

Bertrand Back From Europe

Raoul Bertrand, former professor of philosophy at Willamette university, who has recently returned from a two-year stay in Europe, concluded a visit in Salem Saturday.

Bertrand came to Willamette in 1946. In 1948 he went to France where he completed work for his doctorate degree at the Sorbonne in Paris. He traveled extensively in western Europe and for a time taught German students in Berlin. In conjunction with a book he wrote he interviewed Bertrand Russell in London and also met and talked to George Santayana, Spanish philosopher and poet.

He has accepted a position with the International University at Beirut, Lebanon, and will begin his stay there this fall.

In reference to the international crisis Bertrand said that as far as the western Europeans are concerned the Korean war is comparable to the French situation in Indo-China and the British fight against communism in Malaya.

"The big issue of course is the possibility of a Russian move westward, and for the most part western Europeans feel that such a move is inevitable," he said.

Living in Berlin isn't pleasant according to Bertrand. Divided control of such things as electricity and water lead to all kinds of difficulties and the shutting off of water, for example, usually comes at a very inconvenient time.

Bertrand will leave Portland Saturday night by plane for New York and will sail from there to Rotterdam. After taking care of some business in Berlin he will go to Naples and from there by boat to Lebanon.

While here he was a guest at the Clare A. Lee home, 2465 South Commercial.

Pilot Dives Into Tank Rather Than Bail Out

Tokyo, Aug. 26 (AP)—A heroic American fighter pilot crashed his damaged plane into an enemy armored vehicle rather than bail out over communist-held Korea, air force sources said today.

Fellow pilots said Maj. Louis J. Sebille, Pontiac, Mich., died in hurling his crippled plane into the muzzle of the gun that had damaged it.

The incident occurred last month, while Sebille was flying with two other fighter-bomber pilots. Sebille's plane was hit by fire from a tank or armored car, and his wingman told him to bail out.

Sebille replied that, rather than parachute into enemy territory, he would "go down and get the communist who got him. Then he peeled off" and dove full throttle into the Red vehicle.

Council Votes Schuman Plan

Strasbourg, France, Aug. 26 (AP)—The European consultative assembly endorsed the Schuman plan today by a 73 to 0 vote but with 32 abstentions—mostly British laborites.

Just before the final vote the assembly inserted a provision that the six Schuman plan nations again ask Britain to join. The laborites objected vigorously to this action but were voted down, 66 to 19.

Hugh Dalton, British laborite leader, said he would have supported the resolution without this proviso but was reluctantly forced to abstain on the final vote.

Debate on the resolution was marked by a sharp exchange between British laborites and conservatives present at the meeting of the lower house of the unofficial parliament of Europe. One labor spokesman accused the conservatives of trying to sabotage the Schuman plan for pooling West Europe's coal and steel.

Major Earthquake In Aleutian Islands

Cleveland, Aug. 26 (AP)—A major earthquake occurred at 12:48:20 a.m. (Eastern Daylight Time) today at the eastern edge of the Aleutians, was recorded today on the John Carroll university seismograph.

Father Henry F. Birkenhauer, observatory director, said the quake registered about 3,400 miles northwest of Cleveland.

The Aleutians are characterized by quakes close to the surface of the earth. The quakes usually are strong enough to cause tidal waves if they occur off the coast, he said.

Nome, Alaska, Aug. 26 (AP)—Three sharp earthquake tremors rattled windows and shook houses in Nome yesterday afternoon, but no damage was reported. The quake was the first ever felt in the far north community. The tremors occurred at 5:40 p.m., Nome time (8:40 p.m. PDT), 5:42 and 5:55.

President Signs Red Ousting Bill

Washington, Aug. 26 (AP)—Legislation giving the heads of 11 government agencies the right to summarily fire employees for security reasons was signed today by President Truman.

In addition to the 11 defense and semi-military agencies specifically named, the bill gives the president the power to extend its provisions to any other federal agency.

Agencies named are state, defense, army, navy, air force, treasury (in case of coast guard), commerce, justice, atomic energy commission, national security resources board, and the national advisory committee for aeronautics.

Takes North Marion Job Jefferson—Mrs. Elva LaRowe of Lebanon, who taught in the Jefferson high school for the past six years, has been hired to teach girl's physical education and science the coming year in the North Marion Union high school. Pat Beal is superintendent of the school.

U. S. Embassy Stoned Santiago, Chile, Aug. 26 (AP)—Police searched Santiago today for a mob of 30 or 40 persons who stoned the American embassy last night and smashed three windows.

Ambassador Claude G. Bowers said he thought the demonstrators were communists. He said the labor-controlled wing of the labor confederation recently sent him a letter demanding withdrawal of American forces from Korea.

R. E. Olds Last Auto Titan Dies

Lansing, Mich., Aug. 26 (AP)—Ransom E. Olds, last of the automotive titans whose "Merry Oldsmobile" caught the fancy of the stage and the motoring public, died today at his home. He was 86.

Dreamer, builder and financier, Olds built his first "horseless carriage"—a steam-driven three-wheeler—in 1896, and made his first gas-powered car in 1898.

Death was ascribed to complications of old age. He was stricken July 30, and has been bedfast since.

In 1901, Olds developed his famed "curved dash runabout" which sold for \$650, the first of the low-priced cars. Its popularity made the nation auto-hungry and by developing mass-production methods, 4,000 were produced the first year.

The runabout made a transcontinental trip in 1902 across muddy lanes and trackless wastes which would have tried any modern car. On Feb. 15, 1902, Olds placed his first advertisement in the Saturday Evening Post and became the first man to advertise a car nationally.

In 1905 Olds sold his interest in the Olds Motor Works and organized the Reo Motor Car Co. He got the name of the firm from his own initials. He worked at his Reo office in Lansing daily until he retired as chairman of the board in 1936.

Advice Given On Farm Loans

Commodity Credit corporation full value loans and purchase agreements guaranteeing producers support prices are available from time of harvest to the end of the year.

The loans are available through the county PMA office to farmers who store their commodities on their farms or in warehouses approved under the uniform grain storage agreement with CCC. If at the end of the loan period the commodity is delivered to CCC in satisfaction of the note, no interest is charged. If the commodity is removed from under loan the farmer will pay interest at the rate of 3 per cent. Actual disbursement of loan funds is effected through the local lending agencies.

Under the purchase agreement type of support the farmer needs only to sign an agreement with CCC. There are no special storage requirements. If within 3 days after April 30, 1951, the commodity has not been sold on the open market the farmer has an option to sell to CCC at the applicable support price.

Marion county support rates per bushel are as follows: Wheat \$2.06; barley \$1.26; oats \$0.76; and rye \$1.40. The producer's eligibility for wheat price support is contingent upon his compliance with his 1950 acreage allotment. A storage allowance of 7 cents a bushel will be made on wheat delivered to CCC after April 30, 1951.

U. S. 25th Division, Korea, Aug. 26 (AP)—Recruit John B. Cheetham learned to shoot while hunting squirrels with a .22 in the woodlands near Doerun, Ga. It paid off in Korea, the division public information officer said today.

After a recent battle, 55 North Koreans were sprawled around Cheetham's position, dead or wounded. Exactly how many Cheetham shot was not known.

Cheetham looked up from cleaning his automatic rifle and drawled:

"They just kept a coming and a coming, and I just kept a shooting and a shooting."

2 Governors Roundup Guests

Pendleton, Ore., Aug. 26 (AP)—Governors Douglas McKay of Oregon and Val Peterson of Nebraska were honored guests today as more than 9000 fans witnessed the third day of the Pendleton roundup.

Gov. Peterson arrived by plane from Lincoln yesterday. Bareback bronc riding was the first event of yesterday's series of cowboy contests. Then came the cowboys' pony race, won by Frank Gamble of Toppenish, Wash. Frank Swaggart took second and Dick Burgess third place.

In yesterday's calf roping contest, Chuck Sheppard of Prescott, Ariz., had the best time of the day, 18.4 seconds, looping and tying his tough black Angus calf with professional dexterity. Second best was Cotton Lee of Fort Sumner, N.M., 20.9; and Bill Linderman of Red Lodge, Mont., had 21.6. Six of the 15 entries were unable to complete the operation.

An unrehearsed bit of excitement was furnished in the stage coach race when a wheel horse on the lead coach fell. Another coach cut across the infield fence and tore it down. Cameramen, officials and cowboys scattered in all directions as the careening coach headed in their direction. Luckily, no one was injured and the team halted at the round-up gate.

Washington, Aug. 26 (AP)—The army today designated four recently re-opened posts as division-training centers.

Camp Breckenridge, Ky., 101st airborne division; Camp Chaffee, Ark., fifth armored division; Ft. Jackson, S. C., eighth infantry division, and Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., sixth armored division.

Other army division-training posts are:

Ft. Dix, N. J., ninth infantry division; Ft. Knox, Ky., third armored division; Ft. Ord, Calif., fourth infantry division, and Ft. Riley, Kans., 10th infantry division.

The designation of a post as a division training center has no bearing on the number of divisions in existence, the army said.

Urges Passage of Genocide Treaty

Washington, Aug. 26 (AP)—President Truman today urged early senate ratification of the Genocide treaty as a notice to "certain countries" which consider mass extermination of population "a justifiable means to promote their political objectives."

The treaty, outlawing mass atrocities, is sponsored by the United Nations. Mr. Truman did not identify the "certain nations" whose rulers he said consider Genocide a justifiable means to promote their political objectives.

In a letter to Chairman Connally (D, Tex.), of the senate foreign relations committee, the president urged that the group favorably report the convention so the senate can take speedy action.

Red's Statement Puzzle

London, Aug. 26 (AP)—Refusing to discuss the matter, the British foreign office today pondered Red China's recent declaration that it is ready to "liberate" Formosa from the nationalists. A spokesman denied, however, a Chinese communist complaint that British land, sea, and air forces in the Hong Kong area had been violating red territory.

Food Index Goes Skyward

New York, Aug. 26 (AP)—The Associated Press wholesale commodity index advanced this week for the tenth week-end in a row—to the highest level since Aug. 13, 1948.

At 188.25, the index compared with 186.00 a week ago and 155.21 a year ago.

The base year of the index of 35 important wholesale commodity prices is 1926 which equals 100.

All commodity groups represented advanced this week except food, which declined, and four of the six groups were at new highs for the year.

\$10 Billions More Seen for Defense

Washington, Aug. 26 (AP)—Rep. George H. Mahon, D, Tex., estimated today that the defense department will need another \$10,000,000,000 "within the next several months."

Mahon is chairman of a house appropriations subcommittee which handles defense spending. He said bills being voted by the house today contain upwards of \$36,000,000,000 for defense, including aid to allies overseas. He said that "if we propose to prepare for a major war," that sum would have to be raised to \$100,000,000,000.

Killed in Blast

Buenos Aires, Argentina, Aug. 26 (AP)—A violent explosion in a shoe factory in suburban Martinez today killed at least 16 workers and injured many others. The bodies of the victims were recovered in the wreckage after firemen extinguished flames following the blast. The factory, operated by the Makies company, made canvas shoes. The cause of the explosion was undetermined.

Chinese Reds to Send Delegates

Lake Success, Aug. 26 (AP)—The Chinese communist regime in Peiping announced to the United Nations today that it wants to send a delegation to try to get a seat in the general assembly opening Sept. 19.

Red China's Foreign Minister Chau En Lai cabled U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie that his government has named Chang Wen Tien, 50-year-old poker-playing communist veteran, to head the delegation.

Others are Chi Chao-Ting, Chinese communist who was in Chiang Kai-Shek's government until 1947, and who has an American wife; and Li Yi-Mang, Chou Shih-Ti, and Meng Yung-Chien, not immediately identified here.

Chang was designated late last year as Red China's representative in the security council and Chi was named for the economic and social council. Efforts by Russia and Yugoslavia to get them seated failed, however, and they never came here.

Chou demands that Lie make arrangements for them to attend the general assembly. That would require arranging with the U. S. state department to give them diplomatic visas. Lie

is not expected to return from a Norwegian holiday until early next week.

Chou also demanded two days ago that the U. N. end what he calls U. S. aggression in Formosa and security council delegates expect a full hearing of that question next week.

Girls' Tennis Champ Philadelphia, Aug. 26 (AP)—Kaureen Connolly, 15-year-old San Diego, Calif., star, retained the national girls tennis title today, defeating Laura Lou Jahn, 17, of Clearwater, Fla., 10-8, 6-0 at the Philadelphia Cricket club.
