- Mexican Cheese on Hot Crisp Toast
Tossed Green Salad

Mexican Cheese
Ingredients: 1/2 cup ripe olives, 2 tablespoons finely diced onion, 1 cup finely diced green pepper, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons flour, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon chili powder, 1 cup tomato juice, 1 cup cooked or canned whole-kernel corn, 1 1/2 cups grated American cheese, hot crisp toast.

Methods: Cut olives from pits into large pieces. Cook onion and pepper slowly in butter or margarine for a few minutes. Blend in flour, salt and chili powder. Add tomato juice and corn and cook and stir until thickened. Stir in cheese and olives and cook over low heat until cheese melts. Serve on hot crisp toast. Makes 4 servings.

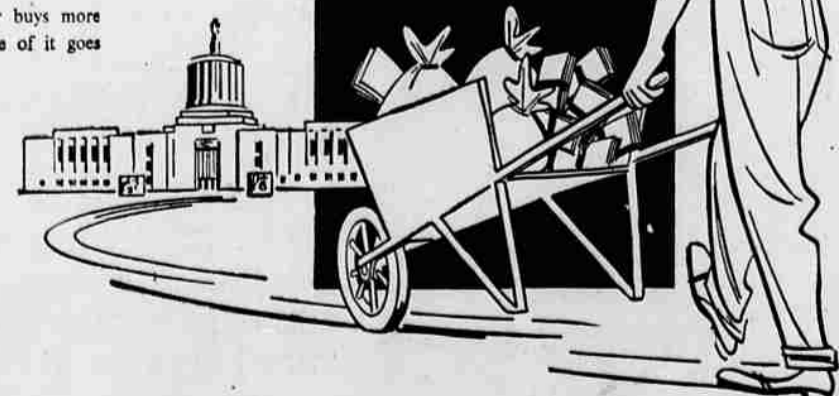
