

Marines Capture Kosong After Routing Enemy

With U. S. Marines in Kosong, Korea, Aug. 11 (AP)—The U. S. Marines today captured Kosong, largest city to fall to the Americans in their current attack on the southern flank of the Korean front.

The Marines drove out the North Korean Reds and took over the city at about noon. The leathernecks had fought through the night against stiff Red opposition which crumbled just before Kosong was occupied.

Department for Girls Opens

Lightning Starts Forest Fires

(By the Associated Press) Violent winds, rain and lightning storms sparked a series of new fires in southern and central Oregon forest land last night. In the worst of the fire areas, along the Oregon-California borders, crews were split to combat two blazes.

Six fires were set off by lightning in the Rogue river valley, one a grass fire that for a while threatened dynamite stores of the Medford Lumber corporation. None of the Medford area fires was serious. Forest observers in the Ochoco forest in central Oregon reported ten lightning strikes in the Horse Heaven sector southeast of Prineville had set two fires. Storms in the past ten days have caused fifty known blazes, all small.

On the border fires south of Grants Pass, lumbermen of the Moore Timber Products mill and logging operations near O'Brien were pulled off the Elk creek fire last night to fight a new blaze west of the Redwood highway in the Blue Creek sector. State Assistant District Fire Warden John Kincaid expected control of this fire later today. The highway—U. S. 199—was still open to travel, but the fire line of the Elk creek blaze was less than a mile from the road. Tinder dry snags are burning along the west side of the route three miles south of the California border check station.

The Siskiyou National Forest headquarters reported another 150 men were recruited in Gasquet, Calif., to work the larger border fires weeping southwest into the Six Rivers National Forest.

The storm caused little power trouble or fruit damage in the Rogue sector.

Forceps Said Removed From Woman

A surgeon's instrument that a woman patient had carried in her abdomen for five years was removed in an operation Thursday at Salem Memorial hospital.

Neither the name of the patient nor details of the case have been divulged. It is known, however, that the previous operation, when the surgeon neglected to remove the instrument, reported to be a pair of forceps, was performed in the state of California. Surgical treatment at that time was given her because of injuries in an automobile accident.

The patient is reported progressing favorably toward recovery.

Carson to Run For High Court

Allan G. Carson announced Thursday night that he will be a candidate for the supreme court to fill the place held for 25 years by the late Justice Harry H. Belt.

Carson, Salem lawyer, is one of Marion county's state senators, but was not a candidate for renomination in the May primaries.

Justice Belt died this week, and to fill the vacancy Governor Douglas McKay appointed Harold J. Warner of Portland. Warner also announced Thursday night that he will be a candidate in November to succeed himself.

To vote for Carson or Warner, or any other candidate who may declare himself, it will be necessary for the voters to write their names on the ballot. The reason for that is that it is too late for anyone to become a candidate by convention or petition. The deadline is next Monday.

Justice Belt's term would have expired in January, 1955. Hence whoever is elected to the non-partisan office in November will serve until that time.

Carson was elected representative from Marion county in 1940, serving in the 1941 session. He was elected to the senate in 1942 and has since been successively re-elected, though his service was interrupted by his absence in war service when his brother, John Carson, served in the senate in his place.

Allan Carson has a wide acquaintance in legal and veteran affairs as well as politically. He is a past commander of Capital post No. 9, American Legion, and of the Salem post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He served on the Mexican border in 1916 with the Oregon National Guard. In World War I he volunteered and was promoted to the rating of first lieutenant in battle.

He is now a lieutenant-colonel in the air force reserve by virtue of service in World War II as a combat and counter-intelligence officer with the air corps in the India-Burma theater.

Carson is a member of the board of Salem General hospital, member of the Salem boxing commission and of the Memorial Auditorium association in which he is a committee member. He is a member of the Episcopal church, the Masons, Elks, Kappa Sigma and Delta Theta Phi, and is a past president of the Oregon State Bar association.

He was born in Salem in 1897, and educated in the Salem schools, Willamette university and University of Oregon. He has practiced law here since 1922. From 1922 to 1927 he was deputy district attorney.

He is married, and has a son 24 and daughter 20. The Carsons live at 2185 South Church street.

Airposts for Observation

Oregon's air observation posts west of the Cascades have been established and the entire state system is expected to be set up well ahead of the Sept. 19 deadline, Gov. Douglas McKay was advised today.

Louis E. Starr of Portland, director of the state civil defense agency, turned in a report showing progress to date in Oregon's home-front planning against natural and war-caused emergencies. More than 150 communities have appointed local air observation supervisors, Starr said.

Lt. Col. Claud Farrow, a National Guard officer who was placed on active duty for 90 days June 19 to organize the observation-post program, is doing a "splendid service," Starr told the governor. Starr said cities and counties are cooperating "magnificently" with Farrow, and the rapid progress has been noted in a commendatory letter from the Western Air Defense Force headquarters at Hamilton Field, Calif.

Frost to Figure On Food Supply

Washington, Aug. 11 (AP)—Jack Frost may have a lot to say about next year's supplies and prices of meats, dairy and poultry products.

Current production prospects for feed grains—the raw material for livestock product foods—are quite favorable. But an early frost, the agriculture department noted today, could change all this.

Unusually cool, rainy weather in some heavy corn producing areas during July kept this grain from developing as it should. Consequently, the later planted corn would be subject to damage from freezing weather.

Insects, such as the corn borer and grasshoppers, also pose a serious threat to the crop in some areas, the department reported.

Corn production prospects made virtually no change during July. Forecast at 3,168,000,000 bushels, such a crop would be a little smaller than last year's 3,377,000,000 bushels. But it would be sharply above a production goal of 2,627,000,000 bushels set by the department before the international situation raised needs.

A big reserve of corn from last year assures ample supplies for the current rate of livestock production.

duction. But any material cut in size of this year's crop could be expected to influence next year's livestock operations. Higher feed grain prices could well prevent a desired expansion in some lines.

Naktong Beachheads Retaken Except One

Tokyo, Saturday, Aug. 12 (AP)—General MacArthur's headquarters said today all communist bridgeheads across the Naktong river, except in the Changnyong area, had been erased by American units.

Heavy fighting continues in breaches of the Naktong river defense line with enemy strength at Changnyong estimated at two regiments supported by artillery, said a release issued by MacArthur's headquarters at 12:50 a.m. (9:50 a.m. EST Friday).

The communiques only mention of the Pohang area fighting was the statement that United Nations troops were "counter-attacking the plunge of North Koreans down the corridor separating the east coast and the South Korean defense positions" in the Kigye sector.
