

Tree Commission Appointed by Mayor

Mayor Robert L. Elfstrom today announced appointment of the commission recently authorized by the city council to make a survey and form a program for tree and shrub plantings in Salem, particularly along the streets.

The members are: Miss Elizabeth Lord, chairman; Miss Edith Schryver, Mark Taylor, Milton L. Meyers and Paul B. Wallace. Miss Lord and Meyers served on the old park board and are members of the present advisory committee on parks. Miss Schryver has been closely identified with parks and landscaping.

Writers Sore At Sherwood

Edinburgh, Scotland, Aug. 19 (AP)—When American dramatist Robert Sherwood told a convention of literary people today that Prime Minister Stalin has displayed a capacity for "abysmal stupidity" some of his audience got so angry they walked out. Sherwood, addressing the International Congress of Pens in connection with the Edinburgh arts festival, said many intelligent people hold the view that "Uncle Joe" will not be stupid enough to start another war. He added:

"The bitter fact is that Stalin has already displayed a capacity for abysmal stupidity."

Sherwood declared the present world situation is unnecessary and senseless and accused the Russians of "incredible intransigence." He said those responsible are, like Hitler, headed for suicide.

At the point of interruption from the audience forced Sherwood to pause.

"You are speaking about drama, not politics," one listener cried. Some walked out. Sherwood then finished his talk.

Clean-up S. D. By Ellsworth

Washington, Aug. 19 (AP)—Rep. Harris Ellsworth (R.), of Roseburg, Ore., today demanded a general housecleaning in the state department, including the resignation of Secretary of State Dean Acheson.

The congressman termed the statement "That I have lost confidence in the secretary of state . . . an understatement." He said "a housecleaning in the department from the top down" was called for.

Continuing his vehement attack, Ellsworth condemned the present U. S. policy toward Formosa, which, he said, was to quarantine the island until the Chinese communists have gathered sufficient force "to stage a landing and capture Formosa."

Ellsworth charged that the lack of a state department policy had forced this country into the Korean war.

New Addition Spared As Fire Razes House

Lebanon—Fire which broke out in an upstairs bedroom at 10 p.m. Thursday swept through the main section of the Emmett Hinthorn home three miles south of Lebanon, leaving intact only a newly built L-addition. The two children of the family sleeping in an adjoining upstairs bedroom escaped without injury.

The Lebanon fire department sent out two pumps maintained for rural use and although the main building was nearly destroyed when they arrived they succeeded in saving the addition and prevented spread of the blaze to neighboring homes.

No reason has been assigned to the cause of the fire. Some insurance was carried.

Big Music Program From Chicago Tonight

Chicago, Aug. 19 (AP)—The 21st annual Chicagoand music festival, one of the nation's biggest song programs, will be held tonight in Soldier field.

The festival normally fills the huge lake front stadium which seats about 100,000. Alec Templeton, blind pianist, will be the guests star. Egbert Van Alstyne, 72, composer of "In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree," and other songs, will be guest of honor.

Taylor has served as president of the Men's Garden club, and Wallace has taken a keen interest in parks and kindred movements.

The commission was recommended by the planning and zoning commission, and the city council enacted an ordinance creating it, with authorization for the mayor to make the appointment.

The ordinance does not cover the streets where trees are being removed in developing of the one-way street grid, such as South Liberty, South Commercial and Pine streets. For that reason the mayor has requested the new commission to add to its duties by including in its recommendations a policy of replanting trees on those streets.

Members of the commission, it is known, hold to the opinion that tree and shrub planting on Salem streets has been without plan, and that many of the trees are of an undesirable type. They are expected to make recommendations for more uniformity.

Nazarenes Buy Land for Church

Stayton—Purchase of the old Davie property at 657 Second street and the adjacent lot on the corner of Second and Virginia streets, is a part of a long-range plan of the Nazarene Association of Southwest Oregon to secure the property for a future church plant.

However, present plans do not call for the immediate construction of a church and parsonage on the site, A.R. Rutledge, construction engineer for the church, told the city council Monday night.

An inspection of the property was made this week by Mr. Rutledge and Paul Knapp of Salem, both members of the board. Mr. Rutledge told the council he had been engaged in building a church plant at Myrtle Point and showed pictures of the work.

The church plans to raze the house to its framework, which was found to be sound, place a foundation under it, and rebuild the house to make it conform as near as possible to the modern trend in architecture. The old lean-to shacks at the rear will be torn away. Trees will be removed wherever necessary and the lots cleaned of debris. A garage with a breezeway adjoining the house will be the only permanent building at the present time. It is planned to eventually tear down the house to make way for a new parsonage at some future date. New plumbing and wiring will also be installed.

The Nazarene association maintains churches that are an asset to the communities they serve. Mr. Rutledge said, and promised full co-operation with the city in conforming with its codes.

Gandhi Memorial Unveiled Tomorrow

Los Angeles, Aug. 19 (AP)—The Self-Realization Fellowship announced today that a Gandhi peace shrine, which will contain part of the ashes of Mahatma Gandhi, will be unveiled by California's Lt. Gov. Goodwin J. Knight in ceremonies Sunday.

The dedication of the shrine will mark the 30th anniversary of the Self-Realization Fellowship in America, founded by Paramhansa Yogananda.

Some Phoners Back at Posts

Tacoma, Aug. 19 (AP)—Telephone operators in Olympia and Shelton returned to their posts at 11 a.m. today, Don Franklin, Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company manager in Tacoma said.

The return to work came just 24 hours after the Thurston and Mason county operators had walked off their jobs for a meeting protesting what was termed company delay in settlement of their contract.

The operators' move came as Tacoma operators continued to picket 15 company installations in Pierce county. Representatives of the union and the company, meanwhile, continued their negotiations in Seattle.

Union negotiators today rejected a telephone company offer of wage increases of 1½ cents an hour for telephone operators but resumed negotiations with the company as Spokane employees threatened to join the three-city walkout.

E. J. Follis, negotiator for the Communications Workers of America (CWA), said "We won't settle for any such pittance. The contract signed with plant employees two weeks ago called for approximately six-cents an hour increase."

Follis said it is hoped negotiations will be speeded up with the arrival of A. T. Jones, national vice president of the CWA, who has participated in a number of other contract settlements throughout the nation.

There is danger, Follis said, the walkout will spread to the entire Washington-Idaho area with 3,182 employees involved unless a settlement is reached soon.

Operators in Spokane yesterday threatened to join their sisters in Tacoma, Olympia and Shelton, who already have left their posts. They advertised in a Spokane paper that "telephone service has been interrupted in some Washington areas. It may be interrupted in more."

The dispute in Spokane is essentially the same as that which started the strike Tuesday in Tacoma—town reclassification. This would provide pay jumps in communities which had experienced population increases.

Sobell Sweats In Texas Jail

Laredo, Tex., Aug. 19 (AP)—Morton Sobell, eighth American charged with giving defense secrets to Russia, sweated out removal to New York in the Webb county jail here today after his arrest in Mexico.

Mexican secret police turned Sobell over to the FBI in a hush-hush border meeting here early yesterday. He was held for \$100,000 bond by U. S. Commissioner Frank Y. Hill.

Sobell, 33-year-old New York radar expert of Russian descent, fled to Mexico when the FBI began seizing suspects in the Klaus Fuchs spy ring. A Mexican government spokesman said in Mexico City last night that officers of that country investigated Sobell for three weeks before arresting him. FBI men here would not discuss details of the arrest or his transfer to this side of the Rio Grande.

Sobell's return to New York awaits signing of removal papers by U. S. District Judge James V. Allred of Corpus Christi.

Sobell's wife and two children are staying at a Laredo hotel. Mrs. Sobell visited him at the jail yesterday, bringing him a clean shirt and slacks, fruit and cigarettes.

In New York, U. S. Attorney Irving H. Saypol said Sobell was arrested at his direction after a sealed warrant was issued here August 3 by U. S. Commissioner Edward W. McDonald. "We have been investigating Sobell for some time," Saypol said.

Sobell was described by an FBI spokesman as a close friend of Julius Rosenberg and his wife, Ethel, both of whom were indicted by a federal grand jury Thursday on espionage conspiracy charges.

DAV Wants War On Reds at Home

San Francisco, Aug. 19 (AP)—Disabled American Veterans demand all-out war against domestic communists and further tightening of the homefront.

Some 4,000 veterans wound up the DAV's week-long encampment last night with installation of officers.

New national commander is Boniface R. Malle, World War II veteran and 37-year-old Detroit attorney.

Malle pledged himself to carry out these policies laid down by the convention:

1—Death penalty in extreme cases for subversives who endanger the security of the U. S.
2—"Security" camps for all communists.

3—Government registration of persons formerly associated with the communist party.

4—Drafting of both labor and capital in the event of total war.
5—Legislation to make black marketing "an act of treason against the United States."

6—Severe penalties for violators of rent and price control laws.

One resolution called on President Truman to reopen all veterans administration hospitals he has ordered closed, another demanded that congressional approval be required to close such institutions in the future.

Clearing Point For Orphans

The State Public Welfare commission with headquarters in Portland will serve as a clearing agency for all foreign-born orphans brought into Oregon under a provision of the new displaced persons bill.

The decision was reached by Gov. Douglas McKay's committee on displaced persons at its quarterly meeting in Salem Friday.

Five thousand displaced orphans will be permitted to enter the United States under terms of the act, and committee members estimated that 50 would be the maximum number that would find homes in Oregon.

The committee decided at its meeting here Friday that persons desiring to adopt one of the children must make application at welfare commission offices in Portland.

After approval of such application by the commission, one of its licensees or one of its representatives, the necessary papers will be sent to the displaced persons commission in Washington, D. C., for processing.

Stayton—Petunia plantings in the Stayton Garden club's annual petunia contest, will be judged Tuesday morning, August 22, with out-of-town judges officiating. Those whose home are on lanes or side roads who have petunia planting to be judged are asked to call the chairman, Mrs. Fred Berger at 2095 if they have not already done so, in order that the judges may include theirs in the contest.

Marriage Set Early in Year

Deauville, France, Aug. 19 (AP)—King Farouk's press counselor says the portly young ruler expects to marry sultry 16-year-old Narriman Sadek in Egypt early next year.

Karim Thabet Pasha, first counselor at the Royal Palace in Cairo, made the announcement here yesterday when reporters brought up the widely discussed question.

Thabet Pasha said there was no possibility of marriage while Farouk is vacationing at Deauville. He said the 30-year-old monarch would be married only in Egypt.

Asked when Farouk would wed, the press counselor replied "in Egypt early next year."

There had been considerable speculation that Farouk and Narriman might at this resort city.

The Egyptian monarch is expected to leave here about Monday, although reservations have been made all through next week at the swank Hotel Du Golf where he is staying.

From Deauville he is expected to go to Marseille to board his yacht which brought him to France from Egypt. Tentative plans call for a visit to the French Riviera.

War Writers Have Trouble

Tokyo, Aug. 19 (AP)—War correspondents in Korea filed only a trickle of news today because their communications lines—both telephone and teletype—were removed.

Army officials explained the equipment was needed to build up communications facilities in other military installations.

The teletype circuit and telephone lines which had linked correspondents with their Tokyo office were removed completely.

The only news that could be relayed from headquarters correspondents was phoned over one of the few non-military telephone lines still remaining in use.

Eighth army headquarters always has barred newsmen from using telephones inside of headquarters.

Removal of telephones and teletypes has been underway for two days.

The last press telephone line, located in the correspondents' billet, was taken out today after newsmen literally sat on it to hold it. Associated Press correspondent Lelf Erickson reported.

Biggest Short-Circuit Slated for Midnight

Coulee Dam, Wash., Aug. 19—The largest dam in the world will be the scene at midnight tonight of the "most powerful circuit" man has ever created.

Westinghouse Electric Corp. announced today that five of their engineers, in cooperation with the Bureau of Reclamation, will deliberately ground one of Grand Coulee's high-voltage lines.

Then—in the time it takes an object to drop a half-inch—a \$100,000 circuit breaker will stop 13,500,000 electric horsepower. That's more than two and one-half times the power capacity of the entire Northwest Power Pool.

Drop Knife Charge

Albany—Assault charges against Joe Bishopp, Oakland, were dropped at a preliminary hearing in justice court here Wednesday, but Bishop's brother, Wesley, of Sweet Home, and Raymond Harold Balse, were bound over to the grand jury, charged with injuring five persons in a knife fight at the Fir Grove dance hall, two miles east of Lebanon on August 6.

Mother Leaps With Child To Escape Fire

Eugene, Aug. 19 (AP)—A Lane county mother was in critical condition at Sacred Heart hospital this noon after she had jumped from a second story window with her two young children in her arms to escape racing flames.

Mrs. John Hamer, who lives near Goshen, leaped and landed on a wood pile with Frankie, age 2, and Johnnie, 7 months old, in her arms. She jumped before her husband could put up a ladder that he had gone to get.

Ten year old Betty Jean followed her mother out the window and landed on the wood. She was also reported in serious condition at the hospital.

Senators Backtrack On Soldier Discharges

Washington, Aug. 19 (AP)—Faced by possible loss of 25,000 seasoned sergeants and corporals senators backtracked today on a decision to direct the armed forces to discharge all enlisted personnel with more than three dependents.

Such a provision was made part of the bill to allow monthly support payments to wives, children and parents of enlisted personnel in the armed services which the senate armed services committee approved Thursday.
