Marble Service Station To Open About Sept. 9

What is probably the only marble service station in the United States and perhaps in the entire world is expected to be open for business at Capitol and Center streets around September 9. Workmen began setting the slabs of marble against the reinforced walls Wednesday.

3 Youths Held For Felonies

A thin line of evidence which began with issuance of a citation for running a red light was built up by Salem police to the point where three youths were behind bars Thursday on felony charges.

Vaughn Moses, 20, of 248 D street, held the key to the case. He was cited for running a stop light and for driving with expired plates.

In police court, he was fined \$15 on those charges and jailed for failure to pay. A routine check of his car disclosed that it contained a Viking sweater, possibly one reported stolen by Don Blackmer, Route 4, from his locker at a Salem cannery.

Under questioning, Moses said the sweater had been put in his car by Mack C. Hartman, 18, Route 3, Box 564.

Officers didn't have to search for Hartman. He came in to visit Moses in the city jail. There, detectives questioned him and secured admissions which cleared four separate car prowling thefts.

Hartman in turn implicated Melvin Maas, 19, 3835 Midway drive, in the forging and passing of a \$25.35 cannery check payable to Robert Strong.

Hartman and Maas pleaded guilty to the forgery charge in district court and were ordered held on \$1,000 bail for grand jury action. They were committed to the county jail.

Subsequently, Robert Upson, 540 North 14th street, signed complaints charging Hartman with theft of accessories from his car and Moses with receiving the stolen property. Bail on those charges was set at \$750 for each of the youths.

Pendleton Round-up Now Under Way

Pendleton, Aug. 24 (P)—Pendleton's annual western spectacle, the Round-Up, was under way today.

The weather was comfortably cool under clouds with no rain forecast. People were starting to arrive in numbers and the usual 5000-6000 first day crowd was expected.

The opening was touched off last night with start of Happy Canyon pageantry and races on the Round-Up track.

Arena events for the 39th annual show were scheduled for 1:15 p. m. today with the top U. S. and Canadian cowboys on hand to vie for the \$5000 Sam Jackson trophy and points toward national titles.

The arena competition will continue each afternoon through Sunday.

The Westward Ho! parade, this year with a history of transportation theme, will move through the city's streets tomorrow morning.

\$17 Billion for War Costs OK'd

Washington, Aug. 24 (P)—A \$16,771,084,479 bill providing cash for 5,333 new war planes and other equipment for America's growing military machine was approved today by the house appropriations committee.

An emergency measure growing out of the war in Korea, it not only finances expansion of United States armed might but also carries \$4,000,000,000 to help arm friendly nations.

In sending the bill to the house floor, the committee wrote this sharp criticism of the defense program:

"Events of recent weeks have made it crystal clear that the military planning and thinking in key positions is not as clear and accurate as could be desired, but it is not the purpose of the committee at this time to criticize past errors of judgment."

The bill's total is \$81,400,119 less than the president requested but no reductions were made in military items.

Rev. Brown Tells Of Trip Abroad

Home from 20,000-mile trip by plane which took him to the Holy Land, to Rome, Greece and other places of interest, Rev. Wilmer C. Brown, pastor of the First Evangelical United Brethren church, spoke of his experiences during Thursday's Salem Lions club luncheon. A few of the many pictures taken during the tour were shown.

The importance of Palestine in world affairs was impressed upon the traveler, said Rev. Brown. It is important because of its geographical location, being a focal point of three continents, Europe, Asia and Africa and because of its religious historic background, the birthplace of three religions—Christianity, Judaism and Mohammedanism.

Rev. Brown found travel conditions already being restricted on account of war and expressed the belief that such a trip as he made may not be possible next year.

Ask UN to Order US from Formosa

Tokyo, Friday, Aug. 25 (P)—The Chinese communists today demanded that the United Nations order withdrawal of all American forces from Formosa and announced the red intention to "liberate" that island from the nationalists.

The announcement by the Peiping radio was heard by the Associated Press in Tokyo. It said the demand for American withdrawal was sent by Chinese communist foreign minister Chou En-Lai to the U. N. Security council and Secretary General Trygve Lie.

The United States has no armed forces on Formosa, last major redoubt of the Chinese Nationalists, but the U. S. Seventh fleet is patrolling the Formosa strait to prevent an often-threatened red attack.

Canada Moves To End Strike

Ottawa, Aug. 24 (P)—The government obtained authority today to mobilize and control all commercial aircraft to cope with a three-day-old rail strike threatening to paralyze this country's economy.

Officials said they would not use the authority unless the strike causes a further deterioration in transport facilities. These are admittedly already hard hit. Under the order the government has power to ration passenger traffic and dispatch commercial aircraft for any point in Canada for emergency use.

Thousands already have been idled by the walkout of 124,000 non-operative rail workers who are pressing demands for higher pay and a 40-hour week. More probably will be laid off as the strike continues.

The nation faced the gloomy prospect of widespread shutdown of its heavy industry and of heavy losses in sales and distribution.

Canada's millions already felt a shortage of mail and a total lack of telegraphic services.

The government has called an emergency session of parliament for next Tuesday to discuss what action it will take on the paralyzing walkout.

British Hopmen End Salem Visit

Five British hop men who have been making a study of the hop industry in the Pacific coast states and in Canada during the summer concluded their latest visit to this community Thursday noon.

They left for Portland where they were to board an airplane at 3 o'clock for Yakima, Wash., for another inspection of the yards in that area.

In the group are John F. Brown, who is in charge of the hop farm of Arthur Guinness company of London, and who heads the party; Samuel R. Alsopp, chairman of the English hop marketing board, London; John M. Brewin, agricultural economist, Wye college, Kent; Captain James Day, hop grower and member of the hop marketing board, Kent; and Charles J. Gray, manager of the Vodium Hop farms of the Guinness company.

The party has been studying all methods connected with the industry, including cultivation, handling, picking and marketing. They are especially interested in picking machines, which are quite numerous here but few in England. As an overall observation, they think the machines are a success.

They are also interested in the experimental yards of the Willamette valley where British fuggles, an early variety of hops, are being tried out, apparently with complete success. They do better in the Willamette valley than in the hotter climates, Mr. Brown said.
