of Tacoma, whom Doney met when he was stationed at Bremerton with the Marines and married in 1939, and the couple's 6-year-old son, Melvin Ray. The two will join the sergeant later, however, if he is assigned to permanent detail in the United States.

Oakland, Calif., Aug. 8 (AP)—William Ward, 6, fell into an Oakland estuary canal yesterday and was sucked into a culvert. K. J. Sadamora, who saw him, raced 100 feet to the other end of the huge pipe, dove into the water and held William until police pulled out both. The boy was revived by artificial respiration.

### Region-Wide Grass Program Seeks to Boost Farm Income

The present \$172,000,000 annual cash farm income in Oregon can be doubled, possibly trebled, according to the Portland Chamber of Commerce which has announced its backing of a region-wide grass program aimed at restoring balance to the region's agriculture.

G. A. Brown, chairman of the Chamber Agricultural committee, declared, "We hope to help make the farmers and stockmen of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana — in fact the entire West — aware of the technological advances which have been made by the state colleges and various federal agencies in the field of new grasses, improved methods and better range and pasture management practices."

Brown said that the new developments of the past ten years, when adopted on a region-wide basis, will revolutionize the area's livestock industry.

Portland Chamber President Edgar W. Smith stated that the grass program is the most far reaching single project undertaken by the chamber since the completion of Bonneville dam, emphasizing the immense opportunity open to Pacific Northwest farmers and stockmen to adopt the new methods and greatly increase their meat production from any given number of acres.

Smith said that the program would mean much to farm equipment dealers, bankers, in fact all those who have any dealings with the farm and ranch trade.

A wheat and cattle rancher on a large scale in eastern Washington, Smith pointed to excellent results in restoring fertility to the soil and saving what otherwise might soon become eroded land from too long single-crop use.

That thousands of animals can be added to present herds by spreading the use of a number

of relatively new grasses, is a proven fact, according to Omar C. Spencer, chairman of the chamber sub-committee on the grass program.

### Dance Hall Knife Fight Hurts Five

Lebanon — Five local men were attacked with knives shortly after 1 a.m. Sunday morning as they prepared to leave the Fir Grove dance hall. Two of them, Larry Gangle and Elbert Dickson required hospitalization. Others less seriously cut were Carroll Rubesh, Robert Rowley

and Wayne Dickson, all of Lebanon.

Arrested for the attack and charged with assault with dangerous weapons were two brothers, Joe Barry Bishop and Wesley Bishop, and their brother-in-law, Raymond Harold Baise, all of Sweet Home.

Both Bishop offenders are ex-convicts, it was brought out in their appearance at justice court in Albany Monday morning. Joe was a member of the gang that robbed the Sweet Home bank several years ago. He is on

parole from the federal penitentiary. His brother is on parole from a California prison.

State police reported the three men were arrested at the scene by state police officer William Conrady, who was summoned during the progress of the fighting.

#### Test Fliers Ball Out

Muroc, Calif., Aug. 8 (AP)—Two fliers bailed out safely as a navy AJ-1 attack bomber crashed yesterday in the first reported

failure of the plane designed especially to carry the A-bomb. Pilot Daniel Darnell Jr., 30, and Co-pilot Charles E. Poage, 27, testing for North American Aviation, makers of the plane, parachuted from 15,000 feet when the plane's right engine was torn away. The plane crashed four miles from Edwards Air Force base. The navy is spending more than \$12,000,000 on the development of the twin-engine AJ-1.
